For many years we have devoted special attention to the cultivation of Carnations. Owing to their great popularity and the rapidly increasing demand, we have considerably extended our facilities for their cultivation. For the cultivation of Malmaison and Tree varieties, American and English, we have erected new houses of large capacity, that enables us to grow them to perfection on the largest scale. For the cultivation of Border varieties we have built a series of frames, and considerably extended our outdoor area.

Our stocks of all classes of Carnations are exceptionally fine. We make a point of keeping all our collections close up to date by the addition of all new varieties of real value. By continual observation and comparison, coupled with our long experience, we regularly discard those varieties that prove of little value, or have been superseded by better ones. This process results in keeping our collection select, and of the highest value.

We are always happy for visitors to inspect our stocks, as at all seasons of the year there is something of interest. During the winter and early months of the year, Tree Carnations in pots make an effective display. These are followed by the many glorious varieties of Malmaisons, these in turn being followed by the Hardy Border varieties and Picotees. The American type of Tree Carnation blooms through practically the whole of the year.

## AMERICAN CARNATIONS.

The American Carnations have maintained and still further increased their great popularity. The large, non-bursting flowers, their purity and richness of colour, the delicious fragrance that many of them possess, together with the long strong stems upon which the flowers are borne, and the fact that they are almost continually in bloom, combine to make them the most useful and beautiful of all Carnations.

# CLIBRANS' MALMAISON CARNATIONS.

#### "THE FLOWER OF FASHION."

The great and rapidly increasing popularity of these lovely Carnations is of comparatively recent growth, and illustrates, in a remarkable manner, the results attendant upon skilful crossing and careful selection for the purpose of raising new varieties. Until a few years ago, the number of varieties was strictly limited; in fact, excepting the old blush-flowered Souvr. de la Malmaison, many people were entirely unacquainted with Malmaisons. Now, however, we have a wide choice of colours, ranging from pure white 'to deep crimson, embracing some delightful shades of rose, pink, cerise, salmon, scarlet, and other colours. All the varieties produce flowers of large size with stout petals, many of them possessing a delicions fragrance, making them doubly acceptable either for decorative use on the plant, or for cut flower purposes.

**Gultural Note.**—Malmaison Carnations are of the easiest culture. They require the temperature of a cool greenhouse throughout the year, and abundance of fresh air at all times. During the winter scason the plants should only be watered when absolutely necessary. It is far better for the health of the plant if it is kept a little too dry rather than have an over-supply of water. Care should be taken that the water is kept from the foliage, otherwise it is liable to cause rust.

During the growing and flowering season the plants should have an abundance of water, and if the weather is bright, light shading will be beneficial. Should the plants become infected with green fly, it must be kept in check by fumigating.

# TREE or PERPETUAL FLOWERING CARNATIONS.

The many gloriously beautiful self-coloured Tree Carnations, embracing pure white, yellow, pink, cerise, scarlet, and deep crimson, together with a range of charming intermediate shades, and the remarkable freedom with which they produce their flowers, render them at once favourite and invaluable subjects for greenhouse cultivation, particularly as they bloom during the winter season, when flowers are so acceptable. As decorative plants or for cutting they are equally useful; for the latter purpose the blooms are always in great demand for buttonholes, bouquet making, &c. Many varieties possess a rich fragrance.

**Cultural Note.**—The successful cultivation of Tree Carnations is not a difficult matter. Compost for potting should consist of three parts good fibrous yellow sandy loam and one part of well-rotted manner, with a little coarse sand or charcoal added to keep the whole sufficiently porous. Like Chrysanthemums, these plants should stand out of doors throughout the summer, and be brought into a gentle heat on the approach of winter. Where large specimeus are desired, the plants that have bloomed for the first time during the winter should be shortened back in the month of March, shifted into 8in. or 9in. pots in the month of May, and as soon as established, stood out of doors till the beginning of October. Abundance of air, gentle heat, and careful watering are their chief requirements during the blooming season.

## AMERICAN CARNATIONS.

The introduction of the American type of Tree Carnations marks a distinct advance upon previously existing varieties. They are remarkable for their strength and vigour, the large size and delicious perfume of the flowers, together with their variety of colour, ranging from the purest white to the deepest crimson. The stems carrying the flowers are of unusual length and strength, a matter of great importance where cut flowers are in request. Another feature of value lies in the fact that they are practically perpetual bloomers. Their cultivation is the same as that of the ordinary type of tree carnations, but special care should be taken, if long-stemmed flowers are required, to remove all buds from the flower stems except the one at the top.

# Border Carnations.

## SELFS, CLOVES AND FANCIES.

For Garden adornment, the Carnation produces an effect at once unique and beautiful. The diversity and wide range of their colours, the smooth, even formation of the flowers, together with their freedom of growth and of flower, and the distinct appearance of the foliage, lend a charm that would otherwise be absent. The sweet fragrance of many of the varieties adds also to their value.

**Cultural Note.**—When the ground is in good working condition, is not too much exposed, and does not retain too much moisture in the winter, we strongly recommend autumn planting as giving stronger plants and a better display of bloom. In bleak, exposed localities, the plants should be wintered in small pots in a cold frame, and planted out in April. Border Carnations usually thrive in any good garden soil. Their chief enemy is the wire worm, and this may be kept at a distance by sowing mustard seed in late summer where it is intended to plant the Carnations, and digging the mustard crop in when it has reached the height of six or eight inches.

## (TUFTED PANSIES.)

For bedding, general garden decoration, and cutting purposes, the Viola is one of the most useful and valued plants; perfectly hardy, accommodating itself to almost all classes of soil, the flowers covering a wide range of colours from purest white to deep purple and shades of crimson, many of them possessed of a delicious fragrance. The ground intended for Violas should be in a rich, well-worked condition. To encourage a plentiful succession of bloom it is advisable to pick off withering flowers, so as to prevent the seed pods from forming, and also to slightly shorten the longest shoots, and so secure an abundance of lateral growths.
