THE DIPLOMATIC SERVICE.

Lord Malmesbury has inaugurated his reign at the Foreign Office by the following important changes:—

Lord A. Loftus, Secretary of Legation at Berlin, will succeed Sir Hamilton Seymour at Vienna.

Sir J. Crampton, Minister at Hanover and late Minister to the United States, will succeed Lord Woodhouse at St. Petersburg.

Mr. Buchanan, Minister at Copenhagen, will succeed Lord Howden at Madrid.

Mr. Elliot, Secretary of Legation at Vienna, will succeed Mr. Buchanan at Copenhagen.

Mr. Howard, Secretary of the Embassy at Paris, will succeed Lord Normanby as Minister at Florence.

Lord Chelsea will succeed Mr. Howard as Secretary of the Embassy at Paris.

The *Times*, in a leading article, expresses its gratification at the removal of Lord Normanby from Florence, but complains of the appointment of Mr. Howard. With this exception it thinks the appointments indicate a disposition to acknowledge the claims of long service and experience.

There is a universal move in the diplomatic circles of England. Mr. William Doria is on his way to Vienna as Secretary of Legation. The government has promoted from attaché to Secretary of Legation, Messrs. Barron Thomson, Arthur Dickinson Manby, and Robert West. Mr. W. Lowther is to be acting chargé d'affaires at St. Petersburg until Sir John Lubbock, who is to be sent to the Hon. Mr. Erskine goes to Washington. Sir Henry Howard is proceeding to Florence with the Hon. Mr. Monson. Mr. Digby goes to Athens to replace Mr. Sydney Lockhart, appointed paid attaché to Constantinople. Lord Schomberg Kerr is recalled from Geneva, and will probably join the embassy at Paris, where already Mr. Balfour is installed.

The Richmond (Va.) *Dispatch* says of Mr. G. P. R. James, that he will soon leave for the Consul Generalship at Odessa. This event causes sincere regret among the many warm friends and admirers of that gentleman in the city and State. W. Moreton Dyer, Esq., late British Consul at Mobile, has left the city for Baltimore, whither he has been transferred by his Government to act in the same capacity. On the eve of his departure, his friends presented him with two massive silver pitchers, a waiter, and half a dozen goblets.

BARWELL, LIEUTENANT.—Was sometime in the Osmanli Irregular Cavalry, and was appointed Vice-Consul, at Tarsous, November 19, 1856.

JONES, WILLIAM WILFRED.—Was Vice-Consul at Havre, from 1845 to 1850.

ZOHIRAR, JAMES.—Was appointed, in September, 1854, Secretary to General (now Sir W. F.) Williams, and a First Class Interpreter, attached to Staff in Asia Minor; was present at the Siege of Kars, and for his services, on the 29th September, 1855, received the Medjidie of the 4th Class, and, in July, 1856, the Turkish Medal for the Kars Campaign; and was appointed Vice-Consul at Mostai on the 10th September, 1856.

HISTORY OF THE OFFICES OF THE SECRETARIES OF STATE.

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THE earliest mention of a Secretary to The Sovereign occurs in the 37th year of the reign of Henry the Third, 1253.

There was only one Principal Secretary of State until the 30th year of the reign of Henry the Eighth, 1539, when the number was increased to two, both being of equal rank and authority.

Upon the union with Scotland, in the 6th year of the reign of Queen Anne, 1708, a third Principal Secretary of State was added, viz.: one for Scotch Affairs, which appointment ceased in January, 1746.

In the 8th year of the reign of George the Third, 1768, January 20, a Principal Secretary of State for the American or Colonial Department was added, which appointment was abolished in 1782.

When only two Principal Secretaries of State existed, there was—

One for the Northern Department, or Province, which included the Low Countries, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Poland, Russia, &c., &c., &c.

One for the Southern Department, or Province, which included France, Switzerland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, and Turkey, &c., &c., &c.

In the year 1782, March 27, the terms "Northern" and "Southern" were discontinued; the duties being divided into "Home" and "Foreign."—The affairs of Ireland and the Colonies devolved upon the elder of these two Secretaries.

In the year 1794, July 17, a Principal Secretary of State for War was appointed; and to him the business of the Colonies (which was carried on at the Home Department) was transferred in the year 1801, March 17.

In the year 1854, June 12, a Fourth Principal Secretary of State was appointed, when the business of the War and Colonies was divided.

* Sir George Rumbold's house, near Altona, was surrounded by a company of eighty soldiers (part of a detachment of 250), at one o'clock in the morning; the doors were forced open, and his person and papers seized. On the instant, he was hurried into a carriage, taken to the banks of the Elbe, and thence conveyed to Harbourg, and to Hanover, and subsequently by land, escorted by a squadron of dragoons, to Paris, where, immediately on his arrival, he was lodged in the Temple. The British Government appealed in strong terms to the *corps diplomatique* against this outrage, and the different sovereigns of Europe were invoked to resent it. However, after an examination of his papers (in which nothing was found to implicate him in a supposed conspiracy), and an imprisonment of three days, he was released, and removed, still strongly guarded, first to Boulogne, and then to Cherbourg. At this latter place he was embarked for England, in a fishing smack, which, meeting in the channel the British frigate Niobe, she received him on board, and landed him at Portsmouth. This affair produced a great sensation at every court.

was attached to the Consulate-General in the United States from 1817 to 1824; during a portion of that time was in charge of the Consulate-General; was Vice-Consul at Columbia, and Acting Consul-General in the United States from 1824 to 1827; was Secretary to the Commissioners under the 1st Article of the Treaty of Ghent from 1823 to 1828; was Consul for the Floridas and Alabama from January 10, 1828, to February 18, 1840, when he exchanged to the Consulate of Riga; was appointed Consul at Vigo, August 25, 1843, and transferred to Barcelona, December 10, 1852.

BALL, WILLIAM ST. JAMES,
was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, March 18, 1852; and a Lieutenant in the 2nd Royal Surrey Militia, April 4, 1854.

***BANKHEAD, CHARLES,**
was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, July 6, 1814; Secretary of Legation at Washington, January 7, 1826; Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, October 2, 1838; and Minister Plenipotentiary in Mexico, December 11, 1843, which post he held till April 6, 1851, when he obtained his Pension.

***BANNERMAN, SIR ALEXANDER, BART.,**
was attached to the Legation at Florence from March 12, 1844, to 1847. Succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1851.

BARBAR, LEWIS JOHN,
was Acting Vice-Consul at Naples in 1850, and was appointed Vice-Consul at Naples, January 1, 1851; was several times Acting Consul; and was transferred to Alexandretta, October 17, 1856.

***BARCLAY, ANTHONY,**
was appointed Secretary to the Boundary Commission under the 4th Article of the Treaty of Ghent, September, 1816, and British Commissioner for carrying into effect the 6th and 7th Articles of the same Treaty, January 11, 1820; was Consul at New York, from December 6, 1842, till May 28, 1856, when his exequatur was revoked by the President of the United States.

BARNARD, CHARLES TOWNSHEND,
was appointed Attaché at Stuttgart, February 9, 1816; at Munich, March 9, 1820; and Secretary of Legation at Dresden, June 30, 1824. He resides at Cobourg as Chargé d'Affaires.

***BARNARD, PHILIP ADOLPHUS,**
served some years in the 24th Foot; was a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger from April 28, 1838, till April 18, 1845.

BARRIE, COL. BENJAMIN,
served in the Army; was some time Consular Assistant at Madrid; and was appointed Consul at Alicante, March 2, 1846.

BARRON, HENRY PAGE TURNER,
was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Berne, December 21, 1840; and transferred to Turin, August 17, 1841; was appointed Paid Attaché, January 12, 1847; was temporarily attached at Florence, from April 4, 1848, till 1850; served some months at Florence during 1851 and 1852; was transferred to Berlin, June 16, 1852; to Stuttgart, June 15, 1853; and to Brussels, August 14, 1855.

***BARRON, EUSTACE,**
was appointed Vice-Consul for San Blas, Mazatlan, Acapulco, and Guaymas, in Mexico, July 9, 1824, and Consul for those places, April 8, 1842. He resigned his post, December 27, 1848.

BARTON, JOHN,
was appointed Vice-Consul at Callao, January 2, 1843; Consul, January 4, 1850; was Acting Consul-General in Peru from January 1, 1843, till January 8, 1844; from February 7, 1846, till March 8, 1848; and from September 1, 1852, till May 22, 1853.

***BATHURST, EDWARD,**
acted as Vice-Consul and Assistant to the Mission at Copenhagen in 1844; was Vice-Consul at Cape Haitien from 1846 to December 4, 1849, when that Post was abolished.

BELL, JOHN,
was appointed Vice-Consul at Tetuan in April, 1830; was removed to Tangiers in July, 1831; during April and May, 1833, acted as Agent and Consul-General in Morocco; was appointed Vice-Consul at Oran, in Algeria, in March, 1837; Consul at Algiers, January 15, 1851; and Consul-General for Algeria, July 22, 1854.

BERAZA, RAFAEL,
proceeded to Mexico with the Commission of Inquiry in 1823; was subsequently employed to convey the correspondence of the Commission to and from Vera Cruz, and from the close of the Commission to the present time has been employed as Messenger to the Legation in Mexico.

BERGNE, JOHN BRODRIBB,
was employed in the Foreign Office from January 5, 1817, till July 1, 1854, when he was appointed Superintendent of the Treaty Department.

***BESBOROUGH (JOHN GEORGE BRABAZON PONSONBY), EARL OF,**
was attached for some time to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, having been appointed July 3, 1832; was Précis Writer to Viscount Palmerston from May 3, 1833, to May 16, 1834; was for some years M.P. for Derby; succeeded to the Peerage, as 5th Earl, May 16, 1817; was Master of the Buckhounds from May 16, 1848, till February, 1852; was made a Privy Councillor, June 30, 1848; and was again appointed Master of the Buckhounds, December 28, 1852.

BIDWELL, JOHN,
was appointed to a Clerkship in the Foreign Office, January 5, 1842; was attached to the Legation at Washington from December 26, 1843, to April, 1846, and was Précis Writer to The Earl of Malmesbury from December 15, 1852, till his Lordship's resignation of office; was attached to the Earl of Clarendon's special mission to Paris in February, March, and April, 1856; was appointed an Ensign in the 2nd Derby Militia (the Chatsworth Rifles), August 15, 1856.

BINGHAM, HON. RICHARD,
was attached to the Mission at Naples, July 15, 1818; to the Embassy at Paris, August 20, 1823; to the Mission at Madrid, April, 1825; to the Embassy at Lisbon, January, 1828; was appointed Paid Attaché at Madrid, July 6, 1829; Secretary of Legation at Munich, August 8, 1831; at Turin, May 3, 1839; at Lisbon, January 1852; at Naples, April 7, 1852; and Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General in Venezuela, November 23, 1852.

BLACKWOOD, CAPT. HON. HENRY STEVENSON,
served some years in the 17th Lancers; was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger June 9, 1849.

***BLIGH, HON. SIR JOHN DUNCAN, K.C.B.,**
was attached to the Embassy at Vienna, October, 1820; at Paris, June, 1823; to the late Duke of Wellington's Special Mission to Russia, February, 1826; was appointed Paid Attaché at Paris, May 9, 1828; Secretary of Legation at Florence, September 7, 1829; was Chargé d'Affaires from May 11 to December 31, 1830; Secretary of Embassy at the Hague, November 16, 1830, where he was Minister Plenipotentiary from July 3 to September 13, 1832; was transferred to St. Petersburg, September 3, 1832; acted as Minister Plenipotentiary there till he was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Stockholm, November 3, 1835; and was transferred to Hanover, May 2, 1838; was made a C.B. March 1, 1851; and retired June 3, 1856, on a pension; was appointed a K.C.B., September 30, 1856.

***BLIGH, HON. AND REV. EDWARD VESEY,**
was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Hanover, September 25, 1850; at Florence, July 28, 1851; at Berlin, February 21, 1852; and 2nd Paid Attaché at Berlin, July 8, 1853, which post he held till November 20, 1853; was some years a Lieutenant in the West Kent Regiment of Yeomanry Cavalry; is in Holy Orders; was appointed Chaplain to the West Kent Regiment of Yeomanry Cavalry, July 20, 1855.

BLOOMFIELD (JOHN ARTHUR DOUGLAS BLOOMFIELD), LORD, K.C.B.,
 was appointed a Page of Honour to the Prince Regent, March, 1812; a Lieutenant in the Coldstream Guards, April 9, 1818, and has been on half-pay since December 26, 1818, when the Army of Occupation returned from France; was attached to the Embassy at Vienna, February 16, 1818; appointed Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg October, 1823; at Lisbon, October 9, 1824; Secretary of Legation at Stuttgart, December 27, 1825; at Stockholm, September 22, 1826; Secretary of Embassy at St. Petersburg, June 25, 1839; was Minister Plenipotentiary, *ad interim*, in 1840 and 1841; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at St. Petersburg, March 9, 1844; was made a C.B. April 27, 1848, and K.C.B. March 1, 1851; was transferred to Berlin, April 28, 1851.

BLUNT, CHARLES,
 was appointed Consul at Salonica, January 13, 1833, and was transferred to Smyrna, October 31, 1856.

BLUNT, JOHN E.
 was twice acting Vice-Consul at Mytilene; was acting Consul at Rhodes from January till April, 1854; served as Chief Interpreter to the Cavalry Division under the Earl of Lucan, from April, 1854, till March, 1855, obtained the Crimean Medal and Clasp for Alma, Balaklava, and Inkermann; and was appointed Vice-Consul at Volos, March 8, 1855.

***BOILEAU, JOHN ELLIOT,**
 was Assistant Private Secretary to Lord John Russell, when Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from December 29, 1852, till February 21, 1853; was Private Secretary to him when Lord President of the Council, from June 12, 1854, till February 7, 1855, and was also Private Secretary to him when Secretary of State for the Colonies, from May till July, 1855.

***BOLTON, ROBERT THORLEY,**
 was Vice-Consul at Narva from May 24, 1840, till May 22, 1854.

BONAR, ALFRED GUTHRIE GRAHAM,
 was attached to the Mission at Stuttgart, December 23, 1835; at Berne, in October, 1836; appointed Paid Attaché at Lisbon, May 17, 1839; at Vienna, June 3, 1843; did not proceed to Vienna, but exchanged for Dresden, March 23, 1844; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Munich, May 30, 1849; was Chargé d'Affaires from October 11, 1850, to May 25, 1851, and has been since September 25, 1856.

BONHAM, EDWARD WALTER,
 was employed in Persia as Consul and Consul-General from May, 1837, to February 2, 1846, when he was appointed Consul at Calais.

***BONHAM, SIR SAMUEL GEORGE, K.C.B.,**
 was nearly ten years Governor of Prince of Wales Island, Singapore, and Malacca; was Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Hong Kong and its Dependencies, Plenipotentiary and Chief Superintendent of British Trade in China from April 27, 1848, till December 24, 1853; was made a C.B., April 27, 1848; a K.C.B., November 22, 1850; and a Baronet, November 22, 1852.

BONHOPE, THOMAS,
 was Consular-Agent at Surabaya from October 4, 1855, till July 4, 1856, when he was appointed Consul.

***BOSANQUET, GEORGE JACOB,**
 was appointed Attaché at Berlin, June 1815; at Paris, May, 1818; Paid Attaché at Madrid, December, 1822; was left in charge of the Mission, September 1, 1824; was appointed Secretary of Legation, October 25, 1824, and was Chargé d'Affaires till May, 1825, and again from September 13, 1827, till February 1, 1830; he resigned his appointment in July, 1830.

***BOUVERIE, RIGHT HON. EDWARD PLEYDELL, M.P.**
 was Precis Writer to Viscount Palmerston from January 5 to June 18, 1840; was Under Secretary of State for the Home Department from July 5, 1850, till March, 1852; was elected Chairman of Committee of Ways and Means of the House of Commons, April, 1853; has represented Kilmarnock since 1844; was made a Privy Councillor and was appointed Vice-President of the Board of Trade, March 31, 1855, and President of the Poor Law Board, August 13, 1855.

***BOWEN, GEORGE,**
 was Vice-Consul at Nicaragua from October 20, 1853, till August, 1854, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at Liverpool for the State of Nicaragua.

BOWRING, SIR JOHN, KNT.,
 was nominated by the Government to proceed to the Low Countries, in 1828, to examine into the manner of keeping the public accounts; was engaged in a similar mission to France, in 1830, with the late Sir Henry Parnell (afterwards Lord Conington); served, in 1831, with Mr. Villiers (now Earl of Clarendon), as Commercial Commissioner in France, to arrange the basis of a Treaty of Commerce with that country; unsuccessfully contested Blackburn in 1832 and 1835; was returned M.P. for Kilmarnock in 1835, and for Bolton in 1841 and 1847; was appointed Consul at Canton, January 10, 1849; acted as Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary and Chief Superintendent of British Trade in China from April, 1852, till February, 1853; was appointed to that post December 24, 1853 and Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Hong Kong, January 10, 1854; was Knighted February 16, 1854; is a Knight of the Order of Christ of Portugal.

***BOYLE (HENRY BENTINCK BOYLE), VISCOUNT,**
 was appointed Unpaid Attaché to the Legation at Frankfurt, October 30, 1852; was transferred to Vienna, December 7, 1852, which post he held till September 4, 1853.

BOZI, THEODORE LEBRECHT,
was for many years Spanish Consul at Belfast, and was appointed Consul at Cologne, June 13, 1856.

BRACKENBURY, WILLIAM CONGREVE,
served in the Navy before being appointed Consular Assistant to the Mission at Madrid in June, 1846; during the rupture of diplomatic relations from May, 1848, to April, 1850, was left at Madrid; was appointed Consul at Madrid, December 18, 1850; was transferred to Bilbao, April 1, 1854, and to Vigo, April 15, 1856.

BRACKENBURY, JOHN MACPHERSON HENRY HUME,
was Vice-Consul at Cadiz from 1822 till January 28, 1842, when he was appointed Consul at that port.

BRANT, JAMES,
was appointed Consul at Erzerum April 27, 1836, and was transferred to Damascus, December 3, 1855.

BRERETON, REV. CHARLES
was formerly Assistant Curate at St. James's, Westminster; subsequently Rector of St. Edmund's, Norfolk; and was appointed British Chaplain at Malaga, August 27, 1850.

BRIDGE, T. T.,
was employed as Messenger to the Legation at the Hague, from 1836 till 1851, when he was appointed extra Messenger between the Hague and London.

***BRISTOL (FREDERICK WILLIAM HERVEY), MARQUESS OF,**
was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, when Lord Hawkesbury (afterwards 2nd Earl of Liverpool) was Secretary of State from February 20, 1801, till November 8, 1803; was M.P. for Bury St. Edmunds from 1796, till he succeeded as 5th Earl, July 8, 1803; was created Marquis of Bristol, June 13, 1826.

BRODIE, WILLIAM,
was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Stockholm, June 30, 1853, and was transferred to the Embassy at Constantinople, December 12, 1853.

***BROOKE, SIR JAMES, K.C.B.,**
was Commissioner and Consul-General in Borneo, from July 23, 1817, till August 9, 1855; was Governor and Commander-in-Chief over the Island of Labuan and its dependencies from November 27, 1847, to December 31, 1852; was made a K.C.B. April 27, 1848.

***BROUGHTON, LIEUT.-COL. WILLIAM E. DELVES, R.E.,**
was one of the Commissioners appointed to survey the North-eastern and North-western Boundaries of the British Possessions in North America from June 1, 1840, to March 31, 1845. In 1845 and 1846 was employed under the Labour Rate Act in Ireland, and the Poor-Law Commission, and as Commissioner of Poor-Law Boundaries in Ireland, in 1850; commanded Royal Engineers in China, from 1861 to 1854, at Portsmouth in 1854, and at Portland, since August, 1855.

***BROWNE, PETER,**
was in Parliament from 1818 to 1826; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Copenhagen, November 4, 1823; and retired upon a Pension in December, 1852.

BROWN, TIMOTHY YEATS,
was appointed Superintendent of the Consulate at Cagliari, July, 1833, and Consul at Genoa, August 4, 1840.

BRUCE, HON. FREDERICK WILLIAM ADOLPHUS,
was attached to the late Lord Ashburton's Special Mission to Washington, February 9, 1812; served as Colonial Secretary in Hong Kong from 1844 to 1846; was appointed Consul-General, July 23, 1847; and Chargé d'Affaires in Bolivia, April 14, 1848; was transferred to Montevideo, August 29, 1851; and was appointed Agent and Consul-General in Egypt, August 3, 1853.

BUCHANAN, ANDREW,
was attached to the Embassy at Constantinople, October 10, 1825; was appointed Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, November 13, 1830; was temporarily attached to Sir Stratford Canning's (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe) Special Embassy to Constantinople from October 31, 1831, to September 18, 1832; was appointed Paid Attaché at Washington, November 9, 1832; was temporarily attached to the late Sir Charles Vaughan's Special Mission to Constantinople from March, 1837, to September, 1838; was appointed Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, October, 1838; Secretary of Legation at Florence, August 21, 1841; was Chargé d'Affaires from July, 1842, till October, 1843, and from March till May, 1844; was appointed Secretary of Legation at St. Petersburg, April 3, 1844; was Chargé d'Affaires from October 29, 1844, to October, 1845; from June 14, to November 4, 1846; from October, 1848, to November, 1849; and from June to October, 1851; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, February 12, 1852; and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Copenhagen, February 9, 1853.

BULWER, RIGHT HON. SIR HENRY LYTTON, G.C.B.,
served some months in the 2nd Life Guards; was attached to the Mission at Berlin in August, 1827; to the Embassy at Vienna in April, 1829; at the Hague, April, 1830; at Paris, November, 1832; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Brussels, November 27, 1836; was Chargé d'Affaires there in 1835 and 1836; Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, October 14, 1837; at St. Petersburg, October 2, 1838; at Paris, June 25, 1839; was for some time Minister Plenipotentiary in 1839, 1840, and 1841; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Madrid, November 14, 1843, which post he continued to hold till the rupture of diplomatic relations between England and Spain in 1848; was made a Privy Councillor, June 30, 1845; a K.C.B., April 27, 1848; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Washington, April 27, 1849; was made a G.C.B., March 1, 1851; was transferred to Florence, January 19, 1852; was M.P. for Wilton in 1830, for Coventry in 1834, and for Marylebone from 1834 till 1837. Retired upon a Pension, December 16, 1854. Was sent on a Special Mission to the Danubian Provinces in July, 1856.

BUNCH, ROBERT,

was Private Secretary to the late Mr. W. P. Adams at Bogotá and Lima from 1842 to 1845; in September, 1844, was sent, in conjunction with Captain Sir Thomas Thompson, Bart., R.N., as Joint Commissioner to the Supreme Junta of Government of Peru, at the city of Arequipa; was appointed Consular Agent at Lima, December 16, 1845; Acting Consul at Callao, February 6, 1846; Vice-Consul at New York, October 25, 1848; was Acting Consul from November 3, 1850, to March 10, 1851; was appointed Consul at Philadelphia, March 11, 1853, having been in charge of the Consulate from February 12, 1853; and was transferred to Charleston, July 5, 1853.

***BURGHESH (FRANCIS WILLIAM FANE), LORD, C.B.,**

entered the Army in February 21, 1843; served in the Punjab Campaign in 1846, and was present at the Battle of Goojerat, for which he received the rank of Brevet-Major; served also in the Eastern Campaign, 1854 and 1855, as Aide-de-Camp to the late Lord Raglan, including the Battle of Alma, the despatches of which he conveyed to England, and received the rank of Brevet-Lieutenant-Colonel; is a Lieut.-Colonel in the Coldstream Guards, and a C.B.; was attached to the Earl of Westmorland's Special Mission to Belgium, in July 1856; and was appointed Aide-de-Camp to the Duke of Cambridge July, 1856; was appointed, July 23, 1856, by a Royal Decree, Commander of the Belgian Order of Leopold, but did not receive Her Majesty's permission to wear the decoration.

BURNETT, JAMES,

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Maccio from August 17, 1839, to June, 1854, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at that place.

BURNLEY, JOSEPH HUME,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Madrid, June 13, 1847; was transferred to Frankfort, August 28, 1848; to Madrid, May 16, 1850; and was appointed Paid Attaché at Lisbon, February 20, 1852.

BURY, RICHARD,

was employed in the Foreign Office from December 23, 1844, till July 1, 1854, when he was appointed Assistant in the Treaty Department.

***BYNG, HON. GEORGE HENRY CHARLES, M.P.**

was elected M.P. for Tavistock, July, 1852; was appointed Lieut.-Colonel in the West Middlesex Militia in 1853, and a Deputy Lieutenant of that County in 1854, and was for a short time attached to Lord John Russell's Special Mission to Vienna, in February, 1855.

***BYNG, HON. GERRARD FREDERICK,**

was a Lieutenant in the 27th Light Dragoons, from 1799, to August 13, 1801, when he exchanged into the 53rd Foot, and was placed on halfpay in 1802; was a Clerk in the Foreign Office from January 5, 1801, till April 5, 1809, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance. Was appointed May 24, 1824, to attend upon the late King and Queen of the Sandwich Islands during their visit to England in May, June, and July, of that year. Has been one of the Gentlemen Ushers of the Privy Chamber since March 23, 1831.

BYRON, HENRY,

was appointed Vice-Consul in Hayti, September, 1852; was in charge of the Consulate-General from that date until June, 1854, and has been since October, 1856.

***CADE, JOSEPH,**

was employed in the Foreign Office from May, 1819, to October, 1823, when he was attached to the Commission to Colombia; and was afterwards attached to the Mission in Colombia, till October, 1837, when he was appointed Consul at Panama, which post he held till September 1, 1841, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***CADOGAN, COLONEL HON. GEORGE, C.B.,**

entered the Grenadier Guards as Ensign and Lieutenant, February 22, 1833; became Lieutenant and Captain, January 9, 1838; Captain and Lieut.-Colonel, August 6, 1847, and Colonel, November 28, 1854; accompanied his Regiment to the East, in 1854, and was present at the Battles of Alma and Inkerman; was attached as Colonel on the Staff at the Head Quarters of the Sardinian Contingent in the East, from April 2, 1855, till May 20, 1856, when that corps having left the Crimea he was ordered to proceed to England and report himself to the Adjutant-General; was granted, August 11, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Cross of Commander of the First Class, of the Order of Saint Maurice and Saint Lazarus, which was conferred upon him by His Majesty the King of Sardinia, as a mark of His Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war. Was made a C.B., January 2, 1857.

CALLANDER, RANDAL,

was appointed to a Writership at Sierra Leone in September, 1843, and to a Sub-Inspectorship of Factories in England, December 8, 1845; was employed under the Census Commissioners from January, 1851, to February 21, 1852, when he was appointed Consul at St. Catherine's.

CALVERT, CHARLES JOHN,

was acting Consul at Damascus, from April 12 to December 17, 1850, at Beyrout, from May 24, 1853, to March 9, 1854; was appointed Vice-Consul at Larissa, November 29, 1854, and Consul at Salonica, October 31, 1856.

CAMERON, DONALD,

was appointed Attaché at Berne, June 16, 1852, and was transferred to Copenhagen, April 10, 1854.

CAMPBELL, LIEUT. ROBERT, R.N.

served some time in the Royal Navy; was appointed Vice-Consul at Milan, February 16, 1836; at Venice, January 20, 1851; acted as Consul-General there from October 20, 1852, to April, 1853; was appointed Consul at Dunkirk, November 23, 1852; and at Rhodes, December 8, 1853.

***CAMPBELL, COL. PATRICK,**

was appointed Secretary of Legation in Colombia, December 29, 1826; Agent and Consul-General in Egypt, January 7, 1833; and retired, August 13, 1841, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***CANNING (CHARLES JOHN CANNING), VISCOUNT,**
was M.P. for Warwick in 1837; succeeded to the Peerage, March 27, 1837; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from September 4, 1841, to January 27, 1846, whilst the Earl of Aberdeen was Secretary of State; was Chief Commissioner of Woods and Forests from March 10, 1846, till the resignation of Sir Robert Peel's Administration in the July following; was made a Privy Councillor, March 18, 1846; was appointed Postmaster-General, December 28, 1852; and was given a Seat in the Cabinet, February 8, 1855; was appointed to be one of a Committee of Council to superintend the application of any sums voted by Parliament for the purpose of promoting Public Education, February 28, 1855; and was appointed Governor-General of India, July, 1855.

CAPEL, HON. REGINALD ALGERNON,
was employed as an Extra Messenger between London and Constantinople from April 15, 1853, till February 2, 1854, when he was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger.

CARRUTHERS, JOHN PATRICK,
was Consul at Taganrog from October, 1843, till May 10, 1854; and was re-appointed June 21, 1856.

***CARTER, MATHEW,**
was appointed Consul at Coquimbo, October 10, 1823; was transferred to Carthagena, August 14, 1833, which post he held till January 22, 1840, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***CATHCART, HON. FREDERICK MACADAM,**
entered the Army, January 12, 1805; served as Aide-de-Camp to the late Lord Cathcart, the Commander of the Forces in the Expedition sent to the North of Germany in 1805 and 1806; became a Lieutenant, May 1, 1806; accompanied also the Expedition sent to the Island of Rugen, in the Baltic, to co-operate with the King of Sweden in 1807; was present at the Siege and Capture of Copenhagen; was sent home with the despatches, and was promoted to a troop in the 25th Light Dragoons, September 17, 1807; as Attaché and Private Secretary, went with Lord Cathcart to Russia in July, 1812, and accompanied his Lordship subsequently during the Campaigns in Germany in 1813 and 1814; was present at the Battles of Lutzeu, Bautzen, Dresden, Leipsig, Fère Champenoise, and at the Capture of Paris, March 31, 1814; was employed at the Head Quarters of the Allied Army, under Marshal Prince Schwarzenberg, in 1815; was Secretary of Embassy at St. Petersburg from May 26, 1820 to January 16, 1824, when he was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Frankfurt, which post he held till 1826.

***CAVENDISH (SPENCER COMPTON CAVENDISH), LORD,**
is Major of the 2nd Derby Militia (the Chatsworth Rifles); and a Captain in the Lancashire Hussars. Was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

CAVENDISH, FRANCIS WILLIAM HENRY,
was appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Derbyshire, May, 1812; Attaché to the Embassy at Vienna, September 24, 1840; was employed in the Foreign Office from October, 1816, to May 9, 1848, when he was appointed to a Clerkship; was appointed Précis Writer to Lord John Russell, December 29, 1852, and to the Earl of Clarendon, February 22, 1853.

***CHARLTON, RICHARD,**
was Consul in the Sandwich Islands from September, 1821, to November, 1842.

***CHATFIELD, FREDERICK,**
served in the 2nd Life Guards from November 24, 1818, till November 19, 1821, when he retired upon Half-pay of the 20th Foot; was appointed Consul at Memel, July 1, 1826; at Warsaw, December 31, 1831; to the Republic of Central America, June 27, 1833; was named Consul-General to the Five Governments of Central America, April 2, 1842, Chargé d'Affaires, June 16, 1849; and was recalled on the reduction of his office, July 1, 1852, when he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***CHELSEA (HENRY CHARLES CADOGAN), VISCOUNT,**
was Attaché at St. Petersburg from June, 1834, till July, 1835; was M.P. for Reading from 1841 to 1847; and was returned for Dover in July, 1852.

***CHESNEY, MAJOR-GENERAL FRANCIS RAWDON,**
entered the Royal Artillery as a 2nd Lieutenant, November 9, 1804; was promoted to be 1st Lieutenant, September 20, 1806; Captain, June 20, 1815; Brevet-Major, December 2, 1836; Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel, April 27, 1838; Regimental Lieutenant-Colonel, April 13, 1842; Regimental Colonel, November 11, 1851; was employed from 1829 to 1832 in examining the principal parts of Western Asia, with a view to extending our commercial relations in that quarter, and opening a communication with India through Arabia. In 1835, he was employed in surveying the rivers Euphrates, Tigris, and Kaveu; was promoted to be a Major-General, January 6, 1855.

***CHESTER, HARRY,**
was attached to the late Lord William Russell's Special Mission to Lisbon in 1833; has been a Clerk in the Council Office since May, 1826; is Assistant Secretary to the Committee of Council on Education, and Vice-President of the Society of Arts.

CHRISTIE, WILLIAM DOUGAL,
was Private Secretary to the Earl of Minto when First Lord of the Admiralty in 1841; was M.P. for Weymouth from April, 1842, to November, 1847; was appointed Agent and Consul-General in Mosquito, May 25, 1848; and Secretary of Legation in Switzerland, February 20, 1851; was Chargé d'Affaires from March 10 to October 27, 1851; from December 10, 1851, to February 20, 1852; from February 27 to September 17, 1853; from January 13 till March 9, and from October 27 till December 2, 1854. Was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General to the Argentine Confederation, October 10, 1851; and Minister Plenipotentiary there, January 15, 1856.

***CHURCHILL (FRANCIS GEORGE SPENCER), LORD,**
was appointed Unpaid Attaché at Vienna, August 10, 1823; and Paid Attaché at Lisbon, January 12, 1838, which post he has resigned; succeeded to the Peerage, March 7, 1845.

CHURCHILL, HENRY ADRIAN, C.B.,

was Assistant-Surveyor to the British Commission for the delimitation of the Turco-Persian Frontier in 1848; was Secretary and Interpreter to the Commission from 1850 till 1852; was appointed 3rd Paid Attaché at Tehran, April 22, 1852. In 1854, 1855, and 1856 was attached to the Staff of Major-General (now Sir William) Williams, employed as Her Majesty's Commissioner with the Turkish Army in Asia; the 3rd Class of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie was conferred on him by the Mushir, in virtue of the authority with which he was invested by the Sultan, to mark a seizure of his conduct and gallantry at the battle on the heights of Kars, September 29; the garrison of Kars was subsequently forced to capitulate, November 28, 1855, when Mr. Churchill surrendered himself a prisoner to the Russian forces under General Mouravieff; was granted, February 7, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Imperial Order of the Medjidie; upon his return to England was appointed a C.B., June 19, 1856; was appointed Consul in Bosnia, September 5, 1856.

***CLANRICARDE, (ULICK JOHN DE BURGH), MARQUESS OF, K.P.,**
Succeeded as 14th Earl, and was created Marquess, in 1825; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from January 2, 1826, till August 17, 1827, whilst Mr. Canning was Secretary of State; was made a Privy Councillor, December 1, 1830; was appointed Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, December 1, 1830; Ambassador at St. Petersburg, October 6, 1838; and was Postmaster-General from July 14, 1846, till December 27, 1852.

***CLANWILLIAM (RICHARD CHARLES FRANCIS MEADE), EARL OF,**
Succeeded as 3rd Earl, September 3, 1805; was Private Secretary to the late Marquess of Londonderry from January 5, 1817 to July 4, 1819, and Under Secretary of State from January 22 till August 12, 1822; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Berlin, February 3, 1823, which post he held till December 28, 1827, when he was created a Peer of the United Kingdom.

***CLAREMONT, LT.-COL. ROBERT STOPPORD, C.B.**
entered the 1st Regiment of Foot, February 9, 1838; was a Captain in the Royal Canadian Rifle Regiment from November 14, 1845, till August 10, 1855; was employed on Special Service, at the Head Quarters of the French Army in the East, with the rank of Brevet-Major, from April 8, 1854, till July, 1855. Obtained a Brevet Majority in the Army, December 12, 1854, and an Unattached Majority, August 10, 1855; was appointed Military Commissioner at Paris, September, 1855; obtained a Lieutenant-Colonelcy in the Army, September 14, 1855; was appointed a C.B., October, 16, 1855; was granted, August 2, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Insignia of the Fourth Class, Officer of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, which His Imperial Majesty, the Emperor of the French, was pleased to confer upon him as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war.

CLARENDON (GEORGE WILLIAM FREDERICK VILLIERS), EARL OF, K.G., G.C.B.
was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg from 1820 till 1823; was First Commissioner of Excise from the end of 1823 till September, 1833; in 1827 he went to Ireland, as Commissioner to make arrangements for an union of the English and Irish Boards, and remained there till 1829; for a few months in 1831 he was employed in France as Commercial Commissioner to arrange the bases of a Treaty of Commerce with that country; was Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Madrid from September 5, 1833, till October 18, 1839; was made a G.C.B., October 20, 1837; succeeded as 4th Earl, December 22, 1838; was made a Privy Councillor January 3, 1840; was Lord Privy Seal from January 15, 1840, till September 3, 1841; was Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, pro tempore, from October 31, 1840, till June 23, 1841; was President of the Board of Trade from July 6, 1846, till July 22, 1847; was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland from May 26, 1847, till February 28, 1852; was made a K.G. March 23, 1849; was appointed Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, February 21, 1853; accompanied Her Majesty to Paris, in August, 1855; was Plenipotentiary at the Conferences of Paris, and signed the Treaty of Peace of March 30, 1856.

***CLARK, JOHN FORBES,**
was attached to the Embassy at Vienna, March 23, 1841; was transferred to Paris, July 9, 1846; and appointed Paid Attaché to the Legation at Brussels, February 5, 1852; was transferred to Turin, June 16, 1852, which post he resigned April 7, 1855.

***CLARK, JOHN,**
was Consul at Bilbao from March 28, 1824, till March 31, 1854, when he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

COBBOLD, THOMAS CLEMENT,
was Private Secretary to Mr. Colquhoun, Consul-General at Bucharest, from September, 1853, to April, 1854, from which period, till December, 1854, he was temporarily attached to the Embassy at Constantinople; was appointed unpaid Attaché at Berlin, September 5, 1855; and was transferred to Lisbon, September 29, 1856.

COLES, AUGUSTUS LEOPOLD,
was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office October 10, 1835, and succeeded to a Senior Clerkship July 1, 1854.

***COLLEDGE, T. R.,**
was some years Surgeon to the Consulate at Canton; and on the abolition of his office, May, 1841, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

COLQUHOUN, ROBERT GILMOUR,
was appointed Consul at Bucharest, January 18, 1835; Consul-General, December 15, 1837; and Agent and Consul-General, November 18, 1851; has received the Order of the Nishan Ittihar; was employed in Bosnia in 1854.

***CONYERS, LT.-COL. CHARLES EDWARD,**
entered the Army, December 18, 1810; was some years in 2nd Dragoon Guards; was sometime Assistant Military Secretary in the Ionian Islands; was Aide-de-Camp to the Queen's Commissioner at the Head.

quarters of the Austrian Army, from September 8, 1854, till July 23, 1855; obtained a Majority July 20, 1855; exchanged into 68th Foot, November 2, 1855; was given the local rank of Lieut.-Colonel while employed on a particular service in Turkey, December 21, 1855; exchanged to the half-pay of the 97th Foot, February 26, 1856.

CONYNGHAM, GEORGE LENOX, was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office, from July 5, 1812, till July 5, 1817, when he was appointed to a Clerkship; was *Précis* Writer to Viscount Castlereagh from January 5, 1817, till July 5, 1819; succeeded to a Senior Clerkship in the Foreign Office, May 16, 1834; and was appointed Chief Clerk, April 5, 1841.

***CONYNGHAM (FRANCIS NATHANIEL CONYNGHAM, MARQUESS), K.P., G.C.H.**, served some years in the 2nd Life Guards; became a Colonel, June 29, 1854; was formerly in Parliament; was made a G.C.H. in 1826; was appointed a Lord of the Treasury, April 30, 1827; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, under Mr. Canning, from February 6, 1823, to January 2, 1826; succeeded as 2nd Marquess, December 28, 1832; was made a K.P. in 1833; was Postmaster-General from July 5, to December 31, 1834, and again from May 8 to 30, 1835; was made a Privy Councillor, May 20, 1835; was Lord Chamberlain of the Household from May, 1835, to May 6, 1839.

COOKE, REV. GEORGE REEVES, was formerly Senior Curate at St. George the Martyr, Southwark, and was appointed British Chaplain at Dunkirk, March 15, 1856.

COPE, WALTER, was appointed Consul at Guayaquil, January 20, 1827, and *Chargé d'Affaires* and Consul-General to the Republic of the Equator, October 31, 1854.

CORBETT, EDWIN, was appointed *Attaché* at Paris, June 13, 1847, *Paid Attaché* at Washington, July 7, 1852; at Madrid, August 30, 1854; was temporarily attached to the Embassy at Paris, December 1, 1854, and was transferred to Copenhagen, March 20, 1855.

***COURTENAY, REAR-ADMIRAL GEORGE WILLIAM CONWAY**, was appointed Consul at Port-au-Prince, March 1, 1832; and retired, July 21, 1842, upon a Superannuation Allowance; was sometime Captain Superintendent of Haslar Hospital and the Royal William at Gosport; obtained his Flag, November 24, 1854.

COWLEY (HENRY RICHARD CHARLES WELLESLEY), LORD, G.C.B. was attached to the Embassy at Vienna, October 1, 1824; was appointed *Paid Attaché* at the Hague, April 9, 1829; Secretary of Legation at Stuttgart, January 6, 1832; Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, November 25, 1843; was Minister Plenipotentiary, *ad interim*, in 1845; Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, February 29, 1848; was made a C.B. April 27, 1848; succeeded as 2nd Baron, April 27, 1847; went to Frankfort on a Special Mission, July 29, 1848; was made a K.C.B. March 1, 1851; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Germanic Confederation, June 7, 1851; was made a Privy Councillor, February 2, 1852; was appointed Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at Paris, February 3, 1852; and was made a G.C.B. February 21, 1853; was Joint Plenipotentiary with Lord Clarendon at the Conferences of Paris, and signed the Treaty of Peace of March 30, 1856.

COWPER, HENRY AUGUSTUS, was appointed Consul at Para, March 22, 1839; and Consul at Pernambuco, February 17, 1841.

***COWPER, HON. CHARLES SPENCER**, was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, November, 1834; and Secretary of Legation at Florence, November 22, 1839; was transferred to Stockholm, August 24, 1841, which post he held till September 11, 1843.

***COWPER, HENRY**, was Consul at Pernambuco from January 30, 1830, till July, 1834.

CRAMPTON, SIR JOHN FIENNES, K.C.B. was attached to the Mission at Turin, September 26, 1826; to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, September 30, 1828; was appointed *Paid Attaché* at Brussels, November 16, 1834; at Vienna, May 9, 1839; Secretary of Legation in Switzerland, December 13, 1844; at Washington, July 3, 1845; was *Chargé d'Affaires* from May 29, 1847, to December 22, 1849; and again from August 13, 1850, till January 19, 1852, when he was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Washington; The President of The United States came to the determination to discontinue official intercourse with him, May 28, 1856; was appointed a K.C.B., September 30, 1856.

***CRAUFURD, MAJOR-GENERAL JAMES ROBERTSON**, was gazetted into the 2nd or Queen's Regiment of Infantry, June 14, 1821; upon the reduction of the regiment was placed on half-pay; served as a Volunteer with the Hanoverian Army from February till October, 1822; was gazetted into the Grenadier Guards, August 19, 1823; was Aide-de-Camp to the late Sir Henry Bouverie, in the Northern District, from January, 1831, to September, 1833; served with his battalion during the rebellion in Canada, from April, 1838, to October, 1842; was Her Majesty's Commissioner to the Head-Quarters of the Austrian Army, from January 11 to July 23, 1855, and was given the local rank of Brigadier-General whilst so employed, January 19, 1855; was in command of the Brigade of Guards in the Crimea, with the local rank of Brigadier-General in Turkey from September 25, 1855, till their return to England in June, 1856; became a Major-General, June 28, 1856.

CRAYEN, AUGUSTUS, was attached to the Mission at Naples, November 16, 1830; at Frankfort, August 27, 1833; was appointed *Paid Attaché* at Lisbon, October 21, 1836; at Brussels, May 8, 1839; was Secretary of Legation at Stuttgart, from

December 12, 1843, till November 6, 1851. Was for some months, in 1846, Private Secretary to the Marquess of Normanby, Ambassador at Paris; was attached to the Legation at Naples, October 8, 1855, and remained at his post till October 30, 1856, when diplomatic relations were suspended, and the mission was withdrawn.

CRAWFORD, JOSEPH TUCKER, was appointed a Consul at Lisbon for some time previous to the year 1822, in which year he was Acting Consul-General in Portugal; was appointed Vice-Consul at Tampico, October 14, 1827; Consul, March 24, 1841; Consul-General at Havana, April 2, 1842, and Commissary-Judge, December 21, 1855.

***CROTCH, JAMES**, was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger in 1824, and retired February 18, 1848, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

CROWE, FREDERIC HENRY, was Acting Vice-Consul at Tripoli in 1846 and 1847, and at Bengazi in 1848; was appointed Vice-Consul at Susa, January 27, 1855, and was transferred to Bengazi, December 22, 1856.

***CROWE, GEORGE WILLIAM**, served as Paymaster of the 27th, or Enniskillen Regiment, from March, 1811, in Sicily, the Peninsula, the Waterloo Campaign, and at the Capitulation of Paris; retired on half-pay, in September, 1824; was then appointed Vice-Consul in the Regency of Tunis; Consul for the Morea, July, 1829; and Agent and Consul-General for the Regency of Tripoli, June 9, 1846; which post he held till its reduction, April, 1852.

CROWE, JOHN RICE, was six years in the Russian Service, part of the time under his uncle, Admiral Crowe; was appointed Vice-Consul at Finmarken, in Norway, in 1824, Consul, March 14, 1837, and Consul-General at Christiania, August 16, 1843.

CUMBERBATCH, ABRAHAM CARLTON, was attached to the Consulate at Paris from 1825 to 1828, and to the Consular Department in the Foreign Office from 1828 to 1830, and was appointed Vice-Consul Cancellier at Constantinople, November 17, 1834, and Consul-General there, May 3, 1845.

CUMBERBATCH, ROBERT M., was Secretary to the Consul-General at Constantinople from June 1, 1846, to May 24, 1856; was Acting 2nd Vice-Consul at Constantinople from May 25, 1855, to June 30, 1856; and was appointed 3rd Vice-Consul, May 2, 1856.

CUMBERLEGE, CLELAND, served several years in the 4th Light Dragoons, which regiment he joined in India; accompanied the British Auxiliary Legion in 1835 to the North Coast of Spain, where he served nearly two years—was present at most of the actions during that period, volunteered in the five days' attack on the heights of Arlaban, under General Cordova, from May 22 to 27, 1836, for which he received the Military Order of San Fernando, of the first class. Holds the rank of Lieut.-Colonel; was appointed Consul at Tampico, February 2, 1849.

CURRIE, PHILIP HENRY WODEHOUSE, was appointed a 2nd Lieutenant in the Kent Militia Regiment of Artillery, April 6, 1854; and a Clerk in the Foreign Office, April 10, 1854; was temporarily attached to the Legation at St. Petersburg, May 14, 1856.

***CURTIS, JOHN ROBERT**, was Consul at Cologne from June 11, 1849, till June, 1856.

***CURZON, HON. ROBERT**, was appointed Attaché at the Embassy at Constantinople, and Private Secretary to Sir Stratford Canning (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe), October 25, 1841; was Joint-Commissioner with Lieut.-Colonel Williams to the Conference at Erzeroom for defining the boundaries between Turkey and Persia, from January 27, 1843, to January, 1844. The Orders of the Nishan of Turkey, and the Lion and Sun of Persia, were sent to him, by the Sovereigns of those countries, for his services at Erzeroom.

***DAHLBERG, J.**, was Vice-Consul at Björneborg, from May, 1854, till May, 1854.

***DALKEITH (WILLIAM HENRY WALTER MONTAGU SCOTT), EARL OF, M.P.**, is Lieutenant-Colonel of the Mid-Lothian Yeomanry Cavalry, and a Deputy-Lieutenant of Selkirkshire. Was elected M.P. for Edinburghshire, June 1853; was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

***DASHWOOD, WILLIAM JOHN POPPLE**, was attached to the Slave Trade Department of the Foreign Office, from November 21, 1846, till August 14, 1852.

***DAVIS, SIR JOHN FRANCIS, BART., K.C.B.**, was attached to Lord Amherst's Embassy to Peking in 1816; was Joint Commissioner with the late Lord Napier in China, in 1834; was created a Baronet in 1845; was Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Hong Kong, and Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary and Chief Superintendent of British Trade from 1844, till 1848; was made a K.C.B., June 12, 1864.

***DAWKINS, CLINTON GEORGE**, served as a Clerk in the Foreign Office, from March, 1829, till June, 1846; was Assistant Précis Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen from July 5, 1830, to January 4, 1831, and Private Secretary to His Lordship from September 3, 1841, to June 26, 1846, when he was appointed Consul General in Lombardy, which post he held till October 26, 1852, when his office was abolished, and he obtained a Compensation Allowance. Was Private Secretary to the Earl of Aberdeen, when First Lord of the Treasury, from December 28, 1852, till February 7, 1856.

***DAWKINS, EDWARD JAMES,**

was one of the Commissioners in the Mixed British and Spanish Commission of Claims, from October 4, 1823, to April, 1826; was Resident and Consular Agent at Athens, from September 22, 1828, to January 1, 1833, when he became Minister Plenipotentiary, which post he held till July 27, 1835. Is in receipt of a Pension.

DE BURGH, LORD HUBERT,

was attached to the Legation at Hanover, January 31, 1852; was transferred to Florence, February 21, and to Turin, April 21, 1852; and was appointed Paid Attaché, April 9, 1855.

***DE MICHELE, CHARLES EASTLAND,**

was Consul at St. Petersburg from October 10, 1849, till May 22, 1854; and was reappointed, August 1, 1856.

***DENMAN, CAPTAIN HON. JOSEPH, R.N.,**

entered the Navy April 7, 1823; served on the Mediterranean, South American, East Indian, North Sea, Lisbon, and African stations; while officiating as Senior Naval Officer on that part of the Coast of Africa lying between Cape Verde and Cape Palmas, owing to most offensive conduct on the part of the slave dealers at Gallinas, he entered into a Treaty with the native Chiefs, by virtue of which all the factories were destroyed, the white offenders expelled, and the slaves ready for exportation given up; he then proceeded to Sierra Leone, where the latter, 900 in number, were emancipated; these measures being strongly approved by Government, he was rewarded with Post Rank, August 23, 1841, immediately after the arrival of the official reports in England; he was a Member of the English and French Commission which sat in London in 1843 and 1844 to revise the Instructions for the guidance of Naval Officers employed in the Suppression of the Slave Trade; was some years a Groom in Waiting to the Queen: is now in command of the Royal Yacht.

DE NORMAN, WILLIAM,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Washington, June 16, 1852; was transferred to Berlin, August 17, 1852; was appointed a Lieutenant in the 2nd Royal Regiment of Surrey Militia, May 7, 1853; was temporarily attached, with the local rank of Captain in Turkey, to the Ottoman Horse Artillery of the Turkish Contingent, from June 19, 1855, till July, 1856.

***DE SALIS, JOHN FRANCIS WILLIAM,**

was Attaché to the Legation at Turin from October 4, 1845, till December, 1849.

***DEVONSHIRE (WILLIAM SPENCER CAVENDISH), DUKE OF, K.G.,**

succeeded as 6th Duke, July 29, 1811; was sent on a Special Embassy to St. Petersburg, to attend the Coronation of the late Emperor of Russia, May 5, 1826, and received the Russian Order of St. Andrew; was made a Privy Councillor, April 30, 1827; was Lord Chamberlain from May 5, 1827, to February 18, 1828, and again from November 22, 1830, to December 15, 1834; was made a K.G., May 10, 1827.

DICKSON, CHARLES HANMER,

acted as Vice-Consul at Bengazi, from July 9, 1846, to March 16, 1847; was appointed Vice-Consul at Ghadames, January 31, 1849. Upon the British Expeditionary Force being sent to Turkey, he was selected by the late Field-Marshal Lord Raglan to be Chief Interpreter to Major-General the Lord de Ros, the Quarter-Master-General; was subsequently transferred in the same capacity to Lt. General the Duke of Cambridge, Commanding the First Division of the Army; was present at the battles of Alma, Balaklava, and Inkermann, for which he has received the Crimean Medal. On the Duke of Cambridge's departure for England in January 1855, was attached as Chief Interpreter and Private Secretary to Brigadier-General the Lord William Paulet, Commanding in the Bosphorus and Dardanelles, and on his Lordship relinquishing this command, to Major-General Storks, his successor.

DICKSON, WILLIAM JOHN,

was appointed 3rd Paid Attaché at Tehran, January 13, 1852; and 2nd Paid Attaché there, April 22, 1852.

DORIA, WILLIAM,

was appointed Student Attaché to Embassy at Constantinople, November 15, 1841; 3rd Paid Attaché, March 19, 1845; was temporarily attached to Legation at Tehran, June 6, 1847; and was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché at Constantinople, October 19, 1852.

***DOUGLAS, ANDREW SNAPE,**

was appointed Assistant Private Secretary to Mr. Canning, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in March, 1807; as Private Secretary accompanied the late Earl of Pembroke on a Special Embassy to Vienna in 1807; was appointed Assistant Précis Writer at the close of 1807; Secretary of Legation at the Court of Sicily, June 5, 1809; was Secretary of Legation at Naples, from 1814 to 1821, during which period he was several times Chargé d'Affaires, at Palermo and at Naples; was appointed Secretary of Embassy to the Court of the Netherlands, October 10, 1824; and whilst there, was several times Minister Plenipotentiary, which post he held till January 6, 1829, when he retired on a Pension.

DOYLE, PERCY WILLIAM,

was attached to the Mission at Washington, June 2, 1825; at Madrid, December 9, 1829; was for some months Assistant Précis Writer in 1831; was attached to the late Sir Robert Adair's Special Mission to Belgium, June 19, 1832; was appointed Paid Attaché at Constantinople, March 12, 1834; Secretary of Legation at Mexico, November 30, 1842; was Chargé d'Affaires from April, 24, 1843, to March 30, 1844, from December, 1847, to April 17, 1850, and from October 4, 1850, to December 21, 1851, when he was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary. Diplomatic relations between England and Mexico were suspended September 1, 1856.

***DRAFFEN, JOSEPH WRIGHT,**

was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger in 1819; and retired May 29, 1849, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

DRUMMOND, VICTOR ARTHUR WELLINGTON,
was appointed Attaché to the Embassy at Paris, December 14, 1852; was temporarily attached to the Legation at Madrid, from November 18, 1854, till March, 1855, and from October 8, 1855, till April 9, 1856.

***DUFF, JAMES,**
was attached for some time to the Embassy at Paris. Has been M.P. for Banffshire since April 9, 1837.

***DUFF, GEORGE SKENE,**
was attached for some time to the Embassy at Vienna.

***DUFFERIN AND CLANEBOYNE (FREDERICK TEMPLE BLACKWOOD) LORD,**
succeeded as 5th Baron, November 13, 1839; was created a Peer of the United Kingdom in 1850. Is a Lord in Waiting to the Queen; was attached to Lord John Russell's Special Mission to Vienna, in February, 1855.

DUNCAN, ALEXANDER, B. T.,
was a Clerk in the Consulate-General at Tangier from 1846 to August 1, 1856, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at Larache.

***DUPUIS, JOSEPH,**
was Vice-Consul at Mogadore from 1811 till 1816; Consul at Ashantee, and Member of Council at Cape Coast Castle, from 1817 till 1822; Vice-Consul at Tripoli from 1825 till 1834; at Siâs, in Tunis, from 1837 till 1841.

***DURING, GEORGE,**
was appointed Consul at Trieste, July 17, 1819, and retired October 1, 1832, upon a Compensation Allowance.

***DUTTON, EDWARD LENNOX,**
was Attaché at Frankfort from April 7, 1852, till November 27, 1855.

EDEN, HON. WILLIAM GEORGE,
was attached to the Legation at Stockholm, November 27, 1847; on the death of Sir T. Cartwright, in April, 1850, was Chargé des Archives until the arrival of Mr Gordon as Chargé d'Affaires; was appointed Paid Attaché at Washington, February 20, 1852; at Brussels, June 16, 1852; at Stuttgart, August 14, 1853; and at Stockholm, July 16, 1854.

EDGCOMBE, HON. GEORGE,
was attached to the Embassy at the Hague, April 5, 1821; was appointed Secretary of Legation in Switzerland, January 1, 1828; at Florence, November 16, 1830; again in Switzerland, March 28, 1837; and at Hanover, October 5, 1838; was Chargé d'Affaires from November 15, 1838, to April 3, 1839; from August 19, 1841, to May 12, 1842; from June 9 to September 21, 1843; from August 15 to December 5, 1844; from August 11, 1846, to June 3, 1847; from October 11, 1848, to April 29, 1849; from September 6 to October 6, 1850; from August 21, 1851, to April 5, 1852; from December 30, 1852, to April 12, 1853; from December 30, 1853, to May 6, 1854; from June 16 till August 24, 1855; from December 11, 1855, till February 15, 1856; and has been, since June 4, 1856, was Major in the Royal Cornwall Rangers from February 7, 1826, till August 24, 1855.

EDWARDES, HON. RICHARD,
was employed in the Foreign Office from the Autumn of 1826, to January 5, 1827, when he was appointed to a Clerkship, which post he held till August 17, 1832; was appointed Attaché to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, October 6, 1838, acted as Private Secretary to the Marquess of Clanricarde until August 23, 1841, when he was named Paid Attaché at Berlin; was appointed 1st Paid Attaché to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, October 28, 1841; was transferred to Paris, June 3, 1847; was Chargé d'Affaires from March 21 to 29, and from May 21 to 23, 1849; from July 1 to 20, and from August 12 to September 11, 1850; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Frankfort, December 2, 1851; was Chargé d'Affaires from December 23, 1851, to March 12, 1852; from June 16 to 28, 1853; from December 6, 1853, to March 16, 1854; from November 12 to 28, 1854; and from March 12, to April 30, 1856.

***ELGIN AND KINCARDINE (JAMES BRUCE), EARL OF, K.T.,**
was M.P. for Southampton in 1841; succeeded as eighth Earl of Elgin and twelfth Earl of Kincardine, November 17, 1841; was appointed Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Island of Jamaica and the Territories depending thereon, March 16, 1842; Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Provinces of Canada, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, and of the Island of Prince Edward, and Governor-General of all Her Majesty's Provinces on the Continent of North America and of the Island of Prince Edward, September 16, 1846, which post he held till December 18, 1854; was created a Peer of the United Kingdom, September 1, 1849; was employed on a Special Mission to Washington, in May and June, 1854.

ELIOT, HON. WILLIAM GORDON CORNWALLIS,
was appointed Attaché at Hanover, September 6, 1849; was transferred to Madrid, May 29, 1860; to Lisbon, July 14, 1861; and was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché at Berlin, November 29, 1853.

ELIOT, HON. HENRY CORNWALLIS,
served five years in the Royal Navy, and was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, January 28, 1856

***ELLICE, EDWARD, JUN., M.P.,**
was appointed Attaché at St. Petersburg, July 3, 1832; unsuccessfully contested the Burgh of Inverness in 1835; was M.P. for Huddersfield from May to July, 1837; and has represented St. Andrews since the General Election in 1837; was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant of Inverness, November 11, 1854.

ELLICE, JAMES STUART,
was attached to the Legation at Madrid, December 9, 1845; was transferred to Munich, September 11, 1848; and was appointed Paid Attaché at Washington, September 6, 1854.

ELLIOT, HON. HENRY GEORGE,

was Aide-de-Camp and Private Secretary to Captain Sir John Franklin during his Governorship of Van Diemen's Land from 1836 to 1839; was appointed Précis Writer in the Foreign Office, April 20, 1840; 2nd Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, August 17, 1841; 1st Paid Attaché, June 3, 1847; Secretary of Legation at the Hague, June 26, 1848; was Chargé d'Affaires from August 27, 1850, to July 11, 1851; from November 14, 1851, to February 25, 1852; from April 24 to August 16, 1852; from July 27 to August 6, and from August 18 to November 21, 1853; was transferred to Vienna, December 23, 1853; was Chargé d'Affaires from June 23 till December 4, 1856.

***ELLIOT, HON. GEORGE FRANCIS STEWART,**

accompanied the Earl of Minto's Special Mission to Italy and Switzerland in 1847 and 1848, and Lord John Russell's Special Mission to Vienna in 1855.

ELLIOT, REAR-ADMIRAL SIR CHARLES, K.C.B.,

entered the Navy, March 26, 1815, served in the Mediterranean, and was present at the battle of Algiers; subsequently in the East Indies, Portsmouth, Africa, and West Indies. From 1830 to 1833 was Protector of Slaves and Member of the Court of Policy in Guiana; from 1834 to 1841 was Superintendent of British Trade in China; during the last year, was British Plenipotentiary, and was on board the Nemesis in most of the operations which took place during the war; was Consul-General in Texas from August 20, 1841, till June 27, 1846; was Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Bermudas, or Somers Islands, from September 25, 1846, till 1854, when he was appointed Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Trinidad, which post he held till October 25, 1856. Is a Rear-Admiral and a K.C.B.

***ELLIS, HON. FREDERICK GEORGE,**

was unpaid Attaché at Brussels from March 17, 1851, till August 2, 1855, when he was appointed a Cornet in the 4th Light Dragoons.

ELLIS, HON. GEORGE JAMES WELBORE AGAR,

was appointed Attaché at Lisbon, February 21, 1852; was transferred to Berlin, October 18, 1852; and was appointed Second Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, May 14, 1856.

ELMORE, THOMAS JOHN,

was appointed Unpaid Vice-Consul at Algiers, July 13, 1854, and Vice-Consul there April 1, 1856.

***ELMSLIE, ADAM WALLIS,**

was sometime Vice-Consul at Canton, and has retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***ELMSLIE, EDWARD,**

was for some years Secretary and Treasurer at Canton, and obtained, August 13, 1844, a Superannuation Allowance.

ELTON, WILLIAM JAMES,

was appointed Vice-Consul at Rabat, August 1, 1846, and was transferred to Mogador, 1856.

***EMLYN (JOHN FREDERICK VAUGHAN CAMPBELL), VISCOUNT, M.P.**

was Private Secretary to the Duke of Buccleugh, Lord Privy Seal, in 1841, and Assistant Précis Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in 1842; has been M.P. for L'embrookshire since 1841.

***ERSKINE (THOMAS AMERICUS ERSKINE), LORD,**

was for some time Attaché at Munich. Succeeded to the Peerage as 3rd Lord, March 19, 1855.

ERSKINE, HON. EDWARD MORRIS,

was attached to the Legation at Munich, September 25, 1836; at Florence, December 18, 1837; was appointed Paid Attaché at Brussels, January 6, 1844; accompanied Lord Minto on his Special Mission to the Courts of Italy, from September 18, 1847, till May, 1848; and was appointed Secretary of Legation at Turin, January 10, 1852; was ordered in November, 1852, to proceed from Turin to Florence, where he was Chargé d'Affaires from January 24 to March 25, 1853; was Chargé d'Affaires from June 3 till August 6, 1855.

***EUSTON (WILLIAM HENRY FITZROY), EARL OF, M.P.**

was for some months Attaché at Naples, in 1841; was Colonel of the West Suffolk Militia for a short period in 1846; was appointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Northamptonshire, May, 1846; has been M.P. for Thetford since 1847.

FAGAN, GEORGE,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Naples, June 6, 1837; was Salaried as Paid Clerk in 1839; was appointed Paid Attaché there, May 1, 1851; and transferred to Berlin, April 7, 1852; but was reinstated to his former post at Naples, June 19, 1852; was in charge of the Legation in December, 1853; and was appointed Secretary of Legation at Parma, March 10, 1856.

FANE, HON. JULIAN HENRY CHARLES,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Berlin, September 6, 1844; at Vienna, September 15, 1851; 2nd Paid Attaché, December 24, 1861; and 1st Paid Attaché, July 8, 1853; was attached to the Earl of Clarendon's Special Mission to Paris in February, March, and April, 1856; and was appointed Secretary of Legation at St. Petersburg, May 9, 1856.

***FARQUHAR, SIR WALTER MINTO TOWNSHEND, BART.,**

succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1830; was attached for some years to the Embassy at Vienna.

***FARRANT, LIEUT.-COL. FRANCIS,**

served some years in the East India Company's Army. Was attached to the Mission in Persia, October 14, 1840; and was appointed Secretary of Legation there, December 13, 1844, which post he resigned, March 15, 1852.

FARREN, JOHN WILLIAM PERRY,
was Consul-General in Syria from September 10, 1830, till September 25, 1837; was in charge of the Consulate at Damascus till November 24, 1837; and was appointed Consul at Manilla May 30, 1844.

***FAUCHE, GASPARD ADOLPHUS,**
accompanied the late Sir Charles Bagot to St. Petersburg in 1820; was appointed Consul at Santa Martha in 1825; at Charleston, June 10, 1828; at Ostend, January 5, 1830, and retired June 30, 1841, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***FEATHERSTONHAUGH, JAMES D.,**
was one of the Commissioners appointed to survey the Boundary between the British Possessions in North America and the United States, from June 1, 1840, to February 11, 1842.

FEATHERSTONHAUGH, GEORGE WILLIAM,
was one of the Commissioners appointed, July 9, 1839, to settle and determine the Boundary line between the British Provinces of North America and the State of Maine; and was appointed Consul at Harre, October 27, 1844.

FENTON, HENRY PHILIP,
was Private Secretary to Sir Henry Bulwer whilst Minister at Madrid, Washington, and Florence; was attached to the Legation at Florence, from May 17, 1852, to January 17, 1855, when he was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché.

***FERRIERE, LEWIS,**
was employed in the War Office from September, 1810, till May 7, 1832, when he retired on a Pension; was appointed Vice-Consul at Tunis, August, 12, 1841; acted as Agent and Consul General from June, 1849, to March, 1850, from March to June, 1855, and from July, 1855, to June, 1856; and retired upon a Superannuation Allowance, December 1, 1856.

***FIELD, FREDERICK,**
was sometime Vice-Consul at Caldera in Chile.

***FITZGERALD, SIR EDWARD, BART.,**
as attached to the Legation at Berlin, February 15, 1830; and afterwards to the Embassies at St. Petersburg and Vienna till 1840. Succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1847.

***FITZROY, LORD JOHN EDWARD,**
went, in 1807, with the late Sir A. Paget, on his Special Mission to the Porte, but never reached Constantinople; in the following year, 1808, as an Attaché, accompanied the late Earl of Clarendon to Lisbon.

***FITZWILLIAM, HON. CHARLES WILLIAM WENTWORTH, M.P.**
was attached to the Embassy at Vienna for some months in 1846; was returned M.P. for Malton at the General Election in July, 1852.

***FOLEY, LIEUT.-COL. HON. ST. GEORGE GERALD, C.B.**
entered the Army, June 29, 1832; was some time Assistant Military Secretary to the Commander of the Forces in Ireland; was Aide-de-Camp to Brigadier-General Rose, the Queen's Commissioner at the Head Quarters of the French Army in the East, from April 8, 1834, till August 14, 1855, when he was appointed Assistant Commissioner at the Head Quarters of the French Army in the East; was promoted to be a Lieut.-Colonel for distinguished Service in the field, December 12, 1854; was appointed a C.B. October 16, 1855; was granted, August 2, 1856, Her Majesty's royal licence and permission to accept and wear the Insignia of the 4th Class Officer of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, which His Imperial Majesty was pleased to confer upon him, as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war; was promoted, September 26, 1856, to have the substantive rank of Major, under the Royal Warrant of October 6, 1854.

FONBLANQUE, THOMAS DE GRENIER DE, K.H.,
served eight years with the Army in Spain, Sicily, and Belgium; was appointed Consul for the Channel Coast of France, September 21, 1816; obtained the 3rd Class of the Guelphic Order in 1821; was appointed Consul for East Prussia, January 1, 1822 (which office was abolished in 1832); was named Consul for the Prussian Dominions, February 24, 1836; Consul at Philadelphia, April 24, 1838; and Consul-General for Servia, August 26, 1841.

FOOTE, HENRY GRANT,
during the Rebellion in Canada was employed in carrying despatches; served subsequently with the Niagara Light Horse and Niagara Fencible Militia; was appointed examining clerk in the Secretariat of Bombay, December, 1840; served as clerk in the Indian Navy from February, 1841, till September 29, 1843; was present in the "Sesostris" at the battle of Amoy, second capture of Chusan, capture of Chinghai and Ningpo, and various boat expeditions, at the battle of Chapeo and the bombardment of the batteries of Woosung, and at the battle of Chingkiang foo, and received the China Medal July 10, 1842; was removed to the "Medusa," and for nearly three years was engaged in the survey of the north-east coast of China, and subsequently explored the country between the head of Nimrod Sound to the river Ningpo; was attached to the British Consulate-General in Mosquito, September, 1850; was appointed Chief Magistrate and Captain of the Port of Grey Town, January 1, 1851; Vice-Consul at that port May 24, 1852; was sometime acting Consul; was removed to Salvador, May 6, 1853, and was appointed Consul April 18, 1856.

FORBES, HON. FRANCIS REGINALD,
was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg in July, 1812; at Vienna in September, 1814; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Rio de Janeiro, July 29, 1817; at Copenhagen, December 2, 1822; at Lisbon, November 4, 1823; Secretary of Embassy there, September 20, 1824; at Vienna, March 25, 1828; was Minister, *ad interim*, from July 20, 1831, till February, 1832; and was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Dresden, November 26, 1832.

***FORBES, JOHN,**
was Private Secretary to the Marquess Wellesley, from January 5, 1810, to March 4, 1812.

FORD, FRANCIS CLARE,
served in the 4th Light Dragoons from May 8, 1846, to June 9, 1851, was appointed Unpaid Attaché at Naples, July 9, 1852; was transferred to Munich, July 20, 1863, and to Paris November 8, 1855.

FORSTER, HENRY FRANCIS,
was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office from January 11, 1828, till August 27, 1829, when he was appointed to a Clerkship; succeeded to a Senior Clerkship, April 10, 1854.

***FOSTER, SIR FREDERICK GEORGE BART.,**
was attached to the Mission at Turin, May 6, 1837; was appointed Paid Attaché at Dresden, August 17, 1841; 2nd Paid Attaché at Vienna, March 23, 1844; and 1st Paid Attaché there, December 13, 1844; which post he has resigned; succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1848.

***FOSTER, VERE HENRY,**
held an appointment in the Audit Office from January, 1840, until the Autumn of 1844; was attached to Mr. Ellis's (afterwards Sir Henry Ellis) Special Mission to Brazil from September 26, 1842, to October 11, 1843; when Mr. Ellis quitted Rio de Janeiro in April, 1843, he remained till the following August and discharged the duties of Secretary and Attaché to the Permanent Mission of the late Mr. Charles James Hamilton Hamilton; and was appointed Unpaid Attaché to the Embassy at Vienna, November 7, 1845, which post he has resigned.

FRASER, ALEXANDER,
was Consular Agent in Batavia from September 4, 1848, till July 4, 1856, when he was appointed Consul.

***FRASER, JAMES,**
was for some years Vice-Consul at Bayonne; was Acting Consul in 1842. Resigned his post, September 1846.

FRASER, HUGH,
was appointed Attaché at the Hague, January 15, and was transferred to Dresden, February 23, 1855.

FREEBORN, JOHN,
served some time in the Army, and was appointed Consular Agent at Rome, August, 1831.

FRERE, GEORGE,
formerly one of the Clerks attached to the Slave Trade Department of the Foreign Office, and was appointed Slave Trade Commissioner at the Cape of Good Hope, November 21, 1842.

GABBIEL, EDMUND,
formerly Paymaster in the Royal Navy, and Secretary to Commodore Foote, on West Coast of Africa, and was appointed Slave Trade Arbitrator at St. Paul de Loanda, December 31, 1844.

GALLWEY, CAPT. THOMAS, R.N.,
served some time in the Royal Navy, and was appointed Consul at Naples, June 17, 1834.

GARDNER, SAMUEL,
was appointed Consul at Jassy, in Moldavia, May 19, 1836; visited Silistria in 1837, simultaneously with the Hospodar of Moldavia and Wallachia, after its evacuation by the Russians. After the declaration of war between Russia and Turkey he left Jassy in December, 1853, and resided at Vienna till the evacuation of the Principalities by the Russians, in 1854.

***GELLIBRAND, THOMAS G.,**
was Vice Consul at Omega from March 8, 1849, till September 15, 1854.

GINGELL, WILLIAM RAYMOND,
was appointed Chinese Interpreter at Chusan, November 23, 1843; Assistant Chinese Interpreter at Amoy, Oct. 10, 1844; Chinese Interpreter there, July 1, 1845; has been transferred to Foo-chow-foo; was Vice-Consul in charge of the Consulate there during a part of 1850, 1853, 1854.

***GILBERT, SIR FRANCIS, BART.,**
was Consul at Alexandria from February 11, 1848, till February 11, 1853; succeeded to the Baronetcy, January, 1863.

***GIRARD, EDMUND,**
was Vice-Consul at Revel from April 17, 1849, till May 22, 1854.

GOODWIN, JOHN,
was appointed Consul at the Cape Verde Islands, May 2, 1828; was transferred to Naples, March 19, 1832, and to Palermo, June 2, 1834.

GORDON, GEORGE JOHN ROBERT,
was Private Secretary to the late Sir Edward Disbrowe, at Stuttgart, in 1832; was appointed Attaché at Frankfurt, October 8, 1833; at Stockholm, August 11, 1834; and Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, January 5, 1836; acted as Chargé d'Affaires there from December, 1837, till May, 1838; was employed on a Special Service in Paraguay, from April, 1842, to January, 1843; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stockholm, December 12, 1843; was Chargé d'Affaires from February 14, 1845, to September 17, 1846; from June 30, 1847, to May 22, 1849, and from May 12, 1850, to June 22, 1851; was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and Consul General to the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay, September 30, 1853, but did not proceed; and Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, September 19, 1854.

***GORDON, COL. HON. ALEXANDER, C.B.**

was Précis Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen, from November 25, 1843, to February 17, 1846; was some years in the Grenadier Guards; was Equerry to Prince Albert from March 6, 1846, till February 22, 1854, when he resigned, and was appointed Extra Equerry; was appointed Assistant Adjutant-General to the Army which proceeded to Turkey, February, 1854. Became a Colonel in the Army, February 6, 1855; was made a C.B. July 5, 1855; was appointed Deputy Quarter-Master General, August 25, 1855; was granted, August 2, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Insignia of the 4th Class Officer, of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, which His Imperial Majesty, the Emperor of the French, was pleased to confer upon him as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished service before the enemy during the late war; exchanged to Half-pay Unattached, October 13, 1856.

was some time Assistant Private Secretary to the Earl of Aberdeen when Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, between September, 1841, and July, 1846; and was employed in the same capacity by his Lordship when First Lord of the Treasury; was elected M.P. for Beverley, July 29, 1851.

GOULD, GERARD FRANCIS,
was appointed Attaché at Hanover, January 1, 1854; at Berne, April 10, 1854, and was transferred to Vienna, January 13, 1855.

***GOWER, HON. EDWARD FREDERICK LEVESON, M.P.**
was returned M.P. for Derby in May, and also in July, 1847, which latter election was declared void; was Précis Writer to his brother, Earl Granville, from December 30, 1851, to February 27, 1852; was elected M.P. for Stoke-upon-Trent in July, 1852; was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

***GRACE, WILLIAM,**
was sometime Vice Consul at Mogador, and at Rabat, from 1845 to 1856.

***GRAHAM, F. ULRICK,**
was attached to the Embassy at Vienna, January 1, 1842; was some time in the 1st Life Guards. Is a Captain in the Westmoreland and Cumberland Yeomanry Cavalry, and a Deputy-Lieutenant of Cumberland.

GRAHAM, FERGUS J.,
served eight years in the 2nd Dragoon Guards (Queen's Bays); was ten years Post Master at Carlisle; and was appointed Consul at Bayonne, August 12, 1842.

***GRANARD (GEORGE ARTHUR HASTINGS FORBES), EARL OF, K.P.,**
was Attaché to the Legation at Dresden from December 8, 1862, to December 2, 1854; was a Captain in the Westmeath Militia from November 10, 1854, till December, 26, 1855, when he was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel; was made a K.P., August, 1856, and Lord-Lieutenant of Roscommon, November, 1856.

***GRANVILLE (GRANVILLE GEORGE LEVESON GOWER), EARL,**
was attached to the Embassy at Paris from May, 1835, till August, 1836; was M.P. for Morpeth from 1837 till February, 1840; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from March 7, 1840, till September 3, 1842; was M.P. for Lichfield from September, 1841, till January 7, 1846, when he succeeded to the Peerage on the death of his father the 1st Earl; was appointed Master of the Buckhounds, July 9, 1846; was sworn a Privy Councillor, August 1, 1846; became a Commissioner of Railways in November, 1846; was appointed Vice-President of the Board of Trade and Paymaster-General, May 7, 1848; was one of the Royal Commissioners of the Great Exhibition of 1851; was Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from December 27, 1851, to February 27, 1852; was appointed Lord President of the Council, December 28, 1853; Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, June 21, 1854; a Member of the Committee of Education, July 3, 1854; Lieut.-Colonel of the Queen's Own Royal Regiment of Staffordshire Yeomanry Cavalry, July 11, 1854; Lord President of the Council, February 8, 1855; Ambassador Extraordinary to the Emperor of all the Russias, on the occasion of His Imperial Majesty's Coronation, July, 1856; and Chancellor of the University of London, December 26, 1856.

GRATTAN, THOMAS COLLEY,
was appointed Gentleman of the Privy Chamber in the Royal Household in 1831; was Consul for the State of Massachusetts, from March 1839 till July 1848.

GREEN, JOHN,
was Vice-Consul at Nauplia from May 1, 1835, to February 26, 1838, when he was appointed Consul at the Piræus; was transferred to Alexandria, February 11, 1853; was Acting Agent and Consul-General in Egypt from June 22 to December 19, 1853, and again from July 14 to November 20, 1855.

GREEN, ALFRED S.,
was employed as a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office, from December 19, 1844, till July 1, 1864, when he was appointed a Permanent Clerk in that Department.

***GREVILLE, ALGERNON FREDERICK,**
was Private Secretary to the late Duke of Wellington, when Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from November 17, 1834, to May 10, 1835. Is Bath King at Arms.

***GREVILLE, HENRY WILLIAM,**
was appointed Précis Writer to the late Duke of Wellington, May 17, 1834; and was 1st Paid Attaché at Paris from April 7, 1835, to July, 1844.

GREY, HON. WILLIAM GEORGE,
was attached to the Mission at Hanover, September 5, 1844; to the Embassy at Vienna, October 14, 1844; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché, February 27, 1847; 1st Paid Attaché, June 17, 1849; was transferred to Paris, Feb-

ruary 20, 1852; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stockholm, September 30, 1853; was Chargé d'Affaires from November 7, 1853, to July 27, 1854, and from May 20, till November 26, 1856. Is a Lieutenant in the Northumberland and Newcastle Yeomanry Cavalry.

GRIFFITH, PHILIP,

was employed some years in the Consulate in Albania; was appointed Secretary to the Mission in Greece, September 5, 1828; and Secretary of Legation at Athens, May 26, 1837, where he was some time Chargé d'Affaires; was transferred to Washington, February 12, 1852; was Chargé d'Affaires from July 4 to 19, 1853, and from August 21 to September 11, 1854; was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General in New Granada, September 19, 1854. Diplomatic relations were suspended, October 9, 1856.

GRIGNON, JAMES,

served in the Army; was appointed Vice-Consul at Venice, June, 1847, and Consul at Portland, in the United States, August 7, 1849.

GUARBACINO, FREDERICK,

was appointed Vice-Consul at Batoom, November 19, 1840, was transferred to Samsoon, March 17, 1846, and was appointed Consul at the place and Sinope, September 6, 1856.

***GUTCH, JOHN WHEELEY GOUGH,**

was a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger from October 18, 1843, till January 19, 1854, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***HADDO (GEORGE JOHN JAMES GORDON), LORD, M.P.**

was sometime Attaché at Constantinople in 1837; was elected M.P. for Aberdeenshire in September, 1854.

HAGUE, PATRICK,

was appointed 1st Assistant to the Consulate at Ningpo, December, 1843; and Vice-Consul at that port, April, 1851.

HALE, F. H.,

was appointed Senior Assistant at Shanghai, October, 1843; and Vice-Consul at Foo-Chow-Foo, September 8, 1854.

HALL, EDWARD,

was appointed Vice-Consul at Comayagua in Honduras, May 6, 1853, and Consul there April 18, 1856.

HALL, MAJOR HERBERT BYNG,

served in the 39th Regiment, in the 3rd Light Dragoons, and in the 7th Royal Fusiliers; was for some time attached to the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief of the Army of the Queen of Spain; was decorated with a Spanish Order for Services in the field. Was one of the Royal Commissioners of the Exhibition of 1851; and was appointed Extra Foreign Service Messenger, January 4, 1855.

HAMILTON, FREDERICK,

was appointed Attaché at Buenos Ayres, April 25, 1834; was employed with Mr. Hamilton Hamilton's Special Mission at Monte Video, in 1834 and 1835; and was transferred to Rio de Janeiro, April 5, 1836; acted as Secretary to Mr. Ellis's (afterwards Sir Henry Ellis) Extraordinary and Special Mission to Rio de Janeiro, in 1843; was appointed Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, January 5, 1844; acted for several months in 1846, as Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General, at Monte Video; was appointed 1st Paid Attaché, at Vienna, February 20, 1852; and Secretary of Legation at Stuttgart, July 8, 1853; was Chargé d'Affaires from July 1 to September 8, 1854, and from July 7, 1855, till July 17, 1856.

HAMILTON, WILLIAM,

entered the Navy in 1803; was a Prisoner of War in France from 1805 to 1814; was appointed Vice-Consul at Flushing in 1817; at Ostend, November, 1818; at Nienport in 1820, at Boulogne, April 3, 1822; and was promoted to the rank of Consul, May 7, 1826.

HAMILTON, CAPT. PETER WILLIAM, R.N.,

is a Commander in the Royal Navy; was present at the battle of Navarino, in 1827; at the attack on the Chinese War Junks in 1839; and served with distinction during the operations in the Canton River in 1841; was attached to the Consulate at Boulogne, November, 1842; acted as Consul in August, 1843, and was appointed Unpaid Vice-Consul at Boulogne, November, 1843.

***HAMILTON, TERRICK,**

was for some time in the East India Company's Service; was officially employed abroad in October, 1811; was appointed Oriental Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, July 5, 1815; and Secretary of Embassy, August 20, 1821, which post he held till July 5, 1824, when he obtained a Pension.

***HAMILTON, WILLIAM JOHN,**

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Madrid, June, 1827; to the Embassy at Paris, October, 1829; and was Précis Writer in the Foreign Office to the Earl of Aberdeen from April, till November, 1830, when he resigned.

***HAMILTON, ARTHUR RICHARD,**

was employed from September 28, 1812, till January 12, 1852, as Arbitrator in the Mixed British and Portuguese Commission, established in Jamaica, for the Suppression of the Slave Trade, under the Treaty with Portugal of July 3, 1842, when his office was abolished, and he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***HAMILTON, WILLIAM RICHARD,**

was Private Secretary to the Earl of Harrowby, from April 5 till July 4, 1804, when he was appointed Précis Writer to the Earl of Mulgrave; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from October 16, 1809, to January 22, 1822; was one of the three Secretaries to the Lords Justices in England during the King's visit to Hanover in 1821; was Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Naples, from February 22, 1822, to December 27, 1824, and is now in the receipt of a Pension.

HAMMOND, EDMUND,

was a Clerk in the Council Office from October, 1823, till he was appointed to the Foreign Office, April 5, 1824; was attached to Sir Stratford Canning's (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe) Special Missions to Turkey in 1831, and to Spain, 1832; was appointed Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, April 10, 1854; accompanied Lord John Russell on his Special Mission to Vienna in February, 1855.

HAMOND, HORACE,

served in the 1st Life Guards from February 18, 1828, to September 13, 1834; was some time Aide-de-Camp to the late King of Hanover; was appointed Précis Writer to the Earl of Malmesbury, February 28, 1852; and Consul at Cherbourg, April 1, 1852.

HANCE, HENRY F.,

was sometime employed in the Superintendency at Hong Kong before being appointed 3rd Assistant, in 1855.

***HANNEN, JAMES,**

was Agent in the Mixed British and American Commission, under the Convention concluded at London, February 8, 1853, for the Settlement of Outstanding Claims, from November 16, 1853, till January 15, 1855.

HANSON, AUGUSTUS,

was Consul at Monrovia from August 23, 1850, till May 5, 1852; and was appointed Consular Agent in the Sherbro Country, June 4, 1853.

***HARDY, JONATHAN,**

was Vice-Consul Cancellier at Constantinople, from June 4, 1845, to February 25, 1856, when he retired.

HARRIS, CAPT. HON. EDWARD ALFRED JOHN,

is a Captain in the Royal Navy; has been M.P. for Christchurch; was appointed Consul at Elsinore, August 10, 1852; Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General in Peru, December 10, 1852; and was transferred to Chile, January 17, 1853.

HARRIS, GEORGE,

served some years in the Royal Navy; was appointed by the Earl of Malmesbury to be his Private Secretary, on his Lordship accepting the Seals of the Foreign Office, February 26, 1852; and Consul General at Venice, December 14, 1852.

HARRISON, E. T.,

was Vice-Consul at Maracaibo from July 29, 1850, till August 10, 1855, when he was transferred to Puerto Cabello, but was reinstated to his post at Maracaibo, in 1856.

HARVEY, FREDERICK,

was for some years Secretary and Registrar to the Superintendence at Hong Kong, and was appointed Vice-Consul at Shanghai, December 14, 1854.

HAVILAND, ROBERT,

held a Cadetship in the Madras Cavalry from March, 1821, to February, 1822; was then appointed to a Writership in Sierra Leone, which he held until July 31, 1824, when he was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger.

HAWORTH, CAPT. MARTIN EDWARD,

served in the 60th Rifles from December, 1826, till October, 1842; and was appointed an Extra Foreign Service Messenger, January 4, 1855.

HAY, JOHN HAY DRUMMOND,

was appointed Paid Attaché to the Embassy at Constantinople, May 1, 1840; was ordered to Egypt, June 19, 1840, and remained there till September 23, 1840; when he rejoined the Embassy; was ordered again to Egypt in 1846; was sent to Morocco, July 29, 1844 (though still Attaché to the Embassy) to assist the Agent and Consul-General in carrying on his communications with the Court of Morocco during the French Question, was appointed 1st Paid Attaché to the Embassy at Constantinople, December 13, 1844; Agent and Consul-General in Morocco, March 25, 1845; and Chargé d'Affaires, October 7, 1847.

HAY, FRANK RINGLER DRUMMOND,

was Vice-Consul at Tetuan, from July 16, 1851, till April 29, 1856, when he was appointed 2nd Vice-Consul at Constantinople.

***HAYNE, HENRY,**

was Commissary Judge at Rio de Janeiro from July 31, 1819, till April 5, 1830, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

HENDERSON, CHARLES ALAN,

was Translator to the Legation at Lisbon from May, 1813, to June, 1818; was Private Secretary to the late Mr. Southern from July, 1818, till his death, January 27, 1853; was subsequently Paid Clerk to the Legation at Rio de Janeiro, and Private Secretary to Mr. Henry F. Howard; was appointed Consul in Paraguay, April 28, 1854.

***HENEAGE, DUDLEY,**

served formerly in the 10th Hussars; was employed for some years in Turkey, as Extra Foreign Service Messenger.

***HENEAGE, HENRY,**

was Unpaid Attaché at the Embassy at Paris from May 13, 1834, till 1840.

HERMAN, MAJOR GEORGE FREDERICK, served in the British Auxiliary Legion on the North Coast of Spain, under Sir De Lacy Evans; was appointed Vice-Consul at Bengazi, March, 1848; Consul at Tripoli, January 1, 1852; and was raised to the rank of Consul-General March 26, 1856.

HERRIES, EDWARD, was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Stockholm, October 19, 1811; at Berne, September 8, 1846; was attached to Sir S. Canning's (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe) Special Mission, in Switzerland, in 1847; in 1850 he acted as Chargé d'Affaires at Berne; was appointed Paid Attaché to the Legation at the Hague, May 29, 1850; was Chargé des Archives from August 6 to 17, 1853; and was appointed Secretary of Legation at Berne, October 28, 1854; was Chargé d'Affaires from August 5, till September 16, 1856.

***HERTFORD (RICHARD SEYMOUR CONWAY SEYMOUR), MARQUESS OF, K.G.**, is a Captain in the Army; when Earl of Yarmouth, was attached to the Embassy at Paris, under Sir Charles Stuart, in 1817 and 1819; and also at Constantinople in April, 1829; succeeded to the Marquessate on the death of his father, March 1, 1842; was created a K.G. in 1844.

HERTSLET, LEWIS, commenced his services as Sub-Librarian in the Foreign Office, February 5, 1801; was appointed Librarian and Keeper of the Papers, January 6, 1810; was one of the two Assistant Secretaries to the Lords Justices in England during the King's visit to Hanover in 1821; was Superintendent of Queen's Messengers and Comptroller of their Accounts for the Three Secretaries of States' Offices, from June 30, 1824, till June 30, 1854; his rank in the Office was assimilated with that of the senior class of Clerks, January 5, 1837.

***HERTSLET, JAMES**, was Sub-Librarian in the Foreign Office from January 5, 1811, till March 31, 1855, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

HERTSLET, EDWARD, was employed in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office from March 23, 1840, to January 8, 1842, when he was appointed a Supernumerary Clerk in that Department, was permanently appointed August 28, 1844, and was promoted to be Sub-Librarian April 1, 1855.

HERTSLET, WILLIAM JAMES, was Vice-Consul at Memel from September 18, 1835, till June 7, 1856, when he was appointed Consul at Königsberg.

***HERTZWITZ, ALEXANDER**, was Vice-Consul at Windau for some years previous to September 15, 1854.

HERVEY, HENRY ARTHUR WILLIAM, was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, May 7, 1854, and was temporarily attached to the Legation at Washington, December 26, 1855.

***HESKETH, ROBERT**, was appointed Consul at Maranhão, January 14, 1812; and at Rio de Janeiro, May 7, 1842; and retired, February 21, 1852, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***HEYTESBURY (WILLIAM A'COURT), LORD, G.C.B.**, was appointed Secretary of Legation at Naples, July 31, 1801; Secretary to the Special Mission at Vienna, April 20, 1807; First Commissioner for the Affairs of Malta in 1812; Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Barbary States, January 5, 1813; at Naples, July 5, 1814; at Madrid, April 5, 1822; Ambassador at Lisbon, September 22, 1824, and at St. Petersburg, April 5, 1828, which post he held till August 18, 1832, when he obtained his Pension; was made a Privy Councillor, December 30, 1817, and a G.C.B. in 1819; was raised to the Peerage in 1828.

***HILL, LORD ARTHUR MARCUS CECIL**, was attached to the Embassy at Madrid, in October, 1816; was Précis Writer in the Foreign Office to the late Mr. Secretary Canning, from January 29 to October 22, 1822; accompanied the late Duke of Wellington to Verona in 1822; was attached to the Embassy at Paris in 1823; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Florence June 16, 1824; Secretary of Embassy at Lisbon, January 5, 1825, and at Rio de Janeiro in the same year, on which occasion he received the Commander and Cross of the Order of the Tower and Sword; was Secretary to the Special Embassy to St. Petersburg in 1827; and was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, November 16, 1830, but he declined the post; was made a Privy Councillor, June 22, 1841; was Comptroller of the Household, from June 23 to September 9, 1841, and again from July 7, 1846, to February 28, 1852; was M.P. for Newry from 1832 till 1834, and for Evesham from 1837 to 1852.

HILL, LIEUT.-COL. STEPHEN JOHN, entered the Army November 10, 1825; was promoted to a Lieutenancy, February 13, 1828; became a Captain, April 15, 1842; commanded an expedition 80 miles up the Gambia in 1849; stormed and destroyed the fortified town of Keenung, May 7; and was present at the action and defeat of the enemy on the plains of Quennella. He also commanded a detachment of the 2nd and 3rd West India Regiments in the combined attack of a British and French naval and land force under Commodore Fanshawe, in the attack and total defeat of Pirates, at the island of Basis, Juba River, Western Africa, December 12, 1849. The thanks of the Lords of the Admiralty were conveyed to himself and detachment, and he received the Brevet Rank of Major, February 15, 1850; obtained his Majority, September 9, 1851; was appointed Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's forces and settlements, and their dependencies, on the Gold Coast, April 1, 1851; was promoted to a Lieut. Colonelcy, February 3, 1854; was appointed Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the colony of Sierra Leone and its dependencies, November 6, 1854; and Consul-General in the Sherbro Country, on the West Coast of Africa, November 11, 1854.

HODGES, COL. GEORGE LLOYD, C.B., served through the greater part of the Peninsular War, and in the campaign of Waterloo. Commanded the British and Foreign Legion in Portugal under the orders of Dom Pedro, in 1830 and 1831; was appointed Consul in Servia, January 30, 1837; and promoted to the rank of Consul-General in December 15, 1837; was appointed Political Agent and Consul-General in Egypt, September 27, 1839; on the breaking out of hostilities in 1840, he retired on board the late Sir Robert Stopford's flag ship and assisted in the hostile operations by sea and by land on the coast of Syria; for his services with the British and Turkish forces the Sultan conferred on him the Order of the Grand Nishan, with the rank of General of Division, which favours he received permission to accept, February 18, 1841; was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General to the Hans Towns, May 5, 1841; Plenipotentiary to conclude a Commercial Treaty with the Grand Duchies of Mecklenburg Schwerin and Sirelitz, in 1843; and in 1849, Commissioner, as arbitrator, in conjunction with the Commissioners of Denmark and Prussia, for the Government of Schleswig; for the latter service was made a C.B. March 1, 1851.

***HODGSON, CHRISTOPHER PEMBERTON**, was unpaid Vice-Consul at Pau for some years; resigned March 17, 1856.

HOLE, JOHN BOGER, was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office from August 16 to August 21, 1841, when he was appointed to a Clerkship.

***HOLLAND (HENRY EDWARD FOX), LORD**, entered the Diplomatic Service, July 30, 1831, and was some time Attaché at St. Petersburg; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Turin, July 24, 1832; at Vienna, July 3, 1835; Minister Plenipotentiary to the Germanic Confederation, April 17, 1838; at Florence, December 6, 1838, which post he held till June 8, 1846; succeeded as 4th Baron, October 22, 1840.

HOLMES, GEORGE, was employed as a Clerk in the Foreign Office for some years previous to being appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, November 10, 1824.

HOLMES, W. R., was appointed Vice-Consul at Batoom, March, 1846; and Consul at Diarbekir, November 23, 1852.

***HOME (COSPATRICK ALEXANDER HOME), EARL OF**, when Lord Douglas, was Attaché to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, under the late Sir Charles Bagot, in 1822 and 1823; was Précis Writer to the late Mr. Secretary Canning, from July 5, 1824, till July 5, 1827; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from June 9, 1828, till November 25, 1830, whilst the Earl of Aberdeen was Secretary of State; succeeded as 11th Earl, October 21, 1841. Is a Representative Peer of Scotland.

***HOOD, MARTIN TUPPER**, was employed for some years in the British Consulate-General at Monte Video, before being appointed Vice-Consul there, August 11, 1841; (was employed in the Consular Department of the Foreign Office during the year 1842); was acting Consul-General at Monte Video from June 25, 1846, to June 30, 1848; on the withdrawal of Mr. Ouseley (now Sir William Gore Ouseley), June 8, 1847, was instructed to take charge of the Archives of his Mission till the arrival of the late Mr. Southern, October 6, 1848; was Consul-General at Buenos Ayres from April 22, 1847, till October 16, 1853, when he received a Pension upon the abolition of his office.

***HOOD, THOMAS SAMUEL**, was appointed Consul-General at Monte Video, October 10, 1823, and retired, February 8, 1843, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***HOPPNER, RICHARD BELGRAVE**, was a Clerk in the Foreign Office, from January 5, 1801, to October 4, 1814, when he was appointed Consul-General at Venice, and retired, April 5, 1825, upon a Superannuation Allowance; was Acting Consul-General at Lisbon from December, 1830, to August, 1833.

HORNBY, EDMUND, was Commissioner in the Mixed British and American Commission for the Settlement of Outstanding Claims, from September 10, 1853, till January 15, 1856. Is now employed at Constantinople on the Public Service.

***HOWARD, HON. JAMES KENNETH**, was Précis Writer to Viscount Palmerston from April 27, 1835, to January 5, 1840, and Private Secretary from January 6, 1840, till September 2, 1841; was M.P. for Malmesbury from 1841 to 1852, and was appointed one of the Commissioners of Woods and Forests, March, 1856.

***HOWARD, FREDERICK JOHN**, was an Unpaid Attaché to the Embassy at Paris from May 4, 1831, till November 25, 1839; was M.P. for Youghal from August, 1837, till June 23, 1841; was Private Secretary to the Earl of Carlisle, the First Commissioner of Woods and Forests, from April, 1847, till August, 1850; and was appointed Chamberlain to the Viceroy of Ireland, March 1855, and Private Secretary, June 23, 1855.

HOWARD, HON. HENRY GEORGE, was attached to the Embassy at Paris, May 15, 1838; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché, June 24, 1841; 1st Paid Attaché, June 15, 1844; Secretary of Legation at the Hague, May 23, 1846; at Lisbon, June 26, 1848, where he acted for upwards of a year as Chargé d'Affaires; was transferred to Vienna, January 27, 1851, where he was also twice Chargé d'Affaires; was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Paris, November 30, 1853; was Chargé d'Affaires from May 8 to 20; from December 27, 1854, till January 9, 1855; from April 16 to 21, 1856; from February 10 to 17, and from May 4 to 13, 1856, and from August 29 to September 1, 1856.

HOWARD, HENRY FRANCIS,

was attached to the Mission at Munich, November 1, 1828, where he was several times Chargé d'Affaires; was appointed Paid Attaché at Berlin, December 19, 1832; Secretary of Legation at the Hague, April 6, 1845; was Chargé d'Affaires for several months; was transferred to Berlin, May 23, 1846, where he was Chargé d'Affaires for several months in 1846, 1847, 1849, 1850, 1851, and 1852, and was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Rio de Janeiro, May 3, 1853, and was transferred to Lisbon, October, 10, 1855.

HOWARD DE WALDEN AND SEAFORD (CHARLES AUGUSTUS ELLIS), LORD, G.C.B.,

succeeded as 6th Baron Howard de Walden July 8, 1803; was appointed to a Commission in the Grenadier Guards, April 24, 1818; was Précis Writer in the Foreign Office from October 10, 1822, till July 5, 1824, when he was appointed Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Stockholm, September 21, 1832; was transferred to Lisbon, November 26, 1833; was made a G.C.B. July 19, 1838; succeeded as 2nd Baron Seaford July 1, 1845; and was transferred to Brussels, December 10, 1846.

HOWDEN (JOHN HOBART CARADOC), LORD, K.C.B.,

entered the Army July 13, 1815, and served as Aide-de-Camp to his Grace the late Duke of Wellington during 1817 and 1818, to the close of the occupation in France; was attached to the Embassy in Paris, February 16, 1825; was charged with a Special Mission to Egypt and Greece, July 14, 1827; was present at the Battle of Navarino in 1827; was reattached to Embassy at Paris, November 29, 1829; was M.P. for Dundalk in 1829 and 1830; was charged with a Special Mission to the French Head Quarters at Antwerp, November 15, 1832; was present at the Siege of Antwerp; was charged with a Special Mission to Spain in August, 1834, and accompanied the Spanish Army in the civil war of that year; succeeded to the Peerage, July, 1836; was sent on a Special Mission to the River Plate in 1846, and was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Rio de Janeiro, June 25, 1847; was transferred to Madrid, May 9, 1850; was made a K.C.B., February 23, 1852; became a Major-General, June 20, 1854; is Equerry to the Duchess of Kent; Steward of the Halmot Court of Howden; a Knight Grand Cross of the Spanish Order of Charles III., and a Commander of several Foreign Orders.

HUDSON, SIR JAMES, K.C.B.,

was appointed Page of Honour to George IV., June, 1825; Resident Gentleman Usher to Queen Adelaide, November 21, 1831; Assistant Private Secretary to William IV. in July, 1830, which post he held till the King's death, June 20, 1837; Secretary of Legation at Washington, October 2, 1838; at the Hague, December 12, 1843; at Rio de Janeiro, April 6, 1846; and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Rio de Janeiro, May 13, 1850; was made a C.B. March 1, 1851; was transferred to Florence, August 29, 1851, but did not proceed; and to Turin, January 19, 1852; was appointed a K.C.B. May 2, 1855.

HUGHES, THOMAS FIOTT,

was appointed Student Attaché to the Embassy at Constantinople, May 16, 1845; 5th Paid Attaché, May 4, 1849; and 4th Paid Attaché, October 19, 1852, and Consul at Erzeroom, May 29, 1856.

HUNT, GEORGE SAMUEL LENNON,

was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office from September, 1846, to June 12, 1847, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at Monte Video. Acted as Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General there, from November 19, 1851, to May 5, 1852, and from November 4, 1852, to January 5, 1856; was appointed Consul in the island of Puerto Rico, September 1, 1866.

HUNT, THOMAS CAREW,

was appointed Consul at Archangel, November 13, 1832, and was transferred to St. Michaels, March 2, 1839.

HUTCHINSON, THOMAS JOSEPH,

was appointed Consul in the territories on the West Coast of Africa comprised within the Bight of Biafra, and lying between Cape Formosa and Cape St. John, September 21, 1855, and Consul at Fernando Po, November 22, 1855.

HYE, HEYMAN H.,

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Ghent, from August 1, 1851, till September 1, 1856, when he was appointed Vice-Consul.

***HYNDMAN, JOHN,**

was some years assistant in the Superintendency in China; and resigned 1855

IRVINE, WILLIAM DOUGLAS,

was attached to the Embassy at Constantinople, September 14, 1844; to Lord Cowley's Special Mission to Frankfurt, July 24, 1848, where he acted as Private Secretary and Translator to the Mission; was transferred to Vienna, April 13, 1852, but did not join; was reappointed, July 18, 1853; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché, August 12, 1854, and 1st Paid Attaché, May 14, 1856.

IRVING, FRANCIS,

was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office from May 7, 1846, till July 1, 1854, when he was appointed a Permanent Clerk in that Department.

JACKSON, SIR GEORGE, K.C.H.,

was attached to the Mission at Berlin in October, 1802; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Berlin, September 3, 1806; Secretary to Special Mission to Spain in October, 1808; Secretary of Legation at Berlin, March 30, 1813; Commissioner at Washington, April 16, 1823; Commissary Judge at Sierra Leone, January 16, 1828; at Rio de Janeiro, July 19, 1832; at Surinam, August 11, 1841; and Commissioner at Loanda, December 10, 1846. Is a K.C.H.

***JACKSON, RICHARD BELGRAVE,**

was employed several years in the Slave Trade Department of the Foreign Office; was appointed Vice-Consul at Canton in 1841, and Consul at Foo-Chow-Foo, December 10, 1846; and retired April 1, 1851, upon a Compensation Allowance.

***JAMES, SYDNEY JOHN,**

was Registrar to the Mixed British and Portuguese Commission at Jamaica from January 24, 1843, to January 12, 1852, when his office was abolished, and he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***JEANS, ROBERT,**

was appointed Unpaid Vice-Consul at Catania, November 28, 1847, and was a Member of the Mixed Commission of Claims at Catania and Messina from July 31, 1850, to March 1, 1851.

JERNINGHAM, HON. GEORGE SULARDE STAFFORD,

was employed in the Foreign Office in 1825; was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, March, 1826; at the Hague, November 24, 1826; was appointed Paid Attaché at the Hague, January 5, 1832; Secretary of Legation, June 18, 1833; was Chargé d'Affaires from September 14, 1832, till January 28, 1836; was transferred to Turin, January 5, 1836; to Lisbon, November 1, 1837; was Chargé d'Affaires from May 24 to November 16, 1838; to Madrid, May 25, 1839; was Chargé d'Affaires from November 10, 1839, till April 2, 1840; from September 10 to December 31, 1843, and from June 1 to October 1, 1845, Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, January 21, 1849; at Paris, December 6, 1850, where he was Chargé d'Affaires from February 11 to March 9, from June 29 to July 20, 1851; from January 10 to February 11, from November 16 to 19, 1852; from February 15 to 24, from July 14 to 18, from July 25 to 27, 1853; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Stockholm, November 22, 1853, but did not proceed, and was transferred to Stuttgart, May 20, 1854.

JERNINGHAM, HON. WILLIAM GEORGE STAFFORD,

was attached to the Mission at Munich, January 20, 1834; at Berlin, November 4, 1834; at the Embassy at Vienna, January 15, 1836; was appointed Paid Attaché at the Hague, November 9, 1839; and Secretary of Legation at Rio de Janeiro, May 29, 1850; was Chargé d'Affaires from February 1 to November 8, 1853, and has been since July 7, 1855.

JOHNSON, CAPT. CECIL GODSCHALL,

was some years a Midshipman in the Royal Navy. In 1835-36-37 served with the British Auxiliary Legion in Spain, and was Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General of the Corps of the Army of Cantabria; received the Royal and Military Order of San Fernando, for a Battle on the Heights of Ayerbe, May 6, 1837; the Order of Isabella la Católica of the First Class, for general services in the field; and a Medal for the Storming of a Fort at Yrun, May 17, 1837; holds the rank of Captain; was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, March 19, 1839.

***JOHNSTON, PATRICK F. CAMPBELL,**

is a Deputy Lieutenant of Dumfriesshire; was one of the Poor Law Commissioners in Ireland, and was subsequently appointed one of Her Majesty's Commissioners of Charities in England and Wales; he has acted at different times on several Government Commissions; and was charged from January 17 to May 25, 1851, with a Special Mission to Lisbon, where he was the British Member of the Mixed Commission appointed for the purpose of carrying into effect a Treaty concluded between Her Majesty and the King of Greece, for the settlement of British claims upon the Greek Government.

***JOHNSTON, ALEXANDER R.,**

was in the Civil Service of the Mauritius from the beginning of 1828 until the end of 1833; he then proceeded with the late Lord Napier to China, being appointed his Lordship's Private Secretary; and, in 1835, he became Third Commissioner, which office he held until appointed Deputy Superintendent of the Trade of British subjects in China, in May, 1837; in the latter capacity he was actively employed during the war in China (for which he received the medal), and in Superintending the Trade in the South during the absence of the Chief Superintendent in the North; he also administered the Government of Hong Kong for upwards of a year, from the first acquisition of that island to its being finally taken over by the Colonial Department; since 1843, he filled the office of Secretary and Registrar Superintending in China; and on the abolition of that office, September 25, 1852, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

JOHNSTONE, JOHN HOPE,

was a Clerk in the Foreign Office from June 26, 1846, till May 18, 1848; was appointed Attaché at Hanover, May 15, 1853, and at Lisbon, January 12, 1854; accompanied Sir Richard Pakenham when he proceeded to Lisbon, in August, 1855, on a Special Mission to convey to the King of Portugal, Pedro V., the Queen's congratulations on attaining his majority.

JOHNSTONE, HORACE JAMES,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Bern, January 13, 1855, and was transferred to Brussels, March 7, 1856.

***JOUVE, L. E.,**

was for many years Vice-Consul at Toulon, which post he resigned, October 9, 1864.

***KELLY, PATRICK WILLIAM,**

was appointed Vice-Consul at Lima, February, 1825; and was Consul at Carthage from March 23, 1836, to March 31, 1844, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

KEMBALL, CAPT. ARNOLD BURROWS,

entered the Hon. East India Company's Service as 2nd Lt. of Artillery in the Bombay establishment, December 11, 1837; served in the first expedition to Afghanistan, under Sir John Keane; was present at the capture of

Gusnee and the subsequent occupation of Cabul; was appointed Assistant Resident in the Persian Gulf, February, 1842, and succeeded as Resident April 3, 1852, having officiated as Resident from April 17 to November 15, 1843; was Acting Consul-General at Bagdad, and Political Agent in Turkish Arabia, from July 1 to October 1, 1847, and again from October 16, 1849, to November 30, 1851, and was appointed Consul-General at Bagdad, April 9, 1855.

***KENDALL, W. R. C.,**
was Vice-Consul at St. Michael's, from 1832 till August 22, 1839, and upon the abolition of his office, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***KENNEDY, ARTHUR EDWARD,**
was appointed Captain-General and Governor over the Colony of Sierra Leone and its dependencies, September 13, 1852; Consul-General in the Sherbro Country on the west coast of Africa, August 1, 1864; and Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Western Australia, November 8, 1854.

***KENNEDY, LORD NIGEL,**
was attached to the Legation at the Hague from June 26, 1846, till May, 1861.

***KENNEDY, JAMES,**
was Judge in the Mixed Court of Justice at Havana from February 10, 1837, till December 14, 1852 when he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

KER, RICHARD R.,
was appointed Attaché at Hanover, February 23, 1843; was transferred to the Embassy at Paris, July 11, 1844; upon being elected M.P. for Downpatrick, in 1848, resigned his appointment; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, February 28, 1851; was temporarily attached to the Legation at Copenhagen from March 27, to June 14, 1854; was permanently appointed, January 22, 1855, was transferred to Madrid, March 20, 1855, and was appointed 1st Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, May 19, 1856.

KERR, LORD SCHOMBERG HENRY,
was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Lisbon, July 16, 1854; at Tehran, November 13, 1854; when Diplomatic Relations with Persia were suspended, December 5, 1855, he accompanied the mission to Bagdad, and was transferred to Stockholm, September 16, 1856, which appointment was subsequently cancelled.

KERR, NIVEN,
was appointed Consul at Cyprus, April 11, 1843; was transferred to Rhodes in 1849; and exchanged to Dunkirk, December 8, 1853.

***KINNAIRD, HON. ARTHUR FITZGERALD,**
was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg from July, 1836, to 1837, when the late Earl of Durham returned to England; was Private Secretary to his Lordship, when Ambassador at that Court; was M.P. for Perth from July, 1837, to August, 1839, and was again elected in May, 1852.

***KINSEY, REV. MATHEW,**
was British Chaplain at Dunkirk from April 27, 1853, till he resigned in 1866.

LABOUCHEKE, HENRY DUPRE,
was appointed Attaché at Washington, July 16, 1854, and was transferred to Munich, December 28, 1856.

LA CROIX, ADOLPHUS,
was Vice-Consul at Nice from July 28, 1819, to July 22, 1842, when he was appointed Consul at that place.

***LANCE, JOHN HENRY,**
was Commissary Judge at Surinam from October 21, 1828, till March 31, 1834, when he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

***LARKE, WILLIAM,**
was some time unpaid Vice-Consul at Jarmel in Hayti and at Realejo in Nicaragua.

***LARPENT, O. JOHN JAMES DE HOCHÉPIED,**
was in the Army Pay-office from October 1, 1802, to 1825; was appointed Consul at Antwerp, November 11, 1825; and retired, October 1, 1839, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***LAYARD, AUSTEN HENRY, M.P.**
was Unpaid Attaché at the Embassy at Constantinople, from November 2, 1847, to March 20, 1849, and accompanied Lt.-Col. (now Major-General Sir W. F.) Williams, while engaged in carrying out the details of the Turco-Persian Boundary Treaty; was 5th Paid Attaché at Constantinople, from April 5, 1849, to February 11, 1852, in order to enable him to carry out his researches in the Valley of the Tigris; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from February 16 to February 28, 1852; was returned M.P. for Aylesbury in July, 1852.

***LEAKE, LIEUT.-COL. W. MARTIN,**
served some years in the Royal Artillery, and obtained the rank of Lieut. Colonel; was employed on a Military Mission in 1800, 1801, and 1802; on a Special Mission to Greece and Albania from 1804 till 1807, and again from 1808 to 1810; and on a Military Mission to Switzerland in 1816.

***LEFROY, CHRISTOPHER E.,**
was Commissary Judge at Surinam from 1821 till February 23, 1820, when he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

***LEGH, GEORGE CORNWALL,**

was appointed Attaché at Munich in 1825; was transferred to Turin in 1828, which post he held till 1832; was sometime Senior Captain of 1st Royal Cheshire Regiment of Militia, and became Major of the 2nd Regiment, July 30, 1853; was M.P. for North Cheshire from 1841 till 1847, and has been since May, 1848.

***LENNOX, LORD HENRY CHARLES GEORGE GORDON, M.P.**

was Précis Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen from February 18, 1845, to February 5, 1846, when he was returned M.P. for Chichester, which borough he has represented ever since; was a Lord of the Treasury from February 28, till December 20, 1852.

LETTSON, WILLIAM GARROW,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at ~~Vienna~~ ^{Paris} August 6, 1831 (a ~~Munich~~ ^{Paris} November 4, 1834; Paid Attaché at Washington, December 21, 1840; was temporarily attached at Turin, October 24, 1849; at Madrid, December 11, 1850; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Mexico, July 12, 1854; has been Chargé d'Affaires since May 4, 1855; Diplomatic Relations between England and Mexico were suspended, September 1, 1856.

***LICHFIELD (THOMAS GEORGE ANSON), EARL OF,**

was Précis Writer to Viscount Palmerston from July 9, 1846, to July 5, 1847, when he became M.P. for Lichfield, which borough he represented till March 18, 1854, when he succeeded as 2nd Earl.

***LIDDELL, HENRY THOMAS,**

was some time Assistant Secretary to the Levant Company, and also Consul at Gottenburg, having been appointed to the latter post, June 3, 1826; he retired, January 1, 1847, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***LINCOLN (HENRY PELHAM ALEXANDER PELHAM CLINTON), EARL OF,**

was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1836; was appointed a Cornet in the Sherwood Rangers, August 16, 1856.

LINDEGREN, CHARLES,

served sometime in the Royal Navy; was employed from 1844 to May 27, 1851, in the Consulate at Puerto Rico, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at San Juan; was Acting Consul at Puerto Rico from July 3 to November 7, 1851, and from February 3, 1855, till November 12, 1856.

LISTER, THOMAS VILLIERS,

was Assistant Private Secretary to the Earl of Clarendon from February 22 to August 21, 1853, when he was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office; was attached to Lord John Russell's Special Mission to Vienna in February, March and April, 1855; was attached to the Earl of Clarendon's Special Mission to Paris in February, March, and April, 1856; was appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Radnor, July 18, 1856; was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

***LIVIO, CHARLES,**

was Consul at Wiborg from July 4, 1851, till April 28, 1854.

***LLAMBIAS, JOHN,**

was Vice-Consul at Bona (Algeria) from January 31, 1822, till September, 1827, and again from July 12, 1830, till December 28, 1853.

***LLOYD, ST. VINCENT.**

was Vice-Consul at Ismail from February, 1851, till April 11, 1854.

LOCKWOOD, HENRY,

has served as Private Secretary to Mr. Murray and Mr. Bruce, in Egypt since December 25, 1850; was appointed Attaché to the Embassy at Constantinople, December 3, 1855, but was directed to remain in Egypt.

LOFFT, HENRY CAPEL,

was appointed Attaché at Turin, January 28, 1852, and Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, January 13, 1855.

LOFTUS, LORD AUGUSTUS WILLIAM FREDERICK SPENCER,

was attached to the Mission at Berlin, June 20, 1837; was appointed Paid Attaché at Stuttgart, June 15, 1844; accompanied Sir S. Canning's (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe) Special Mission to the Courts of Berlin and Vienna, March 16, 1848; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stuttgart, January 1, 1852; was transferred to Berlin, May 20, 1853; was Chargé d'Affaires from September 20, 1853, to January 19, 1854, from August 29 to November 22, 1854, and from August 15, 1855, till December 4, 1855.

***LOFTUS, WILLIAM KENNETH,**

was appointed Naturalist and Geologist in the Turco-Persian Boundary Commission, December, 1848; was granted permission, in December, 1851, to be employed under Colonel (now Sir Henry) Rawlinson, whilst superintending the excavations in Assyria and Babylonia; was temporarily attached to the Embassy at Constantinople, September 15, 1853, in order that he might enjoy protection whilst so engaged.

***LONDESBOROUGH (ALBERT DENISON), LORD, K.C.H.,**

served some time in the Royal Horse Guards Blue; was appointed Attaché at Berlin, May 10, 1824; Paid Attaché at Vienna, October, 1825; Secretary of Legation at Florence, February 12, 1828; and was Secretary of Legation at Berlin from July 30, 1829, till June 12, 1831; was made a K.C.H., August 12, 1829; was for some years M.P. for Canterbury; was raised to the Peerage in 1850.

LONGWORTH, JOHN AUGUSTUS,

was appointed Consul at Monastir, September 29, 1851; was employed on Special Service in Epirus and Thessaly, from March to July, 1854; also on Recruiting Service in Albania in April and May, 1855; and was sent on Special Service to Circassia, April 13, 1856.

LORENTZ, HERMAN,
was Acting Consul at Wiborg in 1853, and was appointed Consul, July 8, 1856.

LOUSADA, FRANCIS,
was Précis Writer to Mr. Villiers (now Earl of Clarendon), at the Board of Trade, from July, 1846, till July, 1847; was Secretary to the Commission for enquiring into the Merchant Seamen's Fund in 1848; was appointed Consul at Riga, September 27, 1853, and Arbitrator in the Mixed Commission at Havana, December 21, 1855. *Consul at Boston, vice Graham, returned to Europe, 1858.*

***LOUTH, GEORGE,**
was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office in 1826, and retired, April 5, 1838, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

LOWTHER, WILLIAM, www.libtool.com.cn
was appointed Attaché to the Mission at Berlin, November 4, 1841; and Paid Attaché, April 6, 1845; was transferred to Naples, April 7, 1852; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Naples, July 1, 1852; was Chargé d'Affaires from August 20 till November 28, 1853, and from January 19, 1854, till January 30, 1855. Diplomatic relations between England and Naples were suspended October 30, 1856.

LUMLEY, JOHN SAVILE,
was appointed a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office, August 24, 1841, but was permitted to accompany the Earl of Westmorland to Berlin, as Private Secretary and Attaché, in the following November: was appointed Unpaid Attaché at Berlin, July 5, 1842; 2nd Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, September 4, 1849; 1st Paid Attaché, February 28, 1851; and Secretary of Legation at Washington, October 28, 1854; was Chargé d'Affaires from May 2 to June 4, 1855.

***LUSHINGTON, SIR HENRY, BART.,**
succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1807; was Consul-General at Naples from 1815 till the abolition of his office, April 5, 1832, when he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***LYONS (EDMUND LYONS), LORD, G.C.B.,** *died 1858 =*
entered the Royal Navy, June, 1801; accompanied Sir John Duckworth's Expedition to the Dardanelles in 1804; served in the East Indies from 1807 till 1812, during which time he was present at several actions; whilst in the command of the Rinaldo, he escorted Louis XVIII to France, besides affording a passage to Mr. Planta, the bearer of the Treaty of Paris; whilst in the command of the Blonde in 1828, after blockading the Port of Navarino, he co-operated with the French in the Siege of Morea Castle; for his services on that occasion he was invested with the Insignia of the Order of St. Louis of France, and of Knight Commander of the Order of the Redeemer of Greece; after conveying the late Sir Robert Gordon to Constantinople, the Blonde entered the Black Sea, and was the first British man-of-war that had ever done so; in May, 1832, whilst in command of the Madagascar, Captain Lyons witnessed Ibrahim Pacha's Bombardment of St. Jean d'Acre; and in the early part of 1833, attended King Otho and the Bavarian Regency from Trieste to Greece; was made a K.C.H., January 23, 1835; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Athens, July 2, 1835; was created a Baronet, May 20, 1840; was made a civil G.C.B., July 10, 1844; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, February 9, 1849, and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Stockholm, January 27, 1851, which post he held till he was appointed Second in Command of the Mediterranean Fleet, November 5, 1853; he succeeded to the command on the retirement of Admiral Dundas; was appointed a military G.C.B. July 5, 1855, and Admiral of the Blue during such time as he may retain the command of Her Majesty's ships and vessels on the Mediterranean station; was granted, February 19, 1850, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Grand Cross of the Military Order of Savoy, which the King of Sardinia was pleased to confer upon him as a mark of His Majesty's approbation of his eminent services before the enemy during the late war; was created a Peer, June 23, 1856, by the title of Lord Lyons, of Christchurch; was granted, August 2, 1856, Her Majesty's royal licence to accept and wear the Insignia of the Grand Cross (1st Class) of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, which His Majesty the Emperor of the French had been pleased to confer upon him, as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war.

LYONS, HON. RICHARD BICKERTON PEMELL,
was appointed Attaché at Athens, February 2, 1839; Paid Attaché, October 10, 1844; was transferred to Dresden, April 10, 1852; to Florence, February 9, 1853, and was appointed Secretary of Legation at Florence, February 1, 1856. Is Resident at Rome.

***LYTTLETON, HON. SPENCER,**
served some years in the Royal Navy, and in the Scots Fusilier Guards; was attached to the Legation of St. Petersburg, August 27, 1847, and shortly after resigned; was appointed Master of the Ceremonies of the Queen's Household, January 1, 1847.

LYTTON, EDWARD ROBERT,
was attached to the Legation at Washington, October 12, 1840, at Florence, February 5, 1852, to the Embassy at Paris, August 12, 1854, and was appointed Paid Attaché at the Hague, March 15, 1856.

***MCCAUSLAND, T.C.,**
was attached to the Legation at Stuttgart from June 16, 1852, till July 16, 1853.

MACDONELL, HUGH GUION,
served in the Rifle Brigade from December 22, 1848, till March 11, 1853, and was appointed Attaché at Florence, February 8, 1854.

***MACGREGOR, FRANCIS COLEMAN,**
was appointed Consul in the Canary Islands, January 29, 1826; at Elsinore, January 22, 1830; and at Canton, March 5, 1844, which post he held till July 1, 1848, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***MACKENZIE, SIR KENNETH SMITH, BART.**

was appointed Attaché at Washington, February 8, 1864, but resigned the appointment March 22, 1864; was appointed a Captain in the Rosshire Regiment of Rifle Militia, April 16, 1856.

***MACKINTOSH, EWEN CLARK,**

was Consul in Mexico from April 2, 1842, till September 30, 1852.

MACLAINE, DONALD,

was Consular Agent at Samarang, from April 4, 1851, till July 4, 1856, when he was appointed Consul.

***MACLEAY, WILLIAM SHARP,**

was employed in the Mixed British and Spanish Slave Trade Commission at Havana; was appointed Commissioner of Arbitration, August 1, 1825; Commissary Judge, February 20, 1830; and Judge, April 9, 1836; he retired, February 1, 1837, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

MCLEOD, JOHN LYONS,

served some years in the Royal Navy, and was appointed Consul at Mozambique, February 15, 1856.

***MACNEILL, SIR JOHN,**

was Secretary of Embassy in Persia from October 1, 1835, till June 4, 1836; was for some months Minister Plenipotentiary in 1836; was Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in Persia from June 2, 1836, till August 5, 1842; was some time employed in the Poor-Law Board; and was sent to superintend the Commissariat in the East in February, 1855.

***McMAHON, EDWARD,**

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office in 1819, and retired, January 5 1846, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***McTAVISH, ALEXANDER,**

was Unpaid Attaché at Washington from August 16, 1846, till May 28, 1849.

***McTAVISH, CAROL,**

was some time attached to the Embassy at Paris, having been appointed July 15, 1840; has been M.P. for Dundalk.

MAGENIS, SIR ARTHUR CHARLES, K.C.B.,

was attached to the Mission at Berlin, August 26, 1825; to the Embassy at Paris, August 8, 1826; was appointed Paid Attaché at St. Petersburg, November 13, 1830; Secretary of Legation in Switzerland, October 5, 1838; was Chargé d'Affaires in 1839 and 1840; Secretary of Embassy at Vienna, September 17, 1844; was Minister, *ad interim*, for some time in 1815, 1816, and 1849, and from June 1, 1830, to October 17, 1851; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, January 27, 1851; Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Stuttgart, February 12, 1852; and was transferred to Stockholm, May 20, 1854; was appointed a K.C.B., September 30, 1856.

***MALCOLM, LT.-COL. GEORGE ALEXANDER, C.B.,**

entered the Army in 1825; was Aide-de-Camp to Sir John Malcolm, the Governor of Bombay, from 1827 to 1830; and to Sir Hugh (now Viscount) Gough, during the war in China in 1841 and 1843; received the rank of Brevet Lt.-Colonel, and was made a C.B. for his military services; was Secretary of Legation in China from June, 1841, to November, 1843.

MALET, SIR ALEXANDER, BART.,

was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, March 24, 1824; at Paris, February 21, 1827; was appointed Paid Attaché at Lisbon, December 1, 1833; Secretary of Legation at Turin, July 2, 1835; at the Hague, January 5, 1836; Secretary of Embassy at Vienna, November 25, 1843; Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Stuttgart, September 17, 1844; and at Frankfort, February 12, 1852.

***MALMESBURY (JAMES HOWARD HARRIS), EARL OF,**

was elected M.P. for Wilton in July, 1841; succeeded as 3rd Earl, September 10, 1841; was Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from February 28, to December 27, 1852; was made a Privy Councillor, February 28, 1852; and was appointed Honorary Colonel-Commandant of the Hampshire Militia Artillery, June 22, 1854.

***MANDEVILLE, JOHN HENRY,**

in the Summer of 1801, as Secretary, accompanied to Paris Mr. Merry, the Commissary for Prisoners of War in France; during the absence of Mr. Merry at Amiens, was charged with the affairs of the Prisoners of War, until the conclusion of the Treaty of Amiens; was attached to the Mission at Paris, March 22, 1802; to the Embassy there, December, 1802; to the Missions at Vienna, September 4, 1804, and in May, 1809; to the Embassy at Brussels in June, 1813; to the Mission at Frankfort in December, 1817; was appointed l'aid Attaché to the Embassy at Paris, November 19, 1824; Secretary of Embassy at Lisbon, March 25, 1828; Secretary to Mr. Taylor's (afterwards Sir Brooke Taylor) Special Mission to Rome in March, 1831; Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, June 6, 1831; was Minister Plenipotentiary from August 31, 1831, till May 13, 1833; and at Buenos Ayres from October 2, 1825, till August 6, 1846, when he retired upon a Pension.

MANLEY, HENRY FRANCIS,

was appointed Attaché at Dresden, January 22, and was transferred to the Hague, February 25, 1855.

MANLEY, WILLIAM CAMPBELL,

was appointed Attaché at Berlin, September 6, 1844; Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, February 20, 1852, but did not proceed; and was transferred to Athens, April 10, 1852.

***MANN, HENRY,**

was some time a Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office, and an Attaché to the Legation in Persia from 1841 to December, 1847.

MANSFIELD, BRIGADIER-GENERAL WILLIAM ROSE,

entered the army as Ensign, November 27, 1835, became Lieutenant, August 31, 1838, Captain, February 10, 1843, Major, December 3, 1847, Lieutenant-Colonel, May 9, 1851, and Colonel, June 20, 1854; served with the 53rd Regiment in the campaign on the Sutlej in 1846, and was present at Buddiwal, Aliwal, and Sohraon, at which last he was Aide-de-Camp to the Commander-in-Chief, for which actions he has received a medal and clasps. He commanded his Regiment in the Punjab campaign in 1849, and was present at the battle of Goojerat, for which action he has received a medal and clasp; he was also constantly employed in the operations on the Peshawar frontier in 1851 and 1852, whether his Regiment was in the field or not, and was present at the affairs of Nawadund, Ranghur, and Skarhote, where his horse was wounded; obtained an unattached Lieutenant-Colonelcy, April 6, 1855; was appointed Assistant Adjutant-General in Dublin, February 1855; and was attached to the British Embassy at Constantinople, from June 4, 1855, till July, 1856; was given the local rank of Brigadier-General whilst so employed, June 15, 1855; was appointed Consul-General at Warsaw, September 10, 1856; was given the local rank of Brigadier-General in Poland while so employed, September 19, 1856.

MARCH, GEORGE EDWARD,

was employed for some months as Extra Clerk in the Lord Chamberlain's Office, and was appointed a Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office, April 25, 1855.

MARCH, LIEUT. LEOPOLD, R.M.,

served in the Royal Marines on the north coast of Spain, under Lord John Hay; was appointed Vice-Consul at San Sebastian, December 13, 1852.

MARK, EDWARD WALHOUSE,

served in the Consulate at Malaga from June, 1834, to June, 1840; was appointed Vice-Consul at Santa Martha, in New Granada, July, 1843; and Vice-Consul at Bogotá, June 24, 1846, where he acted as Consul-General and Chargé d'Affaires from July, 1852, to December, 1853, and from October 4, 1855, to March 29, 1856.

MARK, WILLIAM PENROSE,

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Malaga from 1828 to 1836, during which period he was Acting Consul on several occasions, and was appointed Consul, July 23, 1836.

***MATHEW, GEORGE BENVENUTO,**

served in America and the Mediterranean, in 52nd Regiment, the Rifle Brigade, and the 70th Regiment, and entered the Coldstream Guards, by exchange, as a Captain, in 1833; was returned M.P. for Athlone at the General Election in 1835; and represented Shaftesbury from 1837 till 1841. Was appointed Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Bahamas in 1844; Consul at Charleston, March 8, 1850; was Consul at Philadelphia, from July 5, 1853, till May 28, 1856, when his Exequatur was revoked by the President of The United States. Was appointed Consul-General at Odessa, October 31, 1856; *Acting Legation Mexico 1858.*

MATHISON, KENNETH,

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Angostura from February 13, 1841, till January 29, 1845; and was appointed Vice Consul at Bolivar in March, 1847.

MAY, ROBERT,

was Vice-Consul at St. Malo from July, 1847, to July, 1852, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at Granville.

MEADE, HENRY,

was for some time Clerk to the Mission at Monte Video; was appointed Attaché there, March 31, 1856; was temporarily attached to the Mission at Parana, March 31, 1856.

MEADOWS, THOMAS TAYLOR,

was appointed Consular Interpreter at Canton, July, 1813, and at Shanghai, January 1, 1832.

MEDHURST, WALTER HENRY,

entered the Service, October, 1810, as a Clerk in the Chinese Secretary's Office of the British Superintendency of Trade in China; was attached to the late Sir Henry Pottinger's Suite, in August, 1841, in which capacity he was present at the taking of Amoy and Chusan; was left as Interpreter to the Garrison at the latter place from October, 1841, till December, 1842, and received the war medal for his services; was appointed Interpreter at Shanghai, October 7, 1843, on the opening of that port for trade under Treaty; acted as Vice-Consul at Amoy from April, 1848, till August, 1849 was appointed Chinese Secretary to the Superintendent of Trade in China in August, 1850; and acted as Secretary and Registrar to the Superintendency of Trade from July, 1853, till November 9, 1854, when he was appointed Consul at Foo-Chow-Foo.

***MELLISH, RICHARD CHARLES, K.H.,**

was appointed to the Foreign Office, January 5, 1824; and attached to the Embassy at Constantinople from May, 1828, to March, 1830; was for many years a Gentleman Usher to Queen Adelaide; accompanied the Earl of Wilton on his Special Mission to the Court of Saxony in 1842; was appointed K.H. in April, 1842. Retired January 1, 1856, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***MELVILLE, MICHAEL LINNING,**

was appointed Registrar to the Mixed British and Foreign Courts of Commission at Sierra Leone, April 7, 1835; Registrar to the Mixed British and Spanish Court of Justice at that place, April 9, 1836; Commissioner of Arbitration, February 20, 1841; and Commissary Judge at Sierra Leone, April 12, 1842, which latter post he held till January 1, 1849, when he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

MERLIN, C. L. W.,

served as Chancellerie to the Consulate of Continental Greece for seven years; has several times had charge of that Consulate; was appointed Vice-Consul for the Piræus, March 10, 1846; was named Vice-Consul for the District of Attica and Bœotia, to reside at Athens, February 11, 1854; was employed as British Agent of a Mixed Commission to the Frontiers of Greece and Turkey, to obtain the return of the Greek Insurgent Chiefs, after King Otho's declaration of strict neutrality on the occupation of the Piræus by the English and French forces, in May, 1834.

***MEYER, WILLIAM,**

was Secretary to Sir S. Foresti, British Resident to the Ionian Republic, in 1804; was attached to Sir Robert Adair's Special Embassy to Constantinople, December, 1808; was appointed Colonial Secretary to the Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands in 1813; and was appointed Consul-General in Albania, April 28, 1819; upon the abolition of his office, April 1, 1835, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

MIDDLETON, ROBERT THOMAS CHARLES,

accompanied Lord Howden as private Secretary to the River Plate and Brazil in 1847, and to Madrid in May, 1850; was appointed Unpaid Attaché to the Legation at Madrid, February 21, 1852, and was employed on Special Service in Galicia in June, 1855, and was appointed Paid Attaché at Madrid, May 15, 1856.

MILBANKE, SIR JOHN RALPH, BART.,

was appointed to a Clerkship in the Foreign Office, October 10, 1823; Secretary of Legation at Frankfort, September 22, 1826, was Chargé d'Affaires in 1826, and at other periods for more than two years and a-half; was transferred to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, November 3, 1835; was Minister, *ad interim*, from June, 1837, till October, 1838, was transferred to Vienna, October 2, 1838; was Minister, *ad interim*, in 1838; and was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Munich, November 24, 1843. Succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1850.

MILLER, GEORGE CHARLES,

was Pro-Consul at Tabriz from February, 1845, to April 9, 1850, when he was appointed Consul for the Georgian and Windward Islands.

***MILLER, WILLIAM,**

was Vice-Consul at St. Petersburg from April 7, 1841, till May 22, 1854.

***MILLER, WILLIAM,**

served in the Field Train Department of the Royal Artillery from January 1, 1811, until the Peace of 1815, was present in several of the Sieges and Actions in the Peninsular War, and also in North America. Entered the Buenos Ayres Artillery in 1817, served in Chile and Peru against the Royalist Forces: was raised to the rank of General of Division, April 8, 1823; during 1824 and 1825 was under the command of General Bolívar; was appointed Consul-General in the Sandwich Islands and other Islands in the Pacific, August 16, 1843; and Commissioner and Consul-General in the Sandwich Islands and their dependencies, December 1, 1855.

***MINCHIN, JOHN SQUIRE,**

served in the Army before being appointed Vice-Consul at Fayal, in June, 1835; resigned March 31, 1856.

***MINTO (GILBERT ELLIOT MURRY KYNYNMOND ELLIOT), EARL OF, G.C.B.,**

succeeded as 2nd Earl, June 21, 1814; was made a Privy Councillor, May 30, 1832; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Berlin, August 22, 1832; was First Lord of the Admiralty from September 25, 1835, till September 7, 1841; was Lord Privy Seal from July 6, 1846, till February 27, 1852; was sent on a Special Mission to Italy and Switzerland, September 14, 1847.

***MOLYNEUX, HON. FRANCIS GEORGE,**

was a Clerk in the Foreign Office from August 21, 1827, to November 13, 1835, when he was appointed Secretary of Legation at Frankfort, which post he held till January 5, 1849.

MOORE, JOHN,

served as Clerk in the Commander-in-Chief's Office from April, 1814, till November 1, 1824, when he was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger.

MOORE, NIVEN,

was appointed Chancellor to the Embassy at Constantinople, November 17, 1822; Consul at Beyrout, January 13, 1835; was transferred to Aleppo, May 15, 1841; was reappointed to Beyrout, November 27, 1841; acted as Consul-General in Syria from December 5, 1848, to June 12, 1850; and was raised to that rank, December 13, 1853.

MOORE, NOEL TEMPLE,

acted for some time as Councillor to Colonel (now Sir Hugh) Rose, when Consul-General in Syria; was attached to the Consulate at Beyrout, from May, 1851, till October 1, 1855, when he was appointed Vice-Consul there; as Secretary-Interpreter accompanied Lord Napier when sent on Special Service to Jerusalem in April, 1855.

MOORE, CAPT. HENRY,

served in the 69th Regiment from July 6, 1815, till April 23, 1826, when he obtained an unattached Company, and was appointed Unpaid Vice-Consul at St. Valéry-sur-Somme, February 16, 1848.

MORGAN, JOHN,

acted as Pro-Consul in Rio de Janeiro from 1816 to 1818; was employed as Translator to the Legation at Rio de Janeiro from 1847 till October, 1850, when he was appointed Translator and Clerk.

MORGAN, JOHN,

was attached to the Legation at Rio de Janeiro from March 1, 1845, to April 30, 1847, and was employed during that time as Translator; was appointed Consul at Rio Grande do Sul, May 23, 1847, and transferred to Bahia January 12, 1852.

***MORIER, DAVID,**

in January, 1804, went out as Secretary to the Political Mission sent to Ali, Pasha of Joannina, and to the Turkish Governors of the Morea and adjacent Provinces of the Ottoman Empire; in May, 1807, was ordered to take charge of that Mission, and on the continuance of the then existing rupture with the Porte, was attached to the late Sir Arthur Pigot's Mission, sent to the Dardanelles to negotiate the restoration of Peace, on which occasion he was despatched on special service to Egypt to effect the liberation of the British Prisoners, taken by Mehemet Ali Pasha, in the expedition against Rosetta; in the summer of 1808, was ordered to join Mr. Adair's (now Sir Robert) Embassy, by whom he was sent forward to the Pasha of the Dardanelles, preliminary to the opening of the Negotiations which issued in the Treaty of Peace with the Porte, of January, 1809; in August, 1809, was sent by Mr. Adair on special service to the Mission in Persia, then at Tabreez, whence, on the termination of Mr. Adair's Embassy, he was called back in July 1810, to fulfil the duties of Secretary to the Mission under Mr. Stratford Canning (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe), who was at that time Minister Plenipotentiary, till its close in June, 1812; in 1813, was attached to the Earl of Aberdeen's Embassy to the Court of Austria; was employed in the business of Lord Castlereagh's (afterwards 2nd Marquess of Londonderry) Extraordinary Mission to the Conferences at Chatillon-sur-Seine, and in the Treaties of Paris of May, 1814; in the autumn of 1814, formed part of Lord Castlereagh's Extraordinary Mission to the Congress of Vienna, and was subsequently employed in it under the late Duke of Wellington; in July, 1815, accompanied Lord Castlereagh to Paris, and was employed in the business of the Negotiations for the final Treaties of Peace with France, until September, when he took possession of the post of Consul-General in France (to which he had been appointed in November, 1814), and was named one of the Commissioners under the Separate Convention with France, for the Settlement of the Claims of British subjects on the French Government; held the post of Consul-General in France, till the abolition of that office in December, 1831, when he retired upon a Pension, which ceased on his nomination as Minister Plenipotentiary to the Confederate Swiss Cantons, June 5, 1832, which Mission he held till June 19, 1847, when he retired upon the same Pension.

MORIER, GREVILLE,

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, August 26, 1813; was attached to Lord Howden's Special Mission to the River Plate, March 25, 1847, and remained absent from the office till August, 1848.

***MORNINGTON (WILLIAM POLE TILNEY LONG-WELLESLEY), EARL OF,**

was for some time in 1807 Secretary of Embassy and Minister Plenipotentiary at Constantinople, and afterwards as Secretary, conjointly with Mr. Stratford Canning (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe), attended Mr. Merry's Mission to Copenhagen; has been M.P. for St. Ives, Epsom, and South Wiltshire; succeeded as 4th Earl, February 22, 1845.

MORRISON, GEORGE STAUNTON,

proceeded to China in January, 1828, as Student Interpreter; was Acting 2nd Assistant at Amoy from January till June, 1829, when he was appointed 4th Assistant to the Superintendent; became 3rd Assistant in 1851; went to Canton in 1852 as 2nd Assistant; became Acting 1st Assistant at Amoy in December, 1852, and was removed to Shanghai in February, 1855, and was appointed Chief Assistant and Keeper of the Records in the Superintendency at Hong Kong, April 2, 1856.

***MORTON (GEORGE SHOLTO DOUGLAS), EARL OF,**

was attached to the Mission in Spain in 1811; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stockholm, July 5, 1812; at Florence, October 10, 1814; and at Berlin, February 17, 1816, which post he held till January 5, 1825, when he obtained his Pension; succeeded as 17th Earl, July 17, 1827; was a Lord in Waiting to the Queen from September 10, 1811, to June 15, 1849. Is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Middlethian; and was appointed Vice-Lieutenant of that county, November 10, 1854.

***MUNDY, FRANCIS NOEL,**

was Attaché at Brussels, from October 20, 1855, till March, 1856.

MUNRO, MAJOR JAMES ST. JOHN,

entered the Army in 1827 as 2nd Lieutenant in the 60th Royal Rifles; obtained his Lieutenantcy in 1832, and his Commission in 1837; purchased an unattached Majority in 1846, and sold out of the Army as Senior Major of the 31st Regiment in 1849; was appointed Extra Foreign Service Messenger, April 17, 1855.

MURPHY, BARNABY,

was Spanish Consul in Dublin, from March, 1847, to October, 1851; was appointed Vice-Consul at Alexandretta, May 20, 1855; was removed to Latakia, October 23, 1855, and was appointed Consul at Bilbao, April 15, 1856.

MURRAY, HON. CHARLES AUGUSTUS, C.B.,

formerly Master of Her Majesty's Household, and has been Extra Groom in Waiting to the Queen since December 31, 1811; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Naples, December 31, 1814; Consul-General in Egypt, May 27, 1818; was made a C.B. April 27, 1818; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, February 9, 1823; and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Tebriz, September 3, 1851. Mr. Murray suspended diplomatic relations with Persia, December 5, 1855, and retired with the Mission to Bagdad.

MURRAY, JAMES,

was appointed a Clerk in the Navy Pay Office, August 23, 1823; was transferred to the Foreign Office, November 11, 1826, and succeeded to a Senior Clerkship October 1, 1851.

MURRAY, JOHN JOSEPH,

was private Secretary to Colonel Walpole when Chargé d'Affaires in Chile, from December 10, 1841, to August, 1847; was Acting Vice-Consul at Caldera, from January 1 till August 11, 1855, when he was appointed Vice-Consul.

MURRAY, HENRY JOHN, was employed in the Audit Office from 1834 till he was appointed Vice-Consul at Tangier in 1841; was appointed Consul in the Canary Islands, August 13, 1850.

MURRAY, EUSTACE CLARE GRENVILLE, was attached to the Legation at Vienna, July 14, 1851; was transferred to Hanover, April 7, 1852; was appointed 5th Paid Attaché at Constantinople, October 19, 1852; and was Acting Vice-Consul at Mytilene from October 25, 1853, till July 3, 1854.

NAPIER (FRANCIS NAPIER), LORD, was attached to the Embassy at Vienna, August 10, 1840; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché at Tehran, September 23, 1842, but did not proceed; 3rd Paid Attaché at Constantinople, January 13, 1843; 2nd Paid Attaché, December 13, 1844; 1st Paid Attaché, May 19, 1845; Secretary of Legation at Naples, May 27, 1846; was Chargé d'Affaires in 1848 and 1849; was transferred to St. Petersburg, April 7, 1852; upon the withdrawal of the Mission in February, 1854, he returned to England, and was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, April 18, 1854.

NEALE, LT.-COL. EDWARD ST. JOHN, entered the Liberating Army of Portugal, September 20, 1832; served at the Siege of Oporto, and in the Campaigns of 1833 and 1834, and was present in command of a Company in every action in which the British Troops in the service of Portugal were engaged during that period; withdrew from the Service of the Queen of Portugal, March 10, 1835. Entered the British Auxiliary Legion of Spain, July 5, 1835; was Aide-de-Camp to Brigadier-General Sir Charles Shaw, and subsequently Brigade Major of the Light Brigade; took an active part in the several engagements and sorties before San Sebastian and Vittoria; was promoted to the rank of Major, May 6, 1836, and of Lieutenant-Colonel, January 19, 1837; has received the Spanish Royal Military Order of St. Ferdinand of the 1st Class, and a medal for the assault and capture of St. Sebastian, May 5, 1836; he retired from the Legion to proceed, with Colonel Hodges, to Servia, in May, 1837; and was attached to the Consulate-General for nearly two years; was in charge of it for eight months, during the absence of Colonel Hodges on duty at Constantinople; was appointed Vice Consul at Alexandretta, February 22, 1841; and Consul at Varna, May 28, 1847.

NEALE, WILLIAM BEAVER, was appointed Vice-Consul at Alexandretta, November, 1847, and Consul at the Piræus, May 16, 1853.

NEWMAN, HENRY, was appointed Consul at Charleston, March 16, 1824; and was transferred to Nantes, June 10, 1828.

***NICOLAS, WERE GIFFARD**, was appointed Consul at Mobile, May 25, 1848, and transferred to Vigo, December 17, 1852, which post he held till March 31, 1856.

NICOLAS, BUSVARGUS TOUP, was employed in the Ordnance Department from October, 1840, till September 29, 1851, when he was appointed Consul at the Society or Leeward Islands.

NORMANDY (CONSTANTINE HENRY PHIPPS), MARQUESS OF, K.G., G.C.B., entered Parliament early in life, succeeded his father as Earl of Mulgrave, April 7, 1831; was appointed Governor of Jamaica, March 13, 1832; was made a Privy Counsellor, May 15, 1832; Keeper of the Privy Seal, July 30, 1834; in April, 1835, was appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; was created Marquess of Normandy, June 20, 1838; was appointed Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, February 20, and Secretary of State for the Home Department, August 30, 1839, which post he held till September 3, 1841; was Ambassador at Paris from August 12, 1846, till February 2, 1852; was made a G.C.B., December 10, 1847; and a K.G. in April, 1851; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Florence, December 16, 1854.

NORRIS, EDWIN, was a Clerk in the East India House from 1825 to 1836; was appointed Assistant Secretary to the Royal Asiatic Society in 1836; and Translator in the Foreign Office, May 29, 1847.

NORTON, FLETCHER CAVENDISH CHARLES CONYERS, was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Lisbon, December 7, 1847; at Naples, November 6, 1849; at Brussels, February 23, 1850; at Naples, July 31, 1851; 2nd Paid Attaché at Vienna, July 8, 1853; and 2nd Paid Attaché at Paris, August 12, 1854.

***O'CONNELL, DANIEL, M.P.** was an unsuccessful Candidate for Carlow County in 1841; was M.P. for Dundalk, from August, 1846, till July, 1847, and for Waterford, from July, 1847, till April, 1848; was Consul at Para, from August 31, 1850, till February 21, 1852; was returned M.P. for Tralee in September, 1853.

***OGILBY, WILLIAM**, was appointed to the Consulsip of Carn, for the District of Lower Normandy, November 21, 1821; was promoted to the Consulsip of Charleston, for the District of North and South Carolina, November 2, 1829; and retired, June 4, 1845, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***OGLANDER, ROBERT**, was for some years Consul-General at Tunis, and retired, June 3, 1824, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***O'KELL, JOSEPH**, was Vice-Consul at Settini from October 12, 1849, till September 1, 1853.

OOM, ADOLPHUS KENT, was appointed a Clerk in the Mixed British and Spanish Commission, October 10, 1823, and a Clerk in the Foreign Office, April 5, 1824; succeeded to a Senior Clerkship, December 12, 1845.

***ORFORD (HORATIO WALPOLE), EARL OF**, when Lord Walpole, was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, in October, 1806; to the Mission in Spain in 1808; was appointed Secretary of Embassy at St. Petersburg, July 5, 1812, which post he held till April 5, 1825, when he obtained his Pension; succeeded as 3rd Earl, November 15, 1822.

ORME, FREDERICK DOVETON, was appointed Attaché at Munich, March 10, 1841; Paid Attaché at Frankfort, January 5, 1844, where he was several times Chargé d'Affaires; and Secretary of Legation at Copenhagen, December 14, 1852, where he was Chargé d'Affaires from September 5 till November 11, 1855, and from July 3 to August 16, 1856.

OTWAY, LOFTUS CHARLES, C.B., was attached to the Mission at Stockholm, November 2, 1830; to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, July 16, 1833; to the Mission at Madrid, August 26, 1834; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché at Vienna, January 5, 1813, but did not proceed; Paid Attaché at Lisbon, June 3, 1813; at Madrid, July 14, 1845; Secretary of Legation at Madrid, May 9, 1850; was Chargé d'Affaires from May 31 to December 9, 1852, from May 30 to December 1, 1853, from June 2 to August 1, 1854; from June 24 till October 13, 1855; from June 30, 1856, till October 30, 1856, was made a C.B., September 21, 1854. Is a Deputy-Lieutenant for Radnorshire.

***OUSELEY, H. C.**, was appointed Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, June 6, 1838; and Paid Attaché at Monte Video, January 1, 1816, which post he held for a few years.

***OUSELEY, SIR WILLIAM GORE, K.C.B.**, was attached to the Mission at Stockholm, November 12, 1817; was appointed Paid Attaché at Washington, November 19, 1825; was attached to Sir Robert Adair's Special Mission to Belgium in 1832, and acted for some time as Secretary of Legation at Brussels; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Rio de Janeiro, June 1, 1828, where he was Chargé d'Affaires for several years; was sent out a second time to Rio de Janeiro as Chargé d'Affaires in 1838; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Buenos Ayres, December 13, 1844; was employed on a Special Mission to Monte Video in 1846 and 1847; is in the receipt of a Pension; and was made a K.C.B., June 29, 1852.

***OUSELEY, WILLIAM CHARLES**, as Attaché accompanied Sir Charles Hotham's Special Mission to the River Plate in 1852 and 1853.

PAGET, AUGUSTUS BERKELEY, was some time employed in the Secretary's Department of the General Post Office, and also in the Audit Office, before being appointed to the Foreign Office, August 21, 1841; was temporarily attached to the Mission at Madrid, December 2, 1843, where he was some time Chargé des Archives; was appointed Précis Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen, February 6, 1846; 2nd Paid Attaché at Paris, June 26, 1846; 1st Paid Attaché, December 18, 1851, and Secretary of Legation at Athens, February 12, 1852; was ordered, November 8, 1852, to proceed from Athens to Egypt; and was in charge of the Consul-Generalship from December 8, 1852, till February 19, 1853, during the absence of Mr. Murray, but was ordered to remain in Egypt till May 27, 1853; and was transferred to the Hague, January 14, 1854, was Chargé d'Affaires from May 7 till October 21, 1855; and from July 30 till August 24, 1856.

***PAKENHAM, RT. HON. SIR RICHARD, K.C.B.** was attached to the Embassy at the Hague, October 15, 1817; and appointed Secretary of Legation in Switzerland, February 6, 1821; in Mexico, January 13, 1826; Minister Plenipotentiary in Mexico, March 12, 1835; was made a Privy Councillor, December 13, 1843; was Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Washington from December 14, 1843, till May 29, 1847; was made a K.C.B., April 27, 1848; was Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Lisbon, from April 28, 1851, till June 28, 1855; and was appointed, August 17, 1855, to proceed to Lisbon, on a Special Mission, to convey to the King of Portugal, Pedro V., the Queen's congratulations on attaining his majority.

PAKENHAM, HON. FRANCIS JOHN, was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Lisbon, February 9, 1852, and Paid Attaché at Mexico, October 24, 1854.

***PALMEDO, ADOLPHUS P.**, was appointed Secretary of Legation at Turin in 1811; Acting Consul at Genoa in 1814; Consul in Corsica, November 9, 1816; and retired January 1, 1843, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***PALMERSTON (HENRY JOHN TEMPLE), VISCOUNT, K.G., G.C.B.** succeeded as 3rd Viscount, April 17, 1802; was appointed Secretary at War, October 27, 1809, which office he held till May 31, 1828; was made a Privy Councillor, November 1, 1809; upon the formation of a Cabinet by the late Earl Grey, was appointed Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, November 23, 1830; he held the Seals of that office till November 21, 1834, when he was succeeded by the late Duke of Wellington; was again appointed Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, April 18, 1835, under the late Viscount Melbourne's Administration; his Lordship resigned with the rest of the Cabinet in September, 1841; upon the formation of Lord John Russell's Cabinet, Lord Palmerston was for the third time appointed to his former post, July 6, 1846; and in December, 1851, he resigned; upon the formation of Lord Aberdeen's Cabinet in December, 1852, Lord Palmerston was appointed Secretary of State for the Home Department; was appointed First Lord of the Treasury, February 8, 1855, and one of a Committee of Council to superintend the application of any sums of money voted by Parliament for the purpose of promoting Public Education, February 28, 1855; was M.P. for the University of Cambridge from 1806 till 1831; for Bletchingley from 1831 till 1832; for South Hants from 1832 to December, 1834; and has sat for Tiverton since June, 1835; was made a K.G. July 12, 1856.

***PARISH, SIR WOODBINE, K.C.H.,**

was employed with the late Lord Castlereagh on his Extraordinary Embassy to Paris in 1815, and afterwards as Assistant to his Private Secretary; in 1816 and 1817 was in Greece, upon the Commission to obtain indemnities from Ali Pasha for the Parganots; in October, 1817, was appointed to a Clerkship in the Foreign Office; in 1818 accompanied Lord Castlereagh to the Conference at Aix-la-Chapelle, and in 1820 went with him to Hanover, when in attendance upon George IV.; in October, 1823, was appointed Commissioner and Consul-General at Buenos Ayres; and, in 1824, Plenipotentiary for the Treaty of Amity and Commerce concluded with the Provinces of Rio de la Plata; to which Provinces he was appointed Chargé d'Affaires in 1825; upon the abolition of his office of Consul-General at Buenos Ayres, July 1, 1832, he obtained a Compensation Allowance; after his return from South America, in 1832, he was made a K.C.H., by William IV.; in 1833 was appointed Commissioner for investigating the French charges upon British shipping; in 1840 and 1841, was Chief Commissioner at Naples for settling the British claims arising out of the Sulphur Monopoly; from 1842 to 1845, was Joint Plenipotentiary with Mr. (afterwards Sir William) Temple, for a new Commercial Treaty with the King of the Two Sicilies.

***PARISH, HENRY HEADLEY,**

accompanied Mr. Stratford Canning (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe) on his Mission to the United States in July, 1820; was appointed Paid Attaché at Washington in 1823; was attached to Mr. Stratford Canning's Special Missions to Vienna and St. Petersburg in 1824; was appointed Paid Attaché at Constantinople in 1825; attended the late Sir Robert Gordon on his being appointed Ambassador to the Porte in April, 1829, and acted for some time as Secretary of Embassy; was Secretary of Legation in Greece from November 11, 1830, till May, 1834.

PARISH, FRANK,

was employed at Canton from January, 1842, to June, 1843, by the Plenipotentiaries for the Commercial Treaty with that country. In January, 1844, was appointed to the Consular Establishment in China, and was successively employed at Amoy, Ningpo, Foochow, and Shanghai, till 1852. Acted as Vice-Consul at Canton till April 23, 1852, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at Buenos Ayres; has been Acting Consul-General since August 4, 1854.

PARKES, HARRY SMITH,

was attached to the suite of the late Sir Henry Pottinger, and was present at Nanking during the negotiations for peace with China, in June, 1842; served as Interpreter at various ports in China until 1853; officiated as Vice-Consul and Consul at Canton, previous to being appointed Consul at Amoy, August 13, 1854; accompanied Sir John Bowring on a Special Mission to Siam, in 1855, and brought to England the Treaty concluded with that country, and returned with the Ratifications thereof, January, 1856.

***PARKYNS, MANSFIELD,**

was attached to the Embassy at Constantinople from February 15, 1850, till 1852.

***PASSMORE, UDNY,**

was formerly a Clerk in the Foreign Office; was appointed Consul at Arequipa, February 15, 1825, and upon the abolition of his office, April 1, 1837, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***PEEL, SIR ROBERT, BART., M.P.**

was attached to the Mission at Madrid, June 18, 1844; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Berne, May 2, 1846, and Chargé d'Affaires in November, 1846, which post he held till December, 1850; succeeded to the Baronetcy, July 2, 1850, on the death of his father; has been M.P. for Tamworth since July, 1850; was appointed a Lord of the Admiralty, March, 1855; was attached as Secretary to Earl Graville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

***PENNELL, W.,**

was appointed Consul at Bordeaux, August 25, 1814; was transferred to Bahia, April 15, 1817; and was appointed Consul-General at Rio de Janeiro, June 30, 1829; upon the abolition of his office, July 1, 1832, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

PENNELL, JOHN CROKER,

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, March 9, 1844; was attached to the Legation at Washington, November 7, 1849, and proceeded thither with Henry Bulwer; he returned in August, 1851.

PERLEY, MOSES HENRY,

was appointed one of the Commissioners for Indian Affairs in the province of New Brunswick, in 1838; Emigration Officer for New Brunswick June 17, 1843, and May 25, 1855; Commissioner for the North-American Fisheries, under the Reciprocity Treaty with The United States, of June 3, 1854.

PERRIER, SIR ANTHONY, KNT.,

was appointed Consul at Brest, October 7, 1824; was knighted, by Royal Patent, November 24, 1843; has been employed as Commissioner for regulating the Channel Fisheries, as British Delegate to the Quarantine Conferences at Paris, in 1851 and 1852, and as Commissioner for regulating the Newfoundland Fisheries.

PETRE, GEORGE GLYNN,

was attached to the Legation at Frankfort, June 23, 1846; at Hanover, October 30, 1852; was transferred to the Embassy at Paris, March 9, 1853; was appointed Paid Attaché at the Hague October 10, 1855, and was transferred to Naples, March 15, 1856; was Chargé d'Affaires from July 28 till October 30, 1856, when diplomatic relations were suspended and the mission was withdrawn.

***PETRE, WILLIAM,**

was Paid Attaché at Florence from August 26, 1844, till February 9, 1853.

***PEVENSEY, (HENRY NORTH HOLROYD), VISCOUNT,**

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Copenhagen, April 7, 1852; and was temporarily attached to the Embassy at Constantinople, February 28, 1853. Resigned in October, 1856.

PICKFORD, THOMAS,

served in the Spanish Army during the Peninsula war; was attached to the late General Sir Richard Bourke, their Military Agent in the Spanish Army of Reserve, in 1813; was appointed Vice-Consul at Corunna, in 1814; Clerk to the Consul-General in Paris, in 1820; Deputy to the Consul-General, in 1822; Consular Registrar to the Embassy in 1832; and Consul at Paris, 1834.

PICTET, CAPTAIN ARMAND,

served with the Army of Occupation in France; afterwards in the West Indies; subsequently in the East Indies; was present during the first Burmese War, for which he has received a Medal; and was some time Aide-de-Camp to the Commander-in-Chief of the Madras Army; was appointed Consular Agent at Geneva, June 26, 1846; and Consul, to reside at Geneva, February 19, 1853.

PISANI, ALEXANDER BARTHOLOMEW STEPHEN, COUNT,

was admitted as a Student for the Oriental Languages in 1819, was appointed in 1821, Private Secretary to the late Viscount Strangford, then Ambassador to the Porte. In that capacity he accompanied His Excellency to the Congress of Verona in 1822. In 1829 he succeeded on the death of his great uncle to the title of Count, which has existed in his branch of the family since 1521. He continued to take an active part in the Diplomatic business of the Embassy under the late Viscount Ponsonby, and in the spring of 1833 he was sent by the Embassies of England and France to Katalia, to stop the advance of the Egyptian Army on Brussa, and he also obtained from Ibrahim Pasha the evacuation of Smyrna by his troops. In 1837 he was appointed keeper of the Archives, and since 1844 he has also had the direction of the Diplomatic Chancery of the Embassy. He is a Knight of St. John of Jerusalem, a Knight of the Spanish Order of Isabella, a Knight of the Redeemer of Greece, a Knight Commander of the Persian Order of the Lion and Sun; was decorated in 1835 with the Turkish Order of the Nishan i Mülhar in Diamonds. Is a member of the Asiatic Society of London.

PISANI, FREDERICK,

was admitted as Student in the Levant Company's Service in 1799; was appointed Dragoman to the Embassy at Constantinople in 1812, and first Dragoman in 1834.

PISANI, ETIENNE,

was admitted a Student in the Levant Company's Service in 1823. Was sent in September, 1833, to Samos, as Commissioner for the Settlement of the Affairs of that island. In 1836 he accompanied the late Colonel Duplat on a Military Survey to Roumelia and Bulgaria. Was appointed Dragoman to the Embassy at Constantinople, August 13, 1841, and first Dragoman, May 29, 1852.

***PISANI, MICHELE,**

was sometime Unpaid Vice-Consul at Goletta, in Tunis.

PLAW, HENRY ROBERT,

was appointed Consul at Dantzig, March 8, 1837, and Consul-General there, March 5, 1844.

PLUNKETT, HON. FRANCIS RICHARD,

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Munich, January 22, 1855, and was transferred to Naples July 20, 1855, and remained at his post till October 30, 1856, when diplomatic relations were suspended, and the mission was withdrawn.

PONSONBY, HON. SPENCER CECIL BRADAZON,

was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office, from October 29, 1840, till August 21, 1841, when he was appointed to a Clerkship; was attached to the Legation at Washington, January 30, 1846; was appointed Private Secretary to Viscount Palmerston, July 6, 1846; to Earl Granville, December 26, 1851; and to the Earl of Clarendon, February 22, 1853; accompanied the Earl of Clarendon to Paris in August, 1855, when his Lordship was in attendance upon Her Majesty; was attached to the Earl of Clarendon's Special Mission to Paris in February, March, and April, 1856, and brought to London the Treaty of Peace signed at Paris, March 30, 1856.

***PONSONBY, HON. GERALD,**

was Private Secretary to the Earl of Clarendon, when Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; is a Clerk in the Treasury; was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

***PORTMAN, HON. MAURICE BERKELEY,**

was Attaché to the Legation at Mexico from April 23, 1853, till April 27, 1856.

***PORTER, EDWARD,**

was a Clerk in the Post-office from 1813 to 1822; was Vice-Consul at Madeira from 1822 to 1832; upon the abolition of the Vice-Consulate he was granted a Compensation Allowance; was appointed Consul at Bahia, September 12, 1839; and retired, October 1, 1851, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

POWER, BONAMY MANSELL,

was Consul at Paraiba, from February 21, 1852, to March 31, 1854, and was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, July 17, 1855.

PRINGLE, MAJOR NORMAN,

was appointed to a 2nd Lieutenantcy in the 21st Regiment (Royal North British Fusiliers) in 1804; served in Sicily in 1806; in Egypt, with General Frazer, in 1807; at the defence of Scylla Castle, in 1808; in Spain, with the Catalonian Army, under the late Lord William Bentinck, in 1812; in Italy, in 1814, having landed at Leghorn, and proceeded from thence to the capture of Genoa. Was present at the actions of Bladensburg, Baltimore, New Orleans, and the capture of Fort Boyer, in North America, in 1814 and 1815; and was appointed Consul at Stockholm, February 2, 1846.

***PROBST, MORITZ,**

was sometime Unpaid Vice-Consul at Algiers.

***PURDIE, JAMES NELSON,**

was an Extra Foreign Service Messenger between Constantinople and Malta, from June 3, 1843, till October 5, 1849; was sometimes officially employed at Malta and in the East by the War Department, in 1855.

***RAWLINSON, LT.-COL. SIR HENRY CRESWICKE, K.C.B.,**

entered the East India Company's Army, on the Bombay Establishment, in 1827; served in Persia from 1833 to 1837; continued in civil charge of Candahar during the whole period of the Afghan war; was appointed Political Agent for the East India Company in Turkish Arabia in 1843; was made a C.B., April 9, 1844; was appointed Consul at Bagdad, March 1, 1844; was promoted to the rank of Consul-General, November 19, 1851, and resigned his post, February 19, 1855. Has received permission to wear the 1st Class Order of the Lion and Sun of Persia, and 3rd Class Order of the ~~Red Eagle~~ ^{Red Eagle} ~~of the Lion and Sun~~ ^{of the Lion and Sun}, as appointed a K.C.B., February 5, 1856; was given the honorary rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, March 25, 1856.

***RAYNHAM (JOHN VILLIERS STUART TOWNSEND), VISCOUNT, M.P.**

was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office from June 18, 1850, till he was appointed to a Clerkship, October 1, 1851, which post he held till March 31, 1854; was appointed Cornet, April 22, 1854, and Lieutenant, March 27, 1855, in the Queen's Own Regiment of Staffordshire Yeomanry Cavalry; was elected M.P. for Tamworth, February 7, 1856.

***RICH HENRY, O. L.,**

was some time a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office.

RICKARDS, JOSEPH,

was Clerk to the British Consulate at Messina, from 1838 to 1854; was in charge of the Consulate from September, 1854, to May, 1856; and was appointed Vice-Consul there, June 5, 1856.

RIDDEL, JOSEPH,

was Vice-Consul at La Guayra from October, 1844, till October 25, 1851; was Acting Consul from June 3, 1848, till August 23, 1853.

ROBBINS, CAPT. SPENCER PERCEVAL,

ROBERTSON, DANIEL BROOKE,

was appointed Vice-Consul at Shanghai, June, 1844; Consul at Aney, November 23, 1852, and at Shanghai, August 10, 1854.

***ROSE, LIEUTENANT-GENERAL SIR HUGH HENRY, K.C.B.,**

entered the Army, June 8, 1820; became a Lieutenant, October 24, 1821; a Captain, July 22, 1824; a Major, December 30, 1826; was promoted to an Unattached Lieut.-Colonelcy, September 17, 1839; was some time Equerry to the late Duke of Cambridge; went with the British officers and detachments, and took part in the military operations in Syria in 1840 and 1841; was attached, with the rank of Deputy Adjutant-General, to the Brigade of Omer Pasha; was wounded in a cavalry affair, January 15, 1841; for his conduct on that occasion he received a Turkish Order; afterwards had command of the detachments; has the local rank of Colonel in Syria; was appointed Consul-General in Syria, August 20, 1841; whilst there he succeeded in rescuing the Prince of Lebanon and others from the Druses; was appointed a C.B., February 23, 1842; has received the Prussian Order of St. John of Jerusalem, the Medal of the R.N., a Turkish sabre of honour and Medal; was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, January 2, 1851; was Chargé d'Affaires from June 23, 1852, to April 4, 1853; became a Colonel, November 11, 1851; was appointed Queen's Commissioner at the Head Quarters of the French Army in the East, April 8, 1854, with the rank of Brigadier-General. Having conducted himself to Her Majesty's satisfaction, and rendered distinguished services in the great and brilliant victories in the Crimea, was promoted to be a Supernumerary Major-General, December 12, 1854; succeeded to the vacancy on the fixed establishment, March 23, 1855; was appointed a K.C.B., October 16, 1855; was promoted to the local rank of Lieutenant-General in Turkey, April 18, 1856; was granted, August 2, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Insignia of the 3rd Class, Commander, of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, which His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, was pleased to confer upon him as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war; was ordered by His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, to attend the Austrian Reviews in September, 1856.

ROSS, DAVID,

was appointed Acting Consul at Coquimbo, in 1831; Vice-Consul, January, 1843; and Consul, April 8, 1851.

***ROSS, HORATIO,**

was attached for a few months to the Legation at Berne, having been appointed February 21, 1852.

***ROTHERY, CHARLES FREDERICK,**

was Slave Trade Commissioner at the Cape Verde Islands from January 25, 1847, till January 1, 1852, when that office was abolished, and he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

***ROTHERY, WILLIAM,**

was some time Registrar to the Mixed British and Portuguese Commission in London, having been appointed January 31, 1819.

ROUSE, HENRY WILLIAM,

was appointed Vice-Consul in Chilo, October 10, 1823; Consul at Concepcion, January 18, 1827, and at Valparaiso, April 21, 1837; was Acting Consul-General, and in charge of the Legation, from August 28, 1847, to January 2, 1850.

RUMBOLD, HORACE,

was attached to the Legation at Washington, September 4, 1849; at Turin, (temporarily) November 2, 1849; at Florence, April 21, 1852; to the Embassy at Paris, June 16, 1852; to the Legation at Frankfort, December 7, 1852; and appointed Paid Attaché at Stuttgart, September 19, 1854; and 2nd Paid Attaché at Vienna, November 20, 1856.

***RUSSELL, RT. HON. LORD JOHN, M.P.**

was M.P. for Tavistock from 1813 till March, 1817, and also from 1818 till March, 1819; for Huntingdonshire, from 1820 till 1826; and for Bandon Bridge, from 1828 till 1830; was made a Privy Councillor, November 22, 1830; was Paymaster of the Forces from December 16, 1830, till December 23, 1834; was M.P. for Devon in 1831, and for South Devon from 1832 till 1835; was Secretary of State for the Home Department from April 18, 1835, till August 30, 1839; was ~~M.P. for South Devon from May, 1831 till June, 1831~~ Secretary of State for the Colonies from August 30, 1839, to September 3, 1841; has been M.P. for the city of London since July, 1841; was First Lord of the Treasury from July 6, 1846, till February 26, 1852; was Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from December 28, 1852, till February 20, 1853, when he retained a seat in the Cabinet, but held no appointment; was Lord President of the Council from June 12, 1854, till February 7, 1855; was appointed to be the unpaid Charity Commissioner for England and Wales, July 8, 1854; was sent on a Special Mission to Vienna, February 11, 1855; was appointed one of a Committee of Council to superintend the application of any sums of money voted by Parliament for the purpose of promoting Public Education, February 28, 1855; was Secretary of State for the Colonies from March to July 1855.

***RUSSELL, ARTHUR JOHN EDWARD,**

was Private Secretary to Lord John Russell, when First Lord of the Treasury, from November, 1849, to February 26, 1852; and also, when Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from December 29, 1852, till February 20, 1853; was employed by his Lordship in the same capacity at the Council Office, and at the Colonial Office.

RUSSELL, ODO WILLIAM LEOPOLD,

was attached to the late Viscount Ponsonby's Embassy at Vienna, March 15, 1849; returned to England in 1850; served for nearly two years in the Foreign Office, was attached to the Embassy at Paris, February 21, 1852, and again at Vienna, April 15, 1852; was charged with the affairs of the Mission for a short time in 1852; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché at Paris, September 30, 1853; and 1st Paid Attaché at Constantinople, August 12, 1854; was charged with the affairs of the Embassy during Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe's two visits to the Crimea in 1855.

RUSSELL, JAMES FERGUSON,

was appointed Unpaid Attaché at Berne, March 16, 1856, and was transferred to Berlin, September 29, 1856.

***RYDER, HON. FREDERICK DUDLEY,**

was for some years a Clerk in the Foreign Office, having been appointed October 29, 1834.

***ST. CLAIR, ALEXANDER BOWER,**

was appointed a Cornet in the 16th Lancers, January 20, 1854; exchanged into the 40th Foot, March 3, 1851, and into the 4th Foot, September 1, 1854; was Extra Aide-de-Camp to the Queen's Commissioner at the head quarters of the Austrian Army from September 6, 1854, till March 21, 1855; was promoted to a Lieutenancy, January 12, 1855; was First Class Interpreter attached to the General Officer commanding the 2nd Division of the Army in the Crimea for some months after, August 15, 1855.

***ST. GEORGE, CHARLES MANNERS,**

was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stockholm, October 14, 1817; afterwards at Turin, where he was Chargé d'Affaires from August 10, 1828, to August 5, 1829, and he resigned his post, May 12, 1832; is a Deputy Lieutenant of Leirrim.

***ST. GERMAN (EDWARD GRANVILLE ELIOT), EARL OF, C.B.,**

was some time Attaché at the Hague, and was appointed Secretary of Legation at Madrid, November 21, 1823; was a Lord of the Treasury from April 24, 1827, to November 26, 1832; was M.P. for Liskeard from 1824 to 1832; was employed on a Mission to Spain in 1835; was made a Privy Councillor, September 3, 1841; was Chief Secretary for Ireland from September 1, 1841, to January 16, 1845; was M.P. for East Cornwall from 1837 till January 19, 1845, when he succeeded as 3rd Earl; was Postmaster-General from November, 1845, to July 11, 1846; was made a C.B., April 27, 1848; was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland from December, 1852, to March, 1855.

ST. JOHN, ROBERT FREDERIC,

was appointed by the Marquess of Normanby to be his Private Secretary, December 16, 1851; and was attached to the Legation at Florence, January 15, 1855.

ST. JOHN, SPENSER,

was appointed by Sir James Brooke to be his Private Secretary, in January, 1848; and accompanied him to Borneo; was Secretary to Sir James Brooke's Mission to Siam, in March, 1850; was Acting Commissioner and Consul-General from February 1, 1851, till August 12, 1855, when he was appointed Consul-General in Borneo.

***SAMUEL, GEORGE,**

was Private Secretary to the late Viscount Ponsonby, when Ambassador at Constantinople and at Vienna; was Unpaid Attaché to the Embassy at Vienna from September 26, 1846, till May 31, 1850.

***SANDWITH, HUMPHRY, C.B.,**

was Inspector-General of Hospitals in the Turkish Service; served with the Turkish Army on the Danube in 1853 and 1854, and on the Staff of Brigadier-General (now Sir William) Williams during the defence of Kars in 1855; was granted, February 7, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the 3rd

Class of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie, which His Imperial Majesty the Sultan was pleased to confer on him as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation for his distinguished Services before the enemy during the defence of Kars; was appointed a C.B., May 10, 1856, and was attached to Earl Granville's Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

SARELL, PHILIP,
was appointed Assistant Interpreter to the Embassy at Constantinople in 1850; was sent to Omer Pasha's headquarters in 1854, and accompanied Mr. Colquhoun, Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Bucharest, on his Mission to Bosnia in that year; was attached to Brigadier-General Mansfield whilst attached to the British Embassy at Constantinople in 1855.

SASSE, FREDERICK RICHARD,
was Secretary to the Mixed British and French Fishery Regulation Commission from August, 1841, till its close in September, 1843; was appointed a Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office, November 10, 1844.

SAUNDERS, SYDNEY SMITH,
was appointed to the Consular Department of the Foreign Office, July 5, 1826; and Consul in Albania, April 18, 1835.

SCARLETT, HON. PETER CAMPBELL, C.B.,
was attached to the Embassy at Constantinople, October 10, 1825; at Paris, June 1, 1828; and appointed Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, February 25, 1834; Secretary of Legation at Florence, April 3, 1844; was transferred to St. Petersburg, February 12, 1852, which appointment was shortly afterwards cancelled, and he was reinstated in his former post, where he has been several times Chargé d'Affaires. Was made a C.B., September 21, 1854; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Rio de Janeiro, December 31, 1855; and a Deputy Lieutenant of Surrey, February 26, 1856.

***SCHEDEL, GEORGE,**
was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Costa Rica, from November 23, 1852, till July 18, 1853, when he was transferred to New York, which post he held till June 24, 1856.

***SCHENLEY, EDWARD WYNDHAM HARRINGTON,**
was appointed Vice-Consul at Guatemala, July 5, 1825; Consul at Puerto Cabello, June 10, 1828; Arbitrator to the British and Spanish Court of Justice at Havana, April 9, 1836, and Commissioner of Arbitration to the British and Dutch Court of Commission at Surinam, April 23, 1841; on the abolition of his office, January 1, 1849, he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

***SCHMID, CONSTANTINE,**
was Vice-Consul at Oesel some time previous to May, 1854.

***SCHNOBEL, CHARLES,**
was Vice-Consul at Liebau some time previous to May, 1854.

SCHOMBURGE, SIR ROBERT H., KNT.,
proceeded in 1835, under the direction of the Royal Geographical Society, with the approbation and under the patronage of the British Government, to Guiana, to explore its interior; on his return to Europe, was appointed Commissioner for Surveying and Marking out the Boundaries of British Guiana, December 10, 1840; on the termination of that mission received the honour of Knighthood, in May, 1845; was appointed Consul to the Dominican Republic, May 22, 1848, and Plenipotentiary, February 23, 1849, to conclude a Treaty of Amity and Commerce with that Republic. Has permission to wear, whilst in Her Majesty's employ, the Order of Knight of the Royal Prussian Order of the Red Eagle of the 2nd Class, the Order of Merit of Saxony, and Legion of Honour of France.

***SCOTT, NEWTON SAVILE,**
was appointed Attaché at Buenos Ayres, March 18, 1826; at Rio Janeiro, February 22, 1828; Paid Attaché there, November 9, 1832; at Madrid, February 8, 1833; at the Hague, in 1835; at Madrid, from 1840, to January 13, 1845; was left in charge of the Mission from September 15 to October 23, 1840; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Berne, July 3, 1845, and resigned April 2, 1846.

***SCOTT, HENRY CHARLES,**
was a Clerk in the Slave Trade Department of the Foreign Office from November 2, 1842, till September 10, 1853.

***SEALE, RICHARD B.,**
was sometime a Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office.

***SEYMOUR (EDWARD ADOLPHUS FERDINAND SEYMOUR), LORD,**
was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856; is a Cornet in the Royal Wiltshire Yeomary Cavalry.

SEYMOUR, RT. HON. SIR GEORGE HAMILTON, G.C.B., G.C.H.,
was attached to the Embassy at the Hague in March, 1817; was appointed Assistant Précis Writer in December, 1819; Précis Writer, January 5, 1821; Private Secretary, January 29, 1822; was attached to the late Duke of Wellington's Special Mission to Verona, in October, 1822; appointed Secretary of Legation at Frankfurt, November 4, 1823; at Stuttgart, September 22, 1826; at Berlin, January 1, 1828; Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, September 7, 1829; Minister Resident at Florence, November 13, 1830; Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Brussels, April 4, 1836; at Lisbon, December 10, 1846; was made G.C.H., in 1856; G.C.B., January 28, 1847; and was transferred to St. Petersburg, April 28, 1851, which post he held till the withdrawal of the Mission in February, 1854, when he retired on a Pension. Was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Vienna, November 23, 1855; was sworn a Privy Councillor, November 21, 1855.

***SHEE, SIR GEORGE, BART.,**

was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from November 26, 1830, whilst Viscount Palmerston was Secretary of State, till October 31, 1834, when he was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Berlin; he was transferred to Stuttgart, November 21, 1835, which post he held till September, 1844.

***SHEIL, LT.-COLONEL SIR JUSTIN, K.C.B.,**

was appointed Secretary of Legation at Tehran, March 1, 1836, and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, September 17, 1844, which post he held till 1854; was made a C.B., April 27, 1848, and a K.C.B., January 30, 1855.

SHELBURNE (HENRY PETTY FITZMAURICE), EARL OF,

was a Lord of the Treasury, from December 26, 1847, till August, 1849; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Wiltshire; has been Major of the Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry Cavalry since March 1, 1850; was M.P. for Calne from 1837 till July 5, 1856, when he was appointed Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; was created a Peer, by the title of Baron Wycombe, of Chipping Wycombe, July 11, 1856.

***SHOOLBRED, HENRY,**

was employed for some years as an Extra Courier between Constantinople and Malta.

SIMMONS, LT.-COLONEL JOHN LINTON ARABIN, C.B.

was appointed to be 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Engineers, December 14, 1837, 1st Lieutenant, October 15, 1839, Captain, November 9, 1846, Major, July 14, 1854; was sometime Secretary to the Railway Department in the Board of Trade; was given the local rank of Lieut.-Col. in Turkey, July 14, 1854, whilst employed in that country; was appointed Queen's Commissioner at the headquarters of the Turkish Army, under Omer Pasha, February 5, 1855; was appointed a C.B. October 16, 1855; was granted, February 19, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the 3rd Class of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie, which the Sultan was pleased to confer upon him as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war; is now the British Commissioner for the regulation of the Turco-Persian Boundary.

SIMMONS, HENRY,

was appointed Student to the Embassy at Constantinople in 1823. In 1835 and 1836 assisted the Consul-General, as Dragoman, and from 1836 to 1840 assisted the Vice-Consul Chancellerie, and in the Passport Department; acted as full Dragoman to the Embassy, Consulate and Chancellerie, from 1841 till 1849, when he was appointed Dragoman to the Embassy.

***SIMPSON, JOSEPH,**

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Cronstadt from April 17, 1849 till May 22, 1854.

SKELTON, GEORGE,

was a Clerk attached to the Slave Trade Department in the Foreign Office, from February 28, 1846, till December 1, 1856, when he was appointed Commissioner of Arbitration at Sierra Leone.

SKENE, JAMES HENRY,

served five years in 73rd Foot; was appointed Vice-Consul at Constantinople, November 27, 1832; was in charge of the Consulate at Kaiserlich from July 1, 1852, to January 1, 1853; was sent to Samos, January 1, to report on the affairs of that island, and remained there till February 11, 1845; was appointed Consul at Aleppo, March, 26, 1855; was sent to the Dardanelles, July 6, 1855, to assist in the organization of the Irregular Cavalry raised by Great Britain in Turkey; was appointed Private Secretary to Lieutenant General Vivian, commanding the Turkish Contingent, October 16, 1855; was sent to Shumla with the Irregular Cavalry as Civil Commissioner, November 20, 1855, and served with that Corps until July 1, 1856, when it was disbanded in consequence of the conclusion of Peace.

SMITH, WILLIAM,

served in the Army previous to being appointed Consul at Lisbon, June 2, 1831.

***SMITH, WILLIAM,**

was employed as Registrar, Commissioner of Arbitration, and Commissary Judge at Sierra Leone, from 1825 till April 5, 1835, when he obtained a Superannuation Allowance.

SMITH, WILLIAM SIDNEY,

was for several years Secretary to Mr. Consul-General Crawford, at Havana, and was appointed Vice-Consul at Trinidad de Cuba, December 13, 1854.

SMYTHE, HON. PERCY ELLEN FREDERICK WILLIAM,

was appointed Student Attaché to the Embassy at Constantinople, May 16, 1845; 4th Paid Attaché, February 15, 1849; and 3rd Paid Attaché, October 19, 1852.

***SOMERVILLE, RT. HON. SIR WILLIAM MEREDYTH, BART.,**

was Paid Attaché at Berlin from November 6, 1829, till December 19, 1832; succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1831; was M.P. for Drogheda from 1837 to 1852; was Under Secretary of State for the Home Department from June, 1846, to July, 1847, when he was appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland; was made a Privy Councillor, July 22, 1847; became M.P. for Canterbury, August, 1854.

SPRING RICE, HON. THOMAS CHARLES WILLIAM,

was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office, from December 15, 1839, till January 5, 1840, when he was appointed to a Clerkship. Was sometime in the County of Limerick Militia; was attached to the Earl of Clarendon's Special Mission to Paris in February, March, and April, 1856.

STACEY, FREDERICK,

was Acting Vice-Consul at La Guayra from June 6, 1861, till November 16, 1861, when he was appointed Vice-Consul.

***STAFFORD (GEORGE GRANTVILLE WILLIAM SUTHERLAND LEVESON GOWER), MARQUESS OF, M.P.**, was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant of Sutherlandshire in 1819, and Vice Lieutenant of that county 1850, and Lord Lieutenant of Cromarty in 1833; was returned M.P. for Sutherlandshire in July 1832; was attached to Earl Grantville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July, 1856.

***STAHL, CONRAD**, was an Office-Keeper in the Foreign Office from 1828 till January 5, 1838, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***STANHOPE, PHILIP HENRY STANHOPE, EARL**, was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from December 17, 1831, till August 15, 1835; was sometime in Parliament. Succeeded as 6th Earl, March, 1855.

***STANLEY (EDWARD HENRY STANLEY), LORD, M.P.** has been M.P. for Lynn Regis since December, 1848; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from May 22, to December 28, 1852.

***STANLEY OF ALDERLEY (EDWARD JOHN STANLEY), LORD**, was appointed Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, March 28, 1833; Under Secretary for the Home Department, July 18, 1831; Secretary to the Treasury, April 21, 1835; Paymaster-General, June 19, 1841; was made a Privy Councillor, August 11, 1841; under Lord John Russell's Administration was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from July 6, 1846, to February 15, 1852; was some years M.P. for North Cheshire; was raised to the Peerage in May, 1848, as Baron Eddisbury; succeeded as 2nd Baron, October 22, 1850; upon the formation of the Earl of Aberdeen's Cabinet, in December, 1852, he was appointed Paymaster-General and Vice-President of the Board of Trade; was appointed President of the Board of Trade, March 31, 1855, and to a seat in the Cabinet, November 27, 1855.

STANLEY, HON. HENRY EDWARD JOHN, was appointed *Précis* Writer to Viscount Palmerston, December 20, 1817; 2nd Paid Attaché at the Embassy at Constantinople, December 21, 1851; 1st Paid Attaché, December 30, 1851; had charge of the Consulate at Varna from June 4 to August 10, 1853; and was appointed Secretary of Legation at Athens, January 25, 1854; accompanied Sir Henry Bulwer on his Special Mission to the Danubian Provinces in July, 1856.

STANTON, LIEUT.-COLONEL EDWARD, is in the Corps of Royal Engineers; was attached to the Quartermaster-General's Staff with the Expedition across the Orange River, under the late Sir George Cathcart, in 1832, and was present at the action of Borea. Served in the Eastern Campaign of 1854 and 1855, including the attack on the Port of Odessa, the battles of Alma and Inkermann, and siege of Sebastopol. Was appointed, June 1856, the British Commissioner to mark the line of demarcation on the frontier of Bessarabia.

***STAUNTON, SIR GEORGE, BART.**, succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1801; was M.P. successively for St. Michael's, Heytesbury, South Hampshire, and Portsmouth; was employed in China as Her Majesty's Commissioner in 1816 and 1817.

STAVELEY, THOMAS, was for some months at Paris in 1814, as Secretary to the Mixed Commission appointed under the Additional Articles of the Treaty of Peace with France of that year; was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office from July 5, 1814, till September 28, 1817, when he was appointed to a Clerkship; succeeded to a Senior Clerkship, April 6, 1839; was appointed Superintendent of the Slave Trade Business, December 12, 1845, and Superintendent of the Consular Business, October 1, 1851.

STEVENS, RICHARD, was some time Vice-Consul at Samsoon; was employed by Sir Stratford Canning (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe), in 1813, to recover some slaves from among the Nestorians; was appointed Consul at Tabreez, March 2, 1816; and was transferred to Tehran, April 22, 1851.

***STODDART, JOHN LAURENCE**, was Consul at Alexandria from August 20, 1841, till 1848.

***STOPFORD, WILLIAM BRUCE**, was a Clerk in the Foreign Office from 1826 till 1843; was *Précis* Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen from September 3, 1811, to November 24, 1813.

STRACHEY, GEORGE, was Attaché at St. Petersburg, from February 21, 1832, till the withdrawal of the Mission in February, 1854; was temporarily attached at Hanover from May 26, to October 31, 1854; was appointed Attaché at Turin, April 30, 1855; and 2nd Paid Attaché at Vienna, May 11, 1856; and Paid Attaché at Stuttgart, November 20, 1856.

***STRANGFORD (GEORGE AUGUSTUS FREDERICK PERCY SYDNEY SMYTHE), VISCOUNT**, was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs from January 27 till July 6, 1846, whilst the Earl of Aberdeen was Secretary of State; was for some years M.P. for Canterbury; succeeded as 7th Viscount, May 29, 1855.

***STRANGWAYS, HON. JOHN GEORGE CHARLES FOX**, was a Clerk in the Foreign Office for some years.

***STRANGWAYS, HON. WILLIAM THOMAS HORNER FOX**, was attached to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, December, 1816; at Constantinople, June, 1820; at Naples, September 1, 1822; was appointed Paid Attaché at the Hague, January, 1824; Secretary of Legation at Florence, March 8, 1825; at Naples, February 12, 1828; Secretary of Embassy at Vienna, November 30, 1832; Under

Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, August 15, 1836; and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Diet of the Germanic Confederation, August 1, 1840, which post he held till January 6, 1849, when he retired upon his Pension.

STRATFORD DE REDCLIFFE (STRATFORD CANNING), VISCOUNT, G.C.B.

was appointed *Précis* Writer at the Foreign Office by Mr. Secretary Canning, July 5, 1807; accompanied Mr. Merry to Copenhagen as Secretary (conjointly with the present Earl of Mornington) to his Special Mission in October, 1807; accompanied Mr. (afterwards Sir Robert) Adair, to the Dardanelles, as Secretary to his Special Mission in June 1808, for the purpose of negotiating terms of peace between England and the Porte; was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, April 15, 1809; on the recall of Mr. Adair, was Minister Plenipotentiary at Constantinople in 1811 and 1812; attended by order at the Congress of Vienna in 1814 and 1815, when Sir Robert Liston arrived as Ambassador; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in Switzerland, June 28, 1814; attended at the Congress of Vienna, and assisted at the Committee of Plenipotentiaries for Swiss Affairs, November, 1814; to the United States of America, July 18, 1820; was made a Privy Councillor, July 20, 1820; was appointed Plenipotentiary in London for negotiating with the United States of America, November 29, 1823, concerning all the questions in dispute, including that of the North-west Boundary, but which was not eventually ratified; was sent on a Special Mission to Russia, November 9, 1824, respecting Greece and the Boundary on the North-west American Coast, and was charged with communications to the Court of Vienna; was appointed Ambassador at Constantinople, October 10, 1825; was sent in July 1828, while in that capacity, to Greece, for the establishment of its independence in concert with the Representatives of France and Russia. Resigned his Embassy, June 1829, and was made a G.C.B. in 1829; was despatched on a Special Embassy to Constantinople for enlarging the Boundaries of Greece, October 30, 1831; was appointed Ambassador and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Emperor of all the Russias, October 30, 1832; was sent on a Special Embassy to Spain and Portugal, December 30, 1832; was again appointed Ambassador at Constantinople, October 16, 1841, with a Mission to Athens; on his return from temporary leave of absence in England, was accredited, in 1847 and 1848, on Special Missions to Switzerland, Prussia, Austria, and Greece, communicating also under instructions with the Courts of Belgium, Hanover, Saxony, and Bavaria. In April, 1853, resumed his functions at Constantinople after communicating by instruction with the Courts of Paris and Vienna on his way back after a short leave of absence. Sat in six Parliaments for Stockbridge, Old Sarum, and Lynn Regis, successively from 1833 to 1842; and was raised to the Peerage, April 24, 1852, by the title of Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe. Signed and concluded six Conventions or Treaties with various States, and assisted, by single mediation, in bringing about peace between Turkey and Russia in 1812; by joint intervention in settling the Federal Compact of the Swiss Cantons; by Conference and Protocol in establishing the foundations of the Greek Monarchy; was offered but declined a Russian Order in 1814; accepted, by permission, from the Sultan Mahmood, in 1832, his Nishan, with the Imperial Portrait in brilliants; was offered, and declined by authority, the Greek Order of the Saviour, in 1842.

STUART, HON. WILLIAM,

was appointed Attaché to the Embassy at Paris, September 29, 1845; acted as Private Secretary to the Marquess of Normanby from June, 1847, to February, 1852; was appointed 2nd Paid Attaché, December 24, 1851; was Chargé d'Affaires from August 19, to August 29, 1852; and was appointed 1st Paid Attaché at Paris September 30, 1853; Brought to London the Ratifications of the Treaty of Paris of March 30, 1856.

STUART, HERBERT CRICHTON,

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office May 7, 1854, and a Deputy-Lieutenant of the county of Bute, December 26, 1854.

SULIVAN, STEPHEN HENRY,

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, August 17, 1832; *Précis* Writer, September 16, 1832; Private Secretary, May 3, 1833; Paid Attaché at the Hague, November 16, 1834, at Lisbon, July 5, 1835; Secretary of Legation at Lisbon, October 21, 1836; at Turin, November 1, 1837; at Munich, May 3, 1839; was from November 17, 1840, till December 29, 1841, the Commissioner at Naples, in concert with Sir Woodbine Parish, appointed to liquidate the Claims arising out of the Sulphur Monopoly; was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General in Chile, May 30, 1849; and was transferred to Peru, January 17, 1853.

***SUTER, HENRY,**

served as Acting British Vice-Consul at Trebizond, from May, 1833, till June, 1834; and again from May, 1835, till April, 1837; at which latter date he was appointed Vice-Consul at Trebizond; was Acting Consul at Erzeroom, from May till October, 1838; was appointed Consul at Kaissariah, August 13, 1841, and held that appointment till June, 1852; joined the Expeditionary Force sent to Turkey, as principal First Class Interpreter to the Quartermaster-General's Department, May 8, 1854, and served with it, in Turkey and in the Crimea, throughout the war; was on duty with Sir Richard Airey, on the field, at the battles of the Alma, Balaklava, and Inkerman, and was present at the capture of Sebastopol; was appointed Chief Interpreter with the Army of the East, November 17, 1855, and served till the Army quitted the Crimea, July 12, 1856.

***SUTHERLAND, R.,**

was formerly Consul at Maracaibo, and upon the abolition of his office, January, 1832, he obtained a Compensation Allowance.

SWIFT, RICHARD LEVINGE,

was appointed Consul at St. Thomas, October 21, 1856; at Buffalo, February 15, 1859; and was transferred to Riga, May 30, 1866.

SYNGE, WILLIAM WEBB FOLLETT,

was appointed to the Foreign Office, June 26, 1846; was attached to the Legation at Washington from September 15, 1861, till July 1, 1863.

***TAUNTON, WALTER GREENE,**
was some time a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office.

TAYLOR, BRIDGES,
was appointed a Clerk in the Audit Office in 1832; and in the Foreign Office, October 29, 1834; acted for some years as Deputy Clerk to the Signet, for his uncle, the late Sir Brook Taylor; was attached to the Legation at Hanover in May, 1838; was selected to attend upon the Princes of the Sandwich Islands during their residence in England, in April and May, 1850; and was *Précis* Writer to the Earl of Malmesbury from April 1 to December 14, 1852, when he was appointed Consul at Elsinore.

***TEESDALE, CAPTAIN CHRISTOPHER CHARLES,**
entered the Royal Artillery as a 2nd Lieutenant, June 1831; was promoted to be a 1st Lieutenant, April 22, 1833; was Aide-de-Camp to Brigadier-General (now Sir William) Williams, Queen's Commissioner at the headquarters of the Turkish Army from Asia, August 1, 1834, till June, 1836, and was given the local rank of Captain in Turkey, whilst so employed, February 13, 1855. The 3rd Class of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie was conferred on him by the *Mushir*, in virtue of an authority with which he was invested by the Sultan, to mark a sense of his conduct and gallantry at the battle on the heights of Kars, September 29, and he was also named a Lieutenant-Colonel in the Turkish Army. The garrison of Kars was subsequently forced to capitulate, November 28, 1855, when Captain Teesdale surrendered himself a prisoner to the Russian forces under General Mouravieff; was granted, February 7, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the above-mentioned order: Was appointed a C.B., May 10, 1856, and Aide-de-Camp to Sir William Williams, the Commandant of the Royal Artillery at Woolwich, July, 1856.

***THOMPSON, FREDERICK,**
was Vice-Consul at Leghorn from November 7, 1844, till July 28, 1852.

***THOMPSON, HARRISON JAMES,**
was some years Vice-Consul at Hayti, and retired, April 26, 1845, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

THOMSON, WILLIAM TAYLOR,
was appointed Paid Attaché to the Legation at Tehran, June 12, 1837, and Secretary of Legation, April 8, 1852; was Chargé d'Affaires from March 7, 1853, till April 17, 1855; when diplomatic relations were suspended, December 5, 1855, he accompanied the Mission to Bagdad.

THOMSON, RONALD FERGUSON,
was appointed 3rd Paid Attaché at Tehran, September 7, 1848; 2nd Paid Attaché, January 5, 1852; and 1st Paid Attaché, April 22, 1852; when diplomatic relations were suspended, December 5, 1855, he accompanied the Mission to Bagdad.

THORNTON, EDWARD,
was attached to the Mission at Turin, April 12, 1842; was appointed Paid Attaché at Mexico, February 28, 1845, and Secretary of Legation, December 24, 1851; was Secretary to the late Sir Charles Hotham's Special Mission to the River Plate from April, 17, 1852, till October, 1853; was appointed Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General in New Granada, May 6, 1854, but did not proceed to Bogota, and was transferred to Monte Video, September 19, 1854.

***TOLME, CHARLES DAVID,**
was Consul at Havana from September 30, 1833, till August 22, 1840.

***TOLLEMACHE, WILLIAM AUGUSTUS,**
served thirteen years in the 2nd Life Guards; was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Berne, June 7, 1850; was transferred to Berlin, July 16, 1850; to the Embassy at Paris, December 23, 1851; was appointed Paid Attaché at Rio de Janeiro, June 6, 1853, and at the Hague, January 13, 1855; was appointed Assistant Inspector, with the rank of Captain, on the Staff of the British Foreign Legion, June 10, and resigned his Attachéship, October 8, 1855.

TOWNLEY, LT.-COLONEL CHARLES,
was for some time a Clerk in the General Post Office; in 1835, joined the British Auxiliary Legion, and proceeded to the north coast of Spain; served some time as Aide-de-Camp to Sir A. Clivechester, and was on one occasion severely wounded; was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, April 13, 1840; he obtained, June 27, 1843, Her Majesty's permission to accept the supernumerary Cross of Charles III, the Cross First Class of San Fernando, and the Cross of Isabella the Catholic, which had been conferred on him by the Queen of Spain for his services during the Civil War in Spain, whilst he was serving in the British Auxiliary Legion. He holds the rank of Captain and Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel.

***TRACY, HON. AND REV. E. HANBURY,**
was Chaplain for some years to the British Legation at Vienna, and resigned his appointment in September, 1856.

TULIN, CHARLES,
was appointed Vice-Consul at Algiers, January 24, 1849; acted as Agent and Consul-General in Algeria in June, July, and August, 1850, and as Consul from January 1 to March 4, 1851; was appointed Vice-Consul for the province of Oran, January 28, 1851.

TURING, SIR JAMES, BART.,
succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1831; was formerly Vice-Consul at Rotterdam, and was appointed Consul there, March 3, 1845.

TURNER, EDMUND JOHN,
served some years in the Cavalry, and was appointed Consul at Carthage, February 15, 1856.

***TURNER, WILLIAM,**

served fifteen years in the Foreign Office; was appointed Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople, April 6, 1824; was Minister Plenipotentiary for a year and a-half, during Sir S. Canning's (now Viscount Stratford de Redcliffe) absence; was Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in Colombia from July 30, 1829, till that Mission was abolished in May, 1841; Mr. Turner is in the receipt of a Pension.

***TYLECOTE, CHARLES,**

was a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger from October 9, 1824, till August 1, 1837, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***URQUHART, DAVID,**

was Secretary of Embassy at Constantinople from October, 1835, till August, 1837; was M.P. for Stafford from 1847 till July, 1852.

USSHER, THOMAS NEVILLE,

was appointed Vice-Consul in Hayti, July, 1833; Consul, August 19, 1842, and Consul-General, May, 1852.

***VANE, LORD HARRY GEORGE,**

was attached to the Embassy at Paris, February 26, 1829; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stockholm July 5, 1830; has been M.P. for South Durham since 1841.

VEDOVA, G. D.

was Vice-Consul at Scio from January, 1831, till November 2, 1833, when he was appointed Vice-Consul and Chancellor at Smyrna.

***VEITCH, HENRY,**

was formerly Consul-General in Madeira, and retired, May 1, 1836, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***VENFIELD, JOHN,**

was an Office Keeper in the Foreign Office from 1824 till December 12, 1845, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

VEREKER, HON. HENRY PRENDERGAST,

was appointed to a Clerkship under the Commissioners of Railways, October 4, 1818, became Junior Clerk, July 1, 1851, on the abolition of the Office, October 11, 1851, was appointed a Clerk in the Board of Trade, and Consul at Rio Grande do Sul, February 21, 1852.

***VERNEY, SIR HARRY, BART.,**

was attached to the late Sir Brook Taylor's Mission at Stuttgardt in 1810; entered the Army in 1810, served in the Fusilier and Grenadier Guards; has been a Major in the Army; succeeded to the Baronetcy in 1826; assumed the name of Verney, in lieu of that of Calvert, on inheriting the Verney estates in 1827; was M.P. for Buckingham from 1832 to 1841; was Major of the Buckinghamshire Militia from 1844 to 1846; was M.P. for Bedford from 1847 to 1852.

***VERNON, FITZ PATRICK HENRY,**

was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Madrid, September 5, 1816; he returned to England with Sir Henry Bulwer in May, 1848, upon the interruption of Diplomatic Relations with the Court of Spain; was attached to the Legation at Hanover, August 28, 1818; was transferred to Berlin, September 6, 1819; during 1850, he was Private Secretary to Lord Seymour, the First Commissioner of Woods and Forests; was Private Secretary to his father, Mr. Vernon Smith, the Secretary at War, in February, 1852; was some time in the Northamptonshire Militia, was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant of that County, June 24, 1854; was appointed Private Secretary to his father, the President of the Board of Control, March, 1855.

VERNON, GREVILLE RICHARD,

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office May 7, 1854, and was attached July 22, 1856, to Sir Henry Bulwer's Special Mission to the Danubian Provinces.

VIVIAN, HON. HUSSEY CRESPIGNY,

was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, November 18, 1851, and a Lieutenant in the 1st Cornwall Rifles Militia, April 27, 1854; was attached to the Earl of Clarendon's Special Mission to Paris in February, March, and April, 1856.

VON IVEN, WILLIAM,

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Kiel, from March 26, 1852, till May 11, 1855, when he was appointed Vice-Consul at that place.

VREDENBURG, WATSON,

was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Pernambuco from February 4, 1852, till August 23, 1853; was Acting Consul from August 23, 1853, to October 23, 1854; was appointed Vice-Consul at Paraíba, May 15, 1854.

VYNER, CAPTAIN EDMUND HALFORD,

was some years Aide-de-Camp to the Duke of Saxe-Coburg; and was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, February 27, 1848.

WADDILOVE, WILLIAM,

was Private Secretary to Colonel Hodges, at Hamburgh, from August, 1817, till November, 1855; accompanied him on his Mission to Schleswig in 1819; was appointed Vice-Consul at Hamburgh, November 23, 1855, and was Acting Consul-General from June 9, to June 30, 1856.

***WAKE, CHARLES DUNKIN,**

was formerly Vice-Consul at Copenhagen; and was Consul at Charleston from May 28, 1845, till August 30, 1849.

WALLER, SIR THOMAS WATHEN, BART.,
 was attached to the Embassy at the Hague, December 20, 1826; at Paris, October 14, 1828; was appointed Paid Attaché at Constantinople, December 5, 1832; Secretary of Legation at Athens, April 5, 1834; and at Brussels, April 11, 1837; has been several times Chargé d'Affaires there. Succeeded to the Baronetcy, on the death of his father, January 1, 1853.

WALLIS, ALLAN,
 was Vice-Consul at San José, in Costa Rica, from October 22, 1853, till November 30, 1855, when he was appointed Consul.

WALMISLEY, ARTHUR,
 was employed some time at the House of Lords; was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Librarian's Department of the Foreign Office from August 9, 1845, till July 1, 1854, when he was appointed a Permanent Clerk in that department.

WALNE, ALFRED SEPTIMUS,
 was appointed Vice-Consul at Cairo, August 31, 1837, and Consul, August 14, 1841.

***WALPOLE, LT.-COL. HON. JOHN,**
 served with the Guards in the Peninsula, and was severely wounded at the Siege of Burgos; was M.P. for King's Lynn from 1827 till 1831; was Private Secretary to Viscount Palmerston, when Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from November 22, 1830, till August 5, 1833, when he was appointed Consul-General in Chile; was promoted to the rank of Chargé d'Affaires, May 24, 1841, which posts he held till March 1, 1849, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

WALSHAM, JOHN,
 was some time in the Audit Office before he was appointed to a Clerkship in the Foreign Office, October 1, 1854.

***WARD (WILLIAM WARD), LORD,**
 succeeded to the Peerage, December 6, 1835; is Colonel of the Worcestershire Yeomanry Cavalry; was attached to Earl Granville's Special Embassy to Russia, in July 1856.

WARD, GEORGE BOUCHIER,
 has served in the Consulate at Constantinople since April, 1842; was acting Vice-Consul Cancellier, from October 1, 1852, to May 5, 1854, and from April 1, 1855, to February 5, 1856, and was appointed Vice-Consul Cancellier, January 29, 1856.

WARD, THOMAS LAWRENCE,
 was appointed to a Clerkship in the Foreign Office, October 10, 1817; went with the late Viscount Castlereagh to the Conferences at Aix-la-Chapelle, in August, 1818, and to Hanover in 1820, on the Accession of George IV; was attached to the Earl of Clanwilliam's Mission at Berlin in 1823 and 1824; to Sir Robert Adair's Special Mission to Brussels in 1831; and to the late Earl of Durham's Extraordinary Mission to St. Petersburg in 1832; succeeded to a Senior Clerkship in the Foreign Office, April 5, 1841, and was appointed Superintendent of the Slave Trade Business, October 1, 1851.

WARD, JOHN,
 was appointed British Commissioner at Hamburg for the revision of the Trade Duties in February, 1841; British Commissioner at Berlin for the Liquidation of the Portendic Claims on France in March, 1844; and Consul-General in Saxony, June 5, 1845.

WARD, WILLIAM ROBERT,
 was attached to the Mission at Mexico, October 24, 1838; was appointed Paid Attaché, July 6, 1839; was transferred to Lisbon, January 14, 1845; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Florence, February 12, 1852; and at Lisbon, April 7, 1852. Was Chargé d'Affaires from May 8, 1855, till December 15, 1855.

***WARD, SIR HENRY GEORGE, K.C.M.G.,**
 was appointed Attaché at Stockholm, August, 1816; was for some time in charge of the Mission; was transferred to the Hague, January, 1818; to Madrid in 1819; went to Mexico with the first Commission in November, 1823, and returned in 1824; was Minister in Mexico from April, 1825, to May, 1827; was M.P. for St. Albans from 1833 till 1837, and for Sheffield from 1837 till May, 1849; was Secretary to the Admiralty from July, 1846, till May, 1849; was appointed Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands, May, 1849, K.C.M.G. in October, 1849, and Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon and its Dependencies, February 26, 1855.

***WARING, JOHN,**
 was a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger from October 4, 1824, till July 5, 1855, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance.

WARRE, FREDERICK RICHARD,
 was appointed a Lieutenant in the East Kent Militia, November 10, 1852, and Attaché at the Legation at Washington, May 10, 1854.

WEBSTER, CAPTAIN RICHARD HILL,
 served some years in the 36th Foot; was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, April 4, 1835, and a Captain in the King's Own Light Infantry Regiment of Militia, April 2, 1853.

WELLESLEY, RICHARD GERALD,
 was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office from April 5 till November 22, 1839, when he was appointed to a Clerkship; succeeded to a Senior Clerkship, January 1, 1856.

***WERRY, FRANCIS PETRE,**
was Secretary of Legation at Dresden from January 6, 1816, till March, 1824, when he resigned, and obtained a Pension.

WERRY, F. H. S.,
was appointed Vice-Consul at Bengazi, January 24, 1852; and was transferred to Tunis, November, 1856.

***WESSELHOEFT, CHARLES,**
was employed, in 1815, as Private Secretary to the late Mr. Mellish, Agent and Consul-General in the Hans Towns; and was appointed Vice-Consul at Hamburg in August, 1817. Was several times in charge of the Mission; retired upon a Superannuation Allowance, November 14, 1855.

WEST, HON. LIONEL SACKVILLE SACKVILLE,
served as Assistant Præcis Writer to the Earl of Aberdeen in 1845, and also in the Foreign Office during 1847; was appointed Attaché to the Legation at Lisbon, July 24, 1817; was transferred to Naples, November 14, 1819; was appointed Paid Attaché at Stuttgart, February 20, 1852; and 1st Paid Attaché at Berlin, June 15, 1853.

***WESTON, THOMAS CRAWLEY,**
was appointed Registrar to the Mixed Courts of Justice at Sierra Leone, June 12, 1846; and Commissioner of Arbitration at Sierra Leone, September 30, 1850. He retired upon a Superannuation Allowance, November, 1856.

***WESTMORLAND (JOHN FANE), EARL OF, G.C.B.,**
when Lord Burghersh, entered the Army, as Ensign, December 17, 1803; became a Lieutenant, January 5, 1804; a Captain in the 23rd Welsh Fusiliers, May 3, 1805; served in 1805 and 1806, as Aide-de-Camp to Lt.-General Don, on the Expedition to Hanover; in 1806 and 1807, as Assistant Adjutant-General in Sicily; on board Admiral Sir J. Duckworth's Fleet in the action of the Passage of the Dardanelles, and the destruction of the Turkish Fleet lying off the Castles, in the actions before Constantinople, at the Island of Prota, and at the repassage of the Fleet through the Dardanelles; in Egypt, as Assistant Adjutant-General with the force under General Wauchope, at the first storming of the town of Rosetta, in the retreat, and subsequently in the second attack and siege of that place with the force under Major-General Sir W. Stewart; served in Portugal in 1808, as Assistant Adjutant-General in the army commanded by Sir Arthur Wellesley, in the affair in front of Abidos, and in the battles of Roleira and Vimeira; served in 1809, as extra Aide-de-Camp to Lord Wellington, at the battle of Talavera; served in 1810, with the 3rd Dragoon Guards in the campaign in Portugal, including the retreat to Torres Vedras, battle of Busaco, and advance to Santarem; was promoted to a Majority, December 20, 1810, to a Lt.-Colonelcy, December 12, 1811; was accredited as Military Commissioner to the Head-Quarters of the Allied Armies in Germany, under Prince Schwarzenburgh, in September, 1813; served at the siege of Huningen and the campaign of 1814, in France, including the taking of Langres, and the battles of La Rothière and Brienne, capture of Troyes, affairs of Mornan and Nangis, in front of Bray, defence of Troyes, when attacked by Buonaparte, February 23, 1814, battle of Bar-sur-Aube, the subsequent affair upon the Barce, recapture of Troyes, battles of Arcis-sur-Aube, and of Fère Champenoise, advance upon, battle, and capture of Paris; was promoted to a Colonelcy, January 4, 1814; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Florence in August, 1814; served with the Austrian Army in the campaign against Naples in 1815, including the battles of Tolentine and Marcella, and signed, in conjunction with General Bianchi, the Convention of Caza Lanza, by which the Kingdom of Naples was restored to its legitimate Sovereign; was made a Privy Councillor, March 28, 1822; became a Major-General, May 27, 1825; was made a K.C.B. February 15, 1838; became a Lt.-General, June 18, 1838; was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Naples, November 11, 1830; and at Berlin, October 14, 1841; succeeded as 11th Earl, December 12, 1841; was appointed Colonel of the 56th Regiment, November 17, 1842; was made a G.C.B. June 21, 1846; was appointed Mediator between the Danish and Prussian Plenipotentiaries in the Sleswig-Holstein affair, and, after a protracted negotiation, signed with them the Treaty of Peace between Prussia and Denmark of July 2, 1860; was transferred from Berlin to Vienna, January 27, 1851; became a General, June 20, 1854; was one of the Special Plenipotentiaries at the Conferences held at Vienna in 1855. Retired upon a Pension November 21, 1855. Is a G.C.H., a G.C. of the Red Eagle of Prussia; Henri le Lion of Brunswick; St. Ferdinand and St. Jammaris of Naples; of St. Joseph of Tuscany; and Knight of Maria Theresa of Austria; was appointed, July 16, 1856, to bear Her Majesty's congratulations to the King of the Belgians on the 26th anniversary of his Accession to the Throne of Belgium; and was appointed, July 23, 1856, by a Royal Decree, Grand Cross of the Belgian Order of Leopold, but did not obtain Her Majesty's permission to wear the decoration.

WESTWOOD, JOHN JULIUS COLLINGS,
was some time Vice-Consul at Rio Janeiro before being appointed Consul, February 21, 1862.

***WHITE, JOHN,**
was some years Vice-Consul at Valparaiso, and retired, April 1, 1837, upon a Superannuation Allowance.

***WHITEHEAD, JOHN,**
was Consul at Archangel from May 13, 1839, till September 16, 1854.

***WILKINS, JOHN,**
was Vice-Consul at Odessa from December, 1837, till April 3, 1854.

***WILLIAMS, OF KARS, MAJOR-GENERAL SIR WILLIAM FENWICK, BART., K.C.B., M.P.**
was appointed a Second Lieutenant in the Royal Artillery, July 14, 1825; was promoted to be First Lieutenant, November 16, 1827; to be Captain, August 13, 1840; was sent out on Special Service to Ceylon, where, for about nine years, he discharged the duties of an Engineer; was employed in Turkey from 1840 till 1843; was then sent as British Commissioner to meet the Turkish and Persian Plenipotentiaries at Erzeroum; took part in the conferences previous to the Treaty of Erzeroum of May, 1847; was named British Commissioner for the settle-

ment of the Turco-Persian Boundary in June, 1848; received the Brevet rank of Major for his Military services in Turkey, May 22, 1846; and Brevet rank of Lt.-Colonel for his Political services at Erzeroom, March 31, 1848; was made a C.B., December 23, 1852; was appointed Queen's Commissioner with the Turkish army in the East, with the local rank of Colonel, August 7, 1854; was raised to the local rank of Brigadier-General December 19, 1854; was promoted, November 2, 1855, to the rank of Major-General in the Army, for his distinguished conduct in the defence of Kars and of the position of that town, when attacked, September 29, 1855, by a large Russian army, which on that occasion sustained a signal defeat by the Turkish troops. The garrison of Kars was subsequently forced to capitulate, November 28, 1855, when Major-General Williams surrendered himself a prisoner to the Russian forces under General Mouravieff. Was appointed a K.C.B., February 5, 1856; was granted, February 7, 1856, Her Majesty's Royal License and Permission to accept and wear the Imperial Order of the Medjidie of the 1st Class, which the Sultan was pleased to confer upon him as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war, and particularly of his gallant defence of Kars; was created a Baronet, May 12, 1856, and was appointed Commandant of the Royal Artillery at Woolwich, June 25, 1856; was elected M.P. for Calne, July 10, 1856; was granted, August 2, 1856, Her Majesty's royal licence and permission to accept and wear the Insignia of the 2nd Class, Grand Officer, of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, which His Majesty the Emperor of the French was pleased to confer upon him, as a mark of His Imperial Majesty's approbation of his distinguished services before the enemy during the late war. Being a Supernumerary General Officer was placed on the fixed Establishment, December 20, 1856.

WILLIAMS, JULIAN B., was Unpaid Vice-Consul at Seville, from April 6, 1831, till June 5, 1856, when he was appointed Consul.

***WILLIAMSON, HEDWORTH**, was attached to the Legation at St. Petersburg, February 9, 1848; to the Embassy at Paris, September 23, 1850, which post he resigned in June, 1854; was appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Durham July 13, 1855.

***WILLOCK, SIR HENRY**, was attached to the Embassy in Persia, January, 1810; and was Chargé d'Affaires from July, 1815, to January 6, 1827; he obtained His Majesty's permission, July 19, 1826, to wear the Persian Order of the Lion and Sun of the First Class, with which His Majesty the Shah of Persia was pleased to honour him for his services in the field; is in the receipt of a Pension.

***WILSON, HUGH**, was Consul at Arica from April 27, 1836, till December 27, 1845.

***WILSON, SIR BELFORD HINTON, K.C.B.**, served for some considerable time in the service of Colombia, and obtained the rank of full Colonel; was Aide-de-camp to General Bolivar from 1823 to December, 1830; was appointed Consul-General in Peru, April 18, 1832; Chargé d'Affaires, November 18, 1837; and Chargé d'Affaires and Consul-General in Venezuela, November 30, 1842, which post he held till November 11, 1852, when he retired on a Superannuation Allowance; was made a K.C.B., December 25, 1852.

WILTHEW, CHARLES, was appointed Consul at Acapulco, October 12, 1852, and was transferred to Islay, December 31, 1855.

***WILTON (THOMAS EGERTON), EARL OF, G.C.H.**, succeeded as 2nd Earl, September 23, 1814; was Lord Steward of the Household from January 5, to April 23, 1835; was made a Privy Councillor, February 18, 1835; was appointed Colonel of the Queen's Own Light Infantry Regiment of Militia, November 7, 1840; was appointed, September 24, 1842, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary on a Special Mission to the Court of the King of Saxony for the purpose of investing His Majesty with the ensigns of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

WODEHOUSE (JOHN WODEHOUSE), LORD, succeeded as 3rd Baron, May 31, 1846; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Norfolk; was Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from December 28, 1852, till May 4, 1856, when he was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at St. Petersburg.

WOLFF, HENRY DRUMMOND, was a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office, from October 17, 1846, till he was appointed to a Clerkship, January 14, 1849; was attached to the Legation at Florence, from June 23, 1852, till June, 1853; and was Acting Chargé d'Affaires from September 1, to October 25, 1852; was some time in the 1st or Western Regiment of Norfolk Militia; was attached to the Earl of Westmorland's Special Mission to Belgium, in July 1856; and was appointed by a royal decree of Belgium, July 23, 1856, a Knight of the Order of Leopold, but did not obtain Her Majesty's permission to wear the decoration.

***WOMBWELL, JOHN**, was appointed Attaché to the Embassy at St. Petersburg, October 6, 1838; 2nd Paid Attaché, June 3, 1847, and 1st Paid Attaché, July 5, 1848, which post he held till April 5, 1851.

WOOD, RICHARD, was appointed Student Attaché to the Embassy at Constantinople in 1824; was employed in Syria in 1831, 1832, 1833, 1835, 1836, and 1840; was appointed Dragoman to the Embassy at Constantinople, October 8, 1834, and Consul at Damascus, May 15, 1841. Has obtained Her Majesty's permission to accept and wear the Nishan Iftihar, conferred on him by the Sultan; has received the English Medal for Syria, and the Turkish Medal for Acre; was appointed Agent and Consul-General at Tunis August 30, 1855.

WOOD, THOMAS, formerly Vice-Consul at Bengazi, and was appointed Consul at Patras, June 9, 1846.

WOODFORD, JOHN WILLIAM GORDON,
was appointed a Clerk in the Foreign Office, December 12, 1845; was Private Secretary to Lord Cowley, at Paris, from February to May, 1852.

WRIGHT, CAPTAIN THOMAS D.,
served some years in the Rifles; was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger, March 10, 1837, and a Captain in the 2nd Regiment of Surrey Militia, November 5, 1852.

WYKE, CHARLES LENNOX,
was a Lieutenant in the Royal Fusiliers; and afterwards Captain on the late King of Hanover's General Staff for three years; was appointed Vice-Consul at Port-au-Prince, October 20, 1845; Consul-General in Central America, February 6, 1852, and raised to the rank of *Chargé d'Affaires*, October 31, 1854.

***WYLDE, MAJOR-GENERAL WILLIAM, C.B.,**
entered the Artillery, September 8, 1803; served in Holland in 1813 and 1814, and commanded a battery before Antwerp, and at the attack on Bergen-op-Zoom; was attached to the Horse Artillery with the Army of Occupation in France; in April, 1834, succeeded the late Lord William Russell as Military Commissioner at the Head Quarters of Don Pedro's Army in Portugal, and continued with them until the Convention of Evora Monte; was employed at the Head Quarters of the Queen of Spain's Army from September 20, 1834, till December 28, 1838; was in all the general actions during that period, including the raising of the Siege of Bilbao, for which he received the thanks of the Spanish Cortes; was employed to keep the English Government informed of the military events which took place in Portugal from October 30, 1846, till August, 1847, during the Civil War, and signed the Convention of Oporto; is a Groom in Waiting to Prince Albert; became a Major-General, June 20, 1854. Is a C.B. Has received permission to wear the Order of Charles III, Second Class of San Fernando, and is a Commander of Isabella the Catholic.

WYLDE, WILLIAM HENRY,
accompanied his father, Major-General Wyld, of the Royal Artillery, to the north coast of Spain, in 1835, who was employed at the Head Quarters of the Queen of Spain's Army; was employed as a Supernumerary Clerk in the Foreign Office, from March 14, 1838, till April 5, 1839, when he was appointed to a Clerkship. He proceeded to Portugal with his father, who was employed in correctly informing the Government as to the military events which took place in that country from October 30, 1846, till August, 1847.

***WYLLIE, ROBERT CRICHTON,**
was formerly Vice-Consul at Honolulu, where he was some time Acting Consul; is now Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs and Secretary-at-War in the Sandwich Islands.

WYSE, RT. HON. THOMAS, C.B.
entered Parliament in 1830; was a Lord of the Treasury from August 28, 1839, till September 6, 1841; was one of the Secretaries to the Board of Control from July 28, 1846, till he was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Athens, February 9, 1849; and was made a Privy Councillor, February 13, 1849, and a C.B. March 1, 1851.

YEAMES, JAMES,
was Consul-General at Odessa from October 20, 1819, till April 3, 1854. Retired upon Superannuation Allowance, 1855.

SERVICES, &c., &c., &c., OF THOSE PERSONS WHO HAVE DIED SINCE LAST PUBLICATION.

BARNETT, COLONEL CHARLES JOHN,
served some years in the Guards; was appointed Consul at Warsaw, May 31, 1833; and Consul-General in Egypt, May, 1841, which post he held till August 17, 1846, when he retired upon a Superannuation Allowance. Died August 4, 1856.

BRANT, RICHARD WILLIAM,
was Consul at Smyrna from May 26, 1829, till his death, July 24, 1856.

CHABERT, ROBERT,
was admitted as Student in the Levant Company's Service in 1823, and was appointed Dragoman to the Embassy Constantinople, May 13, 1841. Died March 22, 1856.

FITZ ROY, LORD JOHN EDWARD,
died December 28, 1856 (vide page 63).

***HAMILTON, CHARLES JAMES HAMILTON,**
was attached to the Mission at Lisbon in January, 1810; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stuttgart, December 26, 1816; Secretary of Embassy at Paris, December 27, 1825; was accredited Minister Plenipotentiary to the French Court in 1833; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Buenos Ayres, July 5, 1834; while at Buenos Ayres, was sent twice on Special Mission to Monte Video; and was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Rio de Janeiro, October 2, 1835, which post he held till February 9, 1847, when he left the Brazils, and obtained his Pension. Died December 16, 1856.

HILLIER, CHARLES BATTEN,
was for many years Chief Magistrate at Hong Kong, and was Consul at Siam, from July 4, till his death, October 18, 1856.

KUPER, HENRY GEORGE,
was attached to the Consular Department in the Foreign Office, June 6, 1826; was appointed Paid Attaché at Frankfort, December 12, 1826; was some time Chargé d'Affaires to the Germanic Diet; was appointed Consul at Elsinore, March 5, 1844; and was removed to Baltimore, August, 1852. Died December 7, 1856.

LITTLEWOOD, JOHN,
was appointed a Queen's Foreign Service Messenger in 1814, and retired, August 1, 1843, upon a Superannuation Allowance. Died August 25, 1856.

PURDIE, JAMES,
was Vice-Consul at Adalia from February 19, 1842, till his death, October, 1856.

ROWCROFT, CHARLES,
was Consul at Cincinnati from July 1, 1852, till May 28, 1856, when his Exequatur was revoked by the President of The United States. Died August, 1856.

TEMPLE, HON. SIR WILLIAM, K.C.B.,
was attached to the Embassy at the Hague from January to September, 1814; to the Congress at Vienna, September, 1814; was appointed Secretary of Legation at Stockholm, October 10, 1814; at Frankfort, July 29, 1817; at Berlin, November 4, 1823; Secretary of Embassy at St. Petersburg, January 1, 1828; was Præcis Writer to his brother, Viscount Palmerston, from January 5, 1831, to September 16, 1832; was appointed Minister Plenipotentiary at Dresden, September 18, 1832; and Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Naples, November 27, 1832; was made a K.C.B. March 1, 1861. Died August 24, 1856.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE PRECEDENCE OF DIPLOMATIC AGENTS.

Act 17, annexed to the Treaty of Vienna, of June 9, 1815.

IN order to prevent the inconveniences which have frequently occurred, and which might again arise, from claims of precedence among different Diplomatic Agents, the Plenipotentiaries of the Powers who signed the Treaty of Paris have agreed on the following Articles, and they think it their duty to invite the Plenipotentiaries of other Crowned Heads to adopt the same regulation:—

ARTICLE I.—Diplomatic Agents are divided into three classes:—That of Ambassadors, Legates, or Nuncios; that of Envoys, Ministers, or other persons accredited to Sovereigns; that of *Chargés d'Affaires* accredited to Ministers for Foreign Affairs.

II. Ambassadors, Legates, or Nuncios, only, have the representative character.

III. Diplomatic Agents on an extraordinary mission have not, on that account, any superiority of rank.

IV. Diplomatic Agents shall take precedence in their respective classes, according to the date of the official notification of their arrival. The present Regulation shall not cause any innovation with regard to the Representatives of the Pope.

V. A uniform mode shall be determined in each State for the reception of Diplomatic Agents of each class.

VI. Relations of consanguinity, or of family alliance between Courts, confer no precedence on their Diplomatic Agents. The same rule also applies to political alliances.

VII. In Acts or Treaties between several Powers which grant alternate precedence, the order which is to be observed in the signatures shall be decided by lot between the Ministers.

The present Regulation is inserted in the Protocol of the Plenipotentiaries of the Eight Powers who signed the Treaty of Paris at their sitting of the 19th March, 1815.

Signed in the alphabetical order of the Courts by the Principal Plenipotentiaries of Austria, (Espagne) Spain, France, Great Britain, Portugal, Prussia, Russia, Sweden.

Conferences at Aix-la-Chapelle.

PROTOCOL No. 45.

November 21, 1818.

IN order to avoid inconvenient discussions which might in future arise upon a point of Diplomatic Etiquette, which appears not to have been anticipated in the Annex to the Treaty of Vienna, whereby questions of precedence were regulated, it is agreed between the Five Courts, that Ministers Resident accredited to them shall form, with respect to their precedence, an intermediate class between Ministers of the Second Class and *Chargés d'Affaires*.

REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE PRECEDENCE AND COMPARATIVE RANK OF CONSULS.

Extract of Paragraph 26 of the General Instructions for Her Majesty's Consuls.

The Consular Service consists of the following Classes:

Agents and Consuls-General;
Consuls-General;
Consuls;
Vice-Consuls;
Consular-Agents.

Agents and Consuls-General rank with, but after, Rear-Admirals, Commodores wearing Broad Pendants, or Major-Generals.

Consuls-General rank with, but after, Captains in charge of a Division, or Station, or Squadron, or in command of more than one rated ship, or Brigadier-Generals.

Consuls rank with, but after, Captains, R.N., or Colonels and Lieutenant-Colonels, but before Commanders, R.N., or Majors (Army).

Vice-Consuls rank with, but after, Lieutenants, R.N., and Masters Commanding, or Captains (Army), but before all other Lieutenants, R.N.

Consular-Agents rank with, but before, Mates, R.N., or Lieutenants (Army).

Consuls will take rank amongst their Colleagues at the Port of their Residence, in accordance with the Rules prescribed by the Congress of Vienna for Diplomatic Agents; viz.: seniority according to Official Title and priority of arrival.

DIPLOMATIC PENSION ACT.

2 & 3 Will. IV., c. 116. 16 August, 1832.

An Act to provide for the Salaries of certain High and Judicial Officers, and of Payments heretofore made out of the Civil List Revenues.

Diplomatic Salaries and Pensions.

IV. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for His Majesty, his heirs and successors, to charge upon the Consolidated Fund of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland an annual sum of 203,510*l.* to defray the charge of the salaries and allowances of His Majesty's diplomatic servants employed at foreign Courts, and of the pensions which have been granted on any new diplomatic pension having served His Majesty at foreign Courts, the said charge to take effect and commence from the 5th day of April, 1832.

Restriction on Amount of Grants of Pensions.

V. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That until the said sum of 203,510*l.* shall be reduced to the sum of 180,000*l.*, it shall not be lawful for His Majesty, his heirs or successors, to grant in any one year a larger annual amount in pensions for diplomatic services than 2 000*l.* in the whole; and when the actual charge shall be reduced to the sum of 180,000*l.*, it shall not be lawful for His Majesty, his heirs and successors, to charge upon the said Consolidated Fund for any one year a larger amount to defray the charges of diplomatic salaries, allowances, and pensions than 180,000*l.*

Limitation of Diplomatic Pensions.

VI. And be it further enacted, That no new diplomatic pension which may hereafter be granted under the authority of this Act shall exceed 1,700*l.* per annum to any one person for the 1st class, 1,300*l.* per annum to any one person for the 2nd class, 900*l.* per annum to any one person for the 3rd class, and 700*l.* per annum to any one person for the 4th class; and that such pensions shall only be so granted under the following regulations and restrictions; (that is to say,)

- 1st. That no diplomatic pension whatever shall be granted to any person until the expiration of 15 years from the date of his first commission, nor unless he shall have actually served 10 years;
- 2nd. That no person shall be qualified to receive a pension of the 1st class unless he shall have actually resided 3 years as ambassador at some foreign Court;
- 3rd. That no person shall be qualified to receive a pension of the 2nd class who shall not have actually resided 5 years as an envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary at some foreign Court;
- 4th. That no person shall be qualified to receive a pension of the 3rd class who shall not have actually resided 5 years as minister plenipotentiary or minister resident at some foreign Court;
- 5th. That pensions in the remaining class shall not exceed 700*l.* per annum, under the same conditions as to time of residence.

Forfeiture or Abatement of Pension in certain cases.

VII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That all diplomatic pensions shall be subject to forfeiture in case of refusal of the person holding the same to proceed to any mission of equal or higher rank than that in respect of which such pension may have been granted, and of suspension or abatement in any case in which the person holding the same may be appointed to any office of profit under the Crown.

CIVIL SERVICE AND CONSULAR PENSION ACT.

4 & 5 Will. IV., c. 24. 25 July, 1834.

An Act to alter, amend, and Consolidate the Laws for regulating the Pensions, Compensations, and Allowances to be made to Persons in respect of their having held Civil Offices in His Majesty's Service.

Superannuation Allowance to Persons who entered the Service before 5th August, 1829.

IX. And be it further enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act the superannuation allowances to be granted to such officers and clerks who shall have entered the public service prior to the 5th day of August, 1829 (except only as hereinafter is authorized), shall not exceed the following proportions with reference to the amount of their salaries and the periods of their services respectively; *videlicet*:—

To an officer, clerk, or person who shall have served 10 years and upwards and under 15 years, any annual allowance not exceeding in amount 4-12ths of the annual salary and emoluments of his office:

For 15 years and upwards, and under 20 years, not exceeding 5-12ths of such salary and emoluments:

For 20	"	"	25	"	"	6-12ths	"	"

And for 50 years or upwards, any annual allowance not exceeding the net amount of the salary and emoluments of his office.

Superannuation Allowance to Persons who shall have entered the Service subsequent to 4th Aug., 1829.

X. And be it further enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful to grant to any officer or clerk who shall have entered the public service subsequent to the 4th day of August, 1829, except as herein-

after authorized, any superannuation or allowance exceeding the following proportions with reference to the amount of their salaries and the periods of their services respectively, videlicet:—

To an officer, clerk, or person who shall have served 10 years and upwards, and under 17 years, any annual allowance not exceeding in amount 3-12ths of the salary and emoluments of his office:

For 17 years service and upwards, and under 24 years, not exceeding 4-12ths of such salary and emoluments:

And for 45 years and upwards, not exceeding 8-12ths of such salary and emoluments:

Conditions on which Allowances are to be granted as to Age and Infirmary.

XI. And be it further enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act it shall not be lawful to grant any superannuation allowance to any officer or clerk who shall be under 65 years of age, unless upon certificates from the heads of the department to which such officer or clerk shall belong, and from two medical practitioners, that he is incapable, from infirmity of mind or body, to discharge the duties of his situation, nor unless he shall have discharged those duties with diligence and fidelity, to the satisfaction of the head officer or officers of his department, which shall be certified by any two of such head officers if there shall be more than one, or by such head officer if there shall be but one; and in case the person claiming such superannuation allowance shall himself be the head officer, or one of the head officers, then such superannuation allowance shall not be granted unless he shall have discharged the duties of his situation with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Admiralty, if such head officer shall hold any office or situation under the control of that department, and in all other cases to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of the Treasury; and the said Commissioners of the Admiralty and Treasury respectively shall express such satisfaction in their minute recommending or authorizing the grant of any such superannuation allowance.

Superannuations not to be granted on advanced Amount of Salary received for less than Three Years.

XII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That the superannuation allowance to be granted to any officer or person after the passing of this Act shall not be computed upon the amount of the salary enjoyed by him at the time of his retirement, unless he shall have been in the receipt of the same, or in the class from which he retires, for a period of at least three years immediately before the granting of such superannuation allowance; and in case he shall not have enjoyed his then existing salary or have been in such class for that period, such superannuation allowance shall be calculated upon the average amount of salary received by such person for 3 years next preceding the commencement of such allowance.

Abatement to be made from the Salaries of those who have taken Office since the 4th August, 1829.

XXVII. And whereas the Commissioners of the Treasury did, by a minute dated the 4th day of August, 1829, record their intention to adopt certain regulations with a view to reduce prospectively the charge incurred in providing for superannuation allowances, of which notice was given in the several public departments, for the information of those who should thereafter enter the public service: And whereas in pursuance of the said minute, an annual abatement hath been made from the salaries and emoluments of the several persons who have entered the public service subsequent to the date thereof: And whereas it is expedient to continue such abatement in those cases, and to extend it to others as hereinafter provided: Be it therefore further enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act there shall be an annual abatement made, in quarterly proportions, by the proper officer in each respective department, from the salaries and emoluments of the several officers and persons employed in the several civil offices and departments specified in the schedule to this Act, or to be specified in the addition authorized to be made thereto, and not within the exceptions thereof, who have since the date of the said minute entered or shall hereafter enter the public service, in such manner and under such directions as shall from time to time be given in this respect by the Commissioners of the Treasury or of the Admiralty, as the case may be; the amount of which abatement shall be according to the respective rates following, (that is to say,)

From salaries and emoluments not exceeding the annual sum of 100*l.* an abatement after the rate of 2*l.* 10*s.* per centum:

And from salaries and emoluments exceeding 100*l.*, 5*l.* per centum:

And in the cases of all persons whomsoever at present holding office and entitled to superannuation allowance under this Act who shall have been appointed to such office subsequently to the issue of the minute of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 4th day of August, 1829, for the future regulation of the several civil departments of the public service, and who shall hereafter, upon promotion, obtain any increase of salary or allowances in respect of their offices, an annual abatement, after the like rates respectively, shall be made from the amount of such increase from time to time, commencing from the period when the same shall take place.

Act not to give an absolute Right to Allowances, or to prevent Dismissal of Persons for Misconduct.

XXX. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to give any person an absolute right to compensation for past services, or to any superannuation or retiring allowance under this Act, or to deprive the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the heads or principal officers of the respective departments, of their power and authority to dismiss any person from the public service without compensation.

RETENTION OF MILITARY HALF-PAY BY PERSONS IN CIVIL SERVICE.

Act 17 & 18 Vict., c. 121.

An Act to apply a Sum out of the Consolidated Fund and certain other Sums to the Service of the Year, and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament, 12th August, 1854.

Rules to be observed in the application of the Sums appropriated to Military Half-pay.

XXVIII. And as to the sum of 356,000*l.* by this Act appropriated on account of half-pay as aforesaid, it is hereby enacted and declared, that the rules hereafter prescribed shall be duly observed in the application of the said half-pay; (that is to say,) that no person who shall, on or before the 28th day of July, 1828, have held any civil place or employment of profit under Her Majesty, or in the colonies or possessions of Her Majesty beyond the seas, or under any other Government, shall have or receive any part of the same for any time during which he shall hold any such civil place or employment of profit under Her Majesty, or in the colonies or possessions of Her Majesty beyond the seas, or under any other Government, except in cases in which the same shall not exceed 3 times the amount of the highest rate of half-pay attached to the rank in virtue of which he claims to receive half-pay, or as hereinafter mentioned, nor in any such excepted cases, unless Her Majesty's special approbation be signified as aforesaid, and the officer claiming the half-pay in pursuance of such approbation shall signify in his declaration the civil place or employment of profit which he may hold or have held as aforesaid; but if the net annual emoluments of such civil place or employment shall exceed three times the amount of half-pay as aforesaid, and shall fall short of 4 times that amount, then it shall be lawful for the Paymaster-General, with Her Majesty's approbation, signified by the Secretary-at-War as aforesaid, to issue on or before the 24th day of December 1854, so much of the half-pay claimed by any such officer as shall, together with the net annual emoluments of the civil place or employment, be equal to 4 times the amount of such half-pay, and the officer claiming the half-pay in pursuance of such approbation shall specify in his declaration the civil place or employment of profit which he may have held as aforesaid, and the actual amount of the emoluments thereof, in such manner and form, and calculated up to such period or periods, as shall be required by the Secretary-at-War; but no person who, after the 28th day of June, 1828, has been appointed to any civil place or employment of profit (except in Her Majesty's Household) under Her Majesty, or in the colonies or possessions of Her Majesty beyond the seas, or under any other Government, shall have or receive any part of the same for any time during which he shall hold any such civil place or employment of profit (except as aforesaid) under Her Majesty beyond the seas, or under any other Government, other than that of a Barrack Master and the Master General and the Board of Ordnance, who shall, under the restrictions before mentioned, be entitled to receive his half-pay: Provided always, that from and after the 1st day of January, 1855, it shall be lawful for the Paymaster-General to issue the half-pay or any portion thereof to any officer appointed to civil place or employment of profit under Her Majesty or under any other Government, since the 28th day of July, 1828, if Her Majesty's pleasure to that effect be signified by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, through the Secretary-at-War, but such Permission to be granted under the restrictions before mentioned.

Regulations relative to Sec. II. of Colonial Regulations.

Art. 1. Whenever any Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary shall arrive at, or depart from any place in Her Majesty's dominions where there are forts or batteries from which salutes are usually fired, he shall be saluted with the number of guns specified against his rank in the scale § II.; and if an Ambassador shall embark on board of one of Her Majesty's ships in an official capacity, he shall also be saluted by such ship, according to the said scale, on his going on board, (and should he proceed to sea in her) also on his finally leaving her; and the same may be observed in a foreign port or colony.

Art. 2. An Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary shall be entitled to be saluted with the number of guns specified against his rank in the scale § II.; but he shall be entitled only to the compliment when within the precincts of the nation to which he is accredited; and consequently when he proceeds in a ship of war, he is only to be saluted by such ship, on his quitting her, after her arrival at his destination; and whenever he shall visit in his official capacity any of Her Majesty's ships within the precincts of the territories to which he is accredited, he is to be saluted by such ships with the number of guns specified against his rank in the scale; but if he visits several of Her Majesty's ships at the same port on the same day he shall be saluted only by one of them; and although his visit to any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels may be repeated, he shall be saluted by the same ship in the same port only once in 12 months; but when he shall embark on the final termination of his mission, he shall be entitled to the same number of guns from any of Her Majesty's ships which may be ordered to receive him.

The foregoing regulations are to be applicable also to the other diplomatic authorities of lower rank than that of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, differing only in the number of guns with which they are to be saluted, as stated against their ranks in the scale.

Art. 3. It is to be understood that salutes, in conformity to the foregoing regulations, shall be fired in compliment (from either forts or ships) to those foreign diplomatic authorities only whose nations pay the same compliments to Her Majesty's diplomatic ministers in their territories.

Art. 4. Her Majesty's Consuls-General, or Consuls, or the Members of a British Factory, shall be saluted with the number of guns mentioned against their rank in scale § II., on their going on board, or on their leaving any one of Her Majesty's ships or vessels, but this to be done only in the foreign ports to which they respectively belong, and only once in 12 months from the same ship or vessel, and to the same person.

REGULATIONS for the Examination, before the Civil Service Commissioners, of Candidates for Clerkships on the Establishment of the Foreign Office, as approved by the Earl of Clarendon, January 1, 1856.

CANDIDATES for Clerkships on the establishment of the Foreign Office, will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

- 1st. That they can write a good bold hand, forming each letter distinctly.
 - 2nd. That they can write, quickly and correctly, English and French from dictation.
 - 3rd. That they understand French well; and that they can make an accurate and good translation of any French paper.
 - 4th. That they can make a correct and clear précis or abstract of any set of papers placed in their hands.
- The limit of age for Candidates is between 18 years complete and 31 years complete, except in the case of those who may not reside with relatives, or have an established and respectable home in the metropolis or in its immediate neighbourhood. In this latter case, the minimum of age is 20 years complete.

REGULATIONS for the Examination of Unpaid Attachés, before the Civil Service Commissioners, as approved by the Earl of Clarendon, January 1, 1856.

THE examination will be directed to ascertain—

- 1st. That they can write a good bold hand, with distinctly formed letters.
 - 2nd. That they can write English and French quickly and correctly from dictation.
 - 3rd. That they understand French well; and that they can make an accurate and good translation of any French paper into English, and of any English paper into French; and that they can speak French with tolerable ease and correctness.
 - 4th. That they can make an accurate and good translation into English of a paper written either in German, Latin, Spanish, or Italian—the choice of the language being left to the candidate.
 - 5th. That they have a general knowledge of geography.
 - 6th. That they can make a clear and correct précis or abstract, in the form of a narrative, of any collection of papers placed in their hands.
 - 7th. That they have a general knowledge of modern history since the year 1789, and especially of the history of the country to which they are about to proceed, as regards its internal Constitution and its relation to other Powers. For the convenience of candidates it has been settled that as regards modern history generally, they will be examined in so much of "Heeren's Historical Manual of the Political System of Europe and its Colonies" as treats of history from the year 1789, and also in the fourth volume of Russell's "Modern Europe" (last edition); and as regards any particular country to which they may be about to proceed, they will be examined in so much of "McCulloch's Geographical Dictionary" as relates to that country.
- Moreover all persons on their first nomination as Unpaid Attachés, and previously to their undergoing the examination before the Commissioners, will be required to attend for at least three months in the Foreign Office, in order that they may become acquainted with the forms of business as carried on there.
- Limit of Age for Candidates:—18 to 25, both years inclusive.

REGULATIONS for the Examination of Paid Attachés, before the Civil Service Commissioners, as approved by the Earl of Clarendon, January 1, 1856.

ALL persons promoted from Unpaid to Paid Attachéships, before they are confirmed in their new office, will be required, if in England at the time of their promotion, or within one month after their arrival in England, to submit themselves for examination by the Commissioners, in order to ascertain—

- 1st. That they can speak and write the languages of the several countries in which they have resided since their first appointment as Unpaid Attachés; but in this examination the length of time during which candidates may have resided in the several countries, and also the comparative difficulty of acquiring the languages of such countries, will be taken into account. Candidates who have previously resided only in France or in the United States, will be required to satisfy the Examiners of their proficiency in one other language besides French.
- 2nd. Candidates on being examined on promotion, will be required to draw up a report on the General Commercial and Political Relations of the several countries in which they may have resided: on the Internal Policy and the Administration and Social Institutions of such countries, and on the Character of their People. These reports, however, must not refer to current political affairs, and they must be sent in the first instance to the Foreign Office, from which they will be forwarded to the Commissioners.
- 3rd. Candidates on being examined on promotion, will further be required to satisfy the Commissioners that they possess such a knowledge of International Law as can be acquired from "Wheaton's Elements of International Law," and "Wheaton's History of International Law."

REGULATIONS for the Examination of Candidates for Consular Appointments, before the Civil Service Commissioners, as approved by the Earl of Clarendon, January 1, 1856.

PERSONS selected for the Consular Service—whenever the circumstance of their being resident in England on their first appointment, or of their passing through England on their way to take up such first appointment, may admit of their being subjected to examination—will be expected to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

- 1st. That they have a correct knowledge of the English language so as to be able to express themselves clearly and correctly in writing.
 - 2nd. That they can write and speak French correctly and fluently.
 - 3rd. That they have a sufficient knowledge of the current language as far as commerce is concerned, of the port at which they are appointed to reside, to enable them to communicate directly with the authorities and natives of the place: a knowledge of the Italian language being taken to meet this requirement as far as any place situated to the east of the Straits of Gibraltar is concerned; and a knowledge of the German language as regards ports within the Baltic, or countries having ports in the Baltic.
 - 4th. A sufficient knowledge of British Mercantile and Commercial Law to enable them to deal with questions arising between British ship-owners, ship-masters, and seamen. As regards this head of examination, candidates must be prepared to be examined in "Smith's Compendium of Mercantile Law."
- Limit of Age for Candidates:—25 to 50, both years inclusive.

5th. A sufficient knowledge of arithmetic for the nature of the duties which Consuls are required to perform in drawing up Commercial Tables and Reports. As regards this head of examination, candidates must be prepared to be examined in "Bishop Colenso's Arithmetic."

Previously to undergoing their examination by the Civil Service Commissioners, candidates for Consular appointments will be required, as far as practicable, to attend at the Foreign Office for at least three months, in order to make themselves acquainted with the forms in which business is conducted.

The Queen has been pleased to direct that the following Regulations respecting Foreign Orders and Medals shall be substituted for those now in force :

REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN ORDERS.

1. No Subject of Her Majesty shall accept a Foreign Order from the Sovereign of any foreign country, or wear the Insignia thereof, without having previously obtained Her Majesty's permission to that effect, signified by a Warrant under Her Royal Sign Manual.

2. Such permission shall not be granted to any Subject of Her Majesty, unless the Foreign Order shall have been conferred in consequence of active and distinguished Service before the Enemy, either at Sea or in the Field ; or unless he shall have been actually and entirely employed, beyond Her Majesty's dominions, in the Service of the Foreign Sovereign by whom the Order is conferred.

3. The intention of a Foreign Sovereign to confer upon a British subject the Insignia of an Order, must be notified to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, either through the British Minister accredited at the Court of such Foreign Sovereign, or through His Minister accredited at the Court of Her Majesty.

4. If the service for which it is proposed to confer the Order has been performed during War, the notification required by the preceding Clause must be made not later than two years after the exchange of the ratifications of a Treaty of Peace.

If the service has been performed in time of Peace, the notification must be made within two years after the date of such service.

5. After such notification shall have been received, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall, if the case comes within the conditions prescribed by the present Regulations, and arises from naval or military Services before the Enemy, refer it to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department, previous to taking Her Majesty's pleasure thereupon, in order to ascertain whether there be any objection to Her Majesty's permission being granted.

A similar reference shall also be made to the Commander-in-Chief, if the application relates to an Officer in the Army, or to the Lords of the Admiralty if it relates to an Officer in the Navy.

6. When Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall have taken the Queen's pleasure on any such application, and shall have obtained Her Majesty's permission for the person in whose favour it has been made to accept the Foreign Order and wear the Insignia thereof, he shall signify the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, in order that he may cause the Warrant required by Clause 1 to be prepared for the Royal Sign Manual.

When such Warrant shall have been signed by the Queen, a notification thereof shall be inserted in the Gazette, stating the service for which the Foreign Order has been conferred.

7. The Warrant signifying Her Majesty's permission, may, at the request and at the expense of the person who has obtained it, be registered in the College of Arms.

8. Every such Warrant as aforesaid shall contain a Clause providing that Her Majesty's license and permission does not authorize the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining to a Knight Bachelor of Her Majesty's Realm.

9. When a British subject has received the Royal permission to accept a Foreign Order he will at any future time be allowed to accept the decoration of a higher class of the same Order, to which he may have become eligible by increase of rank in the Foreign service, or in the service of his own country ; or any other distinctive mark of honour strictly consequent upon the acceptance of the original Order, and common to every person upon whom such Order is conferred.

10. The preceding Clause shall not be taken to apply to Decorations of the Guelphic Order which were bestowed on British subjects by Her Majesty's predecessors, King George IV and King William IV, on whose heads the Crowns of Great Britain and Hanover were united.

Decorations so bestowed cannot properly be considered as rewards granted by a Foreign Sovereign for services rendered according to the purport of Clause 2 of these Regulations. They must be rather considered as personal favours bestowed on British subjects by British Sovereigns, and as having no reference to services rendered to the Foreign Crown of Hanover.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN MEDALS.

1. Application for permission to accept and wear Medals which, not being the decoration of any Foreign Order, are conferred by a Foreign Sovereign on British subjects in the Army or in the Navy, for military or for naval services, should be addressed, as the case may be, to the Commander-in-Chief, the Master-General of the Ordnance, or the Lords of the Admiralty, who, if they see fit, may submit the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, for Her Majesty's sanction ; upon obtaining which, they may grant such permission without any other formality.

2. Permission to wear a Foreign Medal cannot be granted to a British subject, unless such Medal is bestowed for military or naval services performed by the command or with the sanction of Her Majesty. But no permission is necessary for accepting a Foreign Medal, if such Medal is not to be worn.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING PASSPORTS.

1.—APPLICATIONS for Foreign Office Passports must be made in writing ; and addressed to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, with the word "Passport" written upon the cover.

2.—The fee on the issue of a Passport is 7s. 6d.

3.—Foreign Office Passports are granted only to British-born subjects, or to Ionians, or to such foreigners as have become naturalized either by Act of Parliament, or by a Certificate of Naturalization granted by the Secretary of State for the Home Department. When the party is a "Naturalized British subject," he will be so designated in his Passport ; and if his Certificate of Naturalization be dated subsequently to the 24th of August, 1850, his Passport will be marked as good for one year only ; but this regulation will not preclude any person whom it affects from obtaining, at any future periods, on his producing his old Passport, a fresh Passport for a further limited period of one year, without being required to pay a fresh fee.

4.—Passports are issued between the hours of twelve and four, on the day following that on which the application for the Passport has been received at the Foreign Office.

5.—Passports are granted to persons who are either known to the Secretary of State or recommended to him by some person who is known to him, or upon the application of any *Banking Firm* established in London or in any other part of the United Kingdom.

6.—Passports cannot be sent by the Foreign Office to a person already abroad : such person should apply to the nearest British Mission or Consulate.

7.—Foreign Office Passports must be countersigned at the Mission in London, or at some Consulate in the United Kingdom, of the Government of the country which the bearer of the Passport intends to visit.*

8.—A Foreign Office Passport granted for one journey to a British-born subject, or to an Ionian, or to a "Naturalized British subject," whose Certificate of Naturalization is dated previously to August 24, 1850, may be used for any subsequent journey, *if countersigned afresh* by the Ministers or Consuls of the countries which the bearer intends to visit ; but a Passport granted for one journey to a "Naturalized British subject," whose Certificate is dated subsequently to the 24th of August, 1850, can only be used for a subsequent journey undertaken within the period for which the Passport has been originally granted.

* It is requisite that the bearer of every Passport, granted by the Foreign Office, should sign his Passport before sending it to be *viséd* at any Foreign Mission or Consulate in England : without such signature, either the *visa* may be refused, or the validity of the Passport questioned abroad. And travellers who may have any intention of visiting the Austrian States, at any time in the course of their travels on the Continent, are particularly and earnestly advised not to quit England without having their Passports *viséd* at the Austrian Mission in London : but there is no necessity for a *visa* to a Foreign Office Passport of either the Prussian or Sardinian authorities in the United Kingdom.
