#### ASTERS.

The Aster, when well cultivated, is the most beautiful flower in its season. The Hamburgh Prize Paony Perfection has massive tasselled flowers; the Victoria, large perfectly formed imbricated blossoms; the Cockade his flowers with a large white centre; the Hedgehog is distinguished for its porcupine-quilled petals; the Dwarf Chrysanthemum-flowered covers the foliage with its large beautiful flowers; the Imbrique Pompone is a charming flower for bouquets; and the Dwarf Bouquet Elegantissima has exquisitely neat blossoms, which range from the size of a florin to that of a five shifting piece, the combination of colours being very striking, while the habit of the plant is neat and compact. The German Emperor Aster is remarkable for its dwarf growth and large flowers. (Aster Seed is of excellent growth this season.)

The varieties of T. Lobbianum are exceedingly elegant, and remarkable for their richly diversified colours and profusion of bloom, being elohally had plated for line from the door decoration. In the flower garden, when pegged down, they are very effective bedding plants and very graceful growing over rustic baskets, rock formations, etc., or trained over trellises, chains, pitlars, walls, etc. The new varieties, Cardinal and Crown Prince of Prussia, have finely-formed flowers, and are specially recommended for indoor culture, as during winter and spring they keep the conservatory gay, supplying a large quantity of cut flowers. The seed from the self colours usually comes true, but particeloured varieties sport very much. T. Canariense, the Canary Creeper, with its beautifully fringed rich yellow flowers and pretty foliage, is universally known and admired as a fine climber. T. Jarattii is a beautiful greenhouse plant. T. pentaphyllum is in the style of Jarattii, but hardy, succeeding out of doors in warm situations and in light soils. Specisum is a charming hardy species.

## Section III. - EDIBLE-ROOTED PLANTS.

For Illustrated Report of Beets grown at our Experimental Grounds, see "Gardeners' Magazine," 1870.

In the process of cooking, Beet is frequently made hard and unedible, and the seedsman or gardener made to bear the consequences of the cook's shorteomings. Following up our experimental trials, we have looked into the cook's department, and offer to our readers the following conclusions:

1. In preparing Beet for cooking, the greatest care must be taken not to bruise the skin, or in any way wound the root: and if by accident any injury has been done to the root, bake and not boil it.

2. If a deep crimson hue is the colour preferred in the Beet, or a firm flesh, this is best attained by baking.

3. If a light, clear bright colour is desired, or a soft, jutey flesh, then boiling will secure this. BARBE DE CAPUCIN. A fine winter Salad.
This is one of the most wholesome and agreeable of winter salads. Sow in May, and in autumn lift the roots, and store them in a dry cool situation. To maintain a succession, plant the roots at perpkt, perox. intervals, in boxes of soil, and place them in a dark warm cellar or mushroom-house. WITLOEF, A NEW VEGETABLE.
Those who are fond of the salad known as Barbe de Capucin, will esteem the Witloef highly. The seed is sown in May, and the roots as required are lifted from the end of October to rebruary.  They are then divested of their leaves to within two inches of the crown, planted in a trench one foot deep, and covered with 8 inches of finely sifted soil, over which 2 or 3 feet of stable litter in paced. As the heat from the litter generates, in about three weeks there issues from the crown of the row a pale green head, resembling a Paris Cos Lettuce; this is eaten as Salad, or cooked and served up as Seakale
DANDELION.  The blanched leaves of this plant in Spring make a most delicate flavoured and wholesome salad.
Improved very early
At the Chiswick Gardens of the Royal Horticultural Society, good service was done in 1874, by a very carefully conducted trial of Celery, in which was elicited the important fact that in this country the really distinct, typical Celeries do not exceed four in number, and that the multitude of names are either synonyms, or represent merely trifting variations. Celeriac, or Turnip-rooted Celery, is not included in the above remark, its cultivation, we regret to say, being very limited in this country. The examination of the different stocks of Celery grown at the trial, showed the importance of careful selections; still it is noteworthy that the best selected stocks of Celeries are only presentable at table in proportion to the care bestowed on their cultivation; trenching the soil and heavily manuring are indispensable, and during dry weather abundance of water should be given from time to time, to keep the plants growing. The geographical varieties of the type Orientalis are Antiquorum, Guttatus, Olympicus, Pallidus, Cancasicus, Odorus, Atrorubens, Colchicus, and Abchasicus,

## THE CHRISTMAS ROSE (HELLEBORUS NIGER).

To have the blossoms pure white for The Christmas Rose is in flower during December and January. Christmas decoration, the plants should be protected at the time of flowering. A hand-light, resting on bricks, consistmas decoration, the plants should be protected at the time of flowering. A hand-light, resting on bricks, will be sufficient for a large specimen; but when a great number of flowers are required, a temporary pit should be made, the natural soil, if unsuitable, removed, and a mixture of loam and rotten dung, or loam, leaf soil and dung substituted. When the flower buds appear, protect with lights, and give plenty of air, but dispense with the lights as soon as possible after the flowering season. For naturalization and wild gardens, the Christmas Rose is a grand plant. If the Christmas Rose is planted in spring, and well looked after with water during summer, abundance of blossoms are a sure reward in winter.

## HERBACEOUS HARDY SPECIES AND VARIETIES OF SINGLE PÆONIAS (May and June flowering).

As a cut flower for vases and luble decoration the blossoms are of the greatest value, and last in water longer than any other flower. At Flower Shows in May and June the Pyrethrum is one of the most attractive amongst cut flowers.

In addition to the early summer display, the Pyrethrum if cut back and encouraged to make vigorous growth in Summer,

Our Annual Exhibitions of these floroers at the Royal
Horticultural Gardens, South Kensington, and at King

## FRENCH VARIETIES OF GLADIOLUS GANDAVENSIS.

TIME OF PLANTING.—From the middle of April to the beginning of June we consider the best time to plant;

TIME OF PLANTING.—From the middle of April to the beginning of june we consider the best dine to plant, when one planting only is made, we should recommend it being done early in May, but if successional plantings are made, commence middle of April, and continue fortnightly till the middle of June.

PLANTING TO ADVANTAGE.—Groups of three to a dozen roots, planted in the flower borders in distinct, or diversified colours, produce an exceedingly fine effect. The roots should be six inches from each other, and when the plants are sufficiently advanced place a stake in the centre of the group, and fasten the plant to it.
