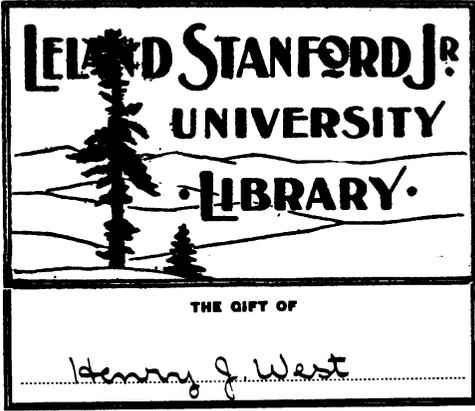

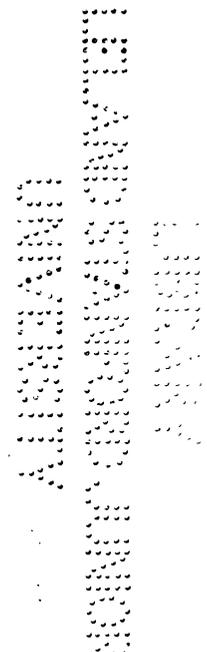

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report as State Director of United New Jersey Railroad and Canal Company, for the year ending December 31st, 1907.

The statements exhibit—

First—Total mileage, 543.40 miles.

Second—Net profit, \$30,436.18.

Third—Amounts charged and credited to “Construction” and “Real Estate” accounts from January 1st, 1872, to December 31st, 1907, inclusive, showing a debit balance on January 1st, 1908, \$23,172,658.30.

The State of New Jersey is the owner of 3,242 shares of stock, par value of \$324,200, on which a dividend of ten per cent. (10%) has been paid and received by the State, as appears by the annual report of the State Treasurer for 1907.

The terms of the lease under which the Pennsylvania Railroad Company operates the property of the United New Jersey Railroad and Canal Company have been strictly complied with, and the physical condition of the property has been satisfactorily maintained.
