

BROAD BEANS.

FRENCH-Fèves de Marais.

The Cultivation of Broad Beans.—Early Mazagan and Dwarf Fan Beans may be planted in November, and a second sowing made in February, the rows being about 15 in. apart; to be followed by the Long-Podded and Windsor varieties to secure a succession. The later sorts should be about 6 in. from plant to plant, and 3 ft. from row to row. This erop succeeds best on deep rich soil in an exposed position. On light and dry soils it generally gets attacked by the black blight and spoils. When the points suffer from this pest it becomes imperative to pinch them out and burn them.

The Cultivation of French or Kidney Beans.—Sow in pots nuder glass for forcing from December to April, and about May in the open horders, followed by two or three successional sowings at intervals of a fortnight. The rows ought to be from 2 ft. to $2\frac{1}{2}$ apart, and the plants thinned to about 1 ft. apart. They are rather delicate, and should not be sown out of doors until the warm weather sets in.





The main crop should be sown the last week in April on ground that has been well trenched and manured. Let the rows be about $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft, apart, thin them to allow about 9 inches between the plants, and keep the soil well stirred with the hoc during the summer.







After shaking out, stack your short manure closely like as for the preparation of a hot-bed, and there let it remain for a week to have a good heating, then turn is over and place what has been outside the heap into the centre ; repeat this turning at intervals of three days (four turnings should be sufficient), and if dry, use water enough to moisten it gradually at each turning; this will get the material into right condition for the beds, as moisture is you get your material right in this respect, whatever shape you make your beds, whether flat beds or ridges, you will not be likely to experience any trouble afterwards. The Cultivation of Onion.—The ground cannot well be too rich for this crop, nor the soil in too fine a condition. February and March are the chief seasons for sowing. The soil must be made firm before the operation is undertaken in either beds or drills. The seed should be sown thinly and covered lightly, the drills 12 in, apart, and the young Onions thinned out to about 6 in, apart, according to the variety. In very dry weather a good watering is very beneficial. Growers of Onions for exhibition generally transplant, and this is also a sure means of checking the onion grub, so troublesome in some districts. Some of the larger growing varieties are generally sown in antumn and transplanted in spring, when under fair conditions enormous exhibition specimens are obtained.



CULTURE. INTENSIVE FRENCH

One of the great advantages of the French method of intensive cultivation of vegetables under bell glass or in frames is that the produce is ready for the kitchen or the table in succession, and at periods of the year when under ordinary cultivation it would not be available.
